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Turin, October 14.

The Arraies on this side continue in their former Stations; The Duke of Savoy's near *Moncalier*, and the French at *Raconigi*; but the Season that's coming in, will quickly oblige them to think of Winter Quarters. Monsieur *Catinat* has sent his heavy Cannon and sick Men (whose number is said to amount to above 5000) to *Pignerol*, and has likewise ordered a Detachment of 5 Battalions towards the Valley of *Pragelas*. The *Vanduis* in the mean time continue to behave themselves very bravely, and do always bring back a good deal of Booty from the Incursions they make into the Enemies Territories; In one they took lately 1200 Sheep, 30 Oxen, and 30 Mules. But notwithstanding these advantages, they suffer very much in their Valleys, the Country being ruined, and their Houses destroyed by the French. The Governor of *Milan* is gone home to receive the Marquis *d'Obizzi*, who is sent by the Emperor to the Princes of *Italy*; but he is expected here again very suddenly.

Venice, October 20. On the 15th instant arrived here a Felucca, which came from *Vallona* on the 3d instant, being dispatched by the *Proveditore-General Sagredo* with Letters to the Senate, wherein he acquaints them, That the Fleet arrived the 23d of the last Month before *Durazzo*; but the badness of the weather having for 3 days together hindered the Troops from landing, and the Captain-General *Cornaro* falling sick of a Fever, it was thought advisable not to pursue the design upon *Durazzo* at that time, especially considering that the Forces began to be very sickly, but to return to *Vallona*, where the Fleet arrived on the 29th, and the Captain-General dyed on the first instant, in the 59th year of his age, being very much lamented by the whole Army. By Letters of the 13th past from Signior *Delfino*, who commands a Squadron of our Fleet appointed to cruise in the *Levant*, we have an account; That having in 4 days transported the Garison of *Napoli de Malvasia* to *Canea*, and being joynd by Captain *Contarini*, with the Ships under his command, he sailed the 18th of *August* with 12 Men of War, 2 Fireships, and a Petache, towards *Adros*, where he arrived the 29th, and having received some notice of the Enemy, continued his course, and arrived the 6th of *September* at the Island of *Parsa*, not far from *Scio*, and understanding there that the Enemies Fleet was in the Channel of *Metellino*, he stood towards them, and the 7th in the evening got fight of them; The 8th, in the afternoon, the two Fleets Engaged, the Enemies consisting of 32 Men of War, 37 Gallies, and 6 Galeots, but notwithstanding this great inequality in number, our Squadron not only maintained the Fight for 5 hours, but obliged the Enemy to retire towards *Metellino*, the Admiral of *Argiers* having lost his Main-Mast, and several other of the Enemies Ships being very much damaged; The loss on our side was inconsiderable, not having above 25 Men killed and wounded; and Signior *Delfino* was shot in the Hand. The 9th, the Enemy appeared in sight again, and Signior *Delfino* made the usual Signal for Battle, but the Wind calming, there was no farther Action. In the night there arose a pretty fresh Gale, and the next morning the Enemy were almost out of sight, taking their Course towards *Constantinople*, four of their Ships, which were disabled, being towed by their Gallies; and Signior *Delfino* returned thereupon with his Squadron towards the *Mores*.

Yesterday the great Council met to choose a new Captain-General, and the Election fell upon Signior *Domenico Muzio*, formerly *Proveditore-General* of *Dalmatia*, who is now in this City, but will set out very speedily to take command of this Army, though, according to all appearance, the Campaign is ended for this year.

Vienna, October 20. On the 21st instant arrived here a Letter, sent by the States of *Transylvania* to their Deputies at this Court, who informed us, that *Teckely* had

interpreted several Couriers which were dispatched hither, and having taken the Letters they were charged with, had afterwards sent them open to Prince *Louis*; This Express gave likewise an account, that Prince *Louis* having resolved to attack *Teckely*, he, upon notice of it, retired in the night, and the Prince followed him beyond *Hermanstadt*, having in his march been reinforced by 1500 or 2000 Germans, who escap'd from Gen. *Hessler's* defeat, and retired to several places in *Transylvania*; That the Turks and Tartars had left *Teckely* in his Retreat; and that some of our Troops, who closely pursued him, had cut off a great part of his Rear-Guard. This news was confirmed by an Express that arrived here on the 26th from Prince *Louis*, who brought this farther account, that *Teckely*, upon the approach of the Imperial Army, had caused the Suburbs of *Hermanstadt*, with the Villages thereabout, to be burnt, and then retired towards the Frontiers of *Valachia*, having before sent his Baggage under a Guard of 6000 Men to *Ziashi*, a considerable place situated among the Mountains: That Colonel *Schemsaj* had cut off 500 Men of the Troops commanded by *Petrozzi*, who was sent by *Teckely* to secure a Pass: and that the States of *Transylvania* had again taken an Oath of Fidelity to the Emperor, with a resolution religiously to observe the same, provided his Imperial Majesty does protect them against their Enemies. And this day we have fresher advice by Letters from Prince *Louis*, which say, that he was resolved to follow *Teckely* several miles farther toward *Valachia*, but in case he still retired, Prince *Louis*, not to harass his Army, would return and attack *Teckely's* Baggage, which was in that manner cut off from the Enemies main Body, that *Teckely* must either abandon it, or come to an Engagement.

Since the taking of *Belgrade*, (which place is now reduced to a heap of Rubbish) the Turks have only sent out Parties to ruin the Country about *Esseck*; where the Duke of *Cray* continues to draw together all the Force he can to oppose them, and to that end the Imperialists have withdrawn the Garisons they had on the other side of the *Save*. The Garison of *Buda* has been lately reinforced, and they work on the Fortifications of that place with an extraordinary diligence. An Officer is arrived here from *Upper Hungary* with advice, that the *Bailla of Great Hungary* having resolved to capitulate, had been seized and strangled by the Garison, who were encouraged by a Letter that had been conveyed into the Town from *Teckely*, wherein he promised them a speedy Succor. The Count de *Carrassa*, Comillary-General of the Army, parted from hence on Monday last by the Emperor's order for *Germany*, to confer with the Electors of *Bavaria* and *Saxony* about the Troops that are to be detached from the Imperial Army towards *Hungary*.

Frankfort, Novemb. 5. The Emperor has, as we hear, written to the Elector of *Saxony*, to desire he will leave his Troops near the *Rhine* this Winter, to whom he will assign the same Quarters that were intended for the Imperial Regiments, which he is necessitated to recall towards *Hungary*. We hear as yet only of 6 Regiments that are ordered thither, five of Foot, and one of Horse; The first are to pass by Water from *Ratisbonne*, and the Horse to march through *Bohemia*. The last advices from *Hungary* say, that the Turks had passed the *Save*, and appeared in strong Parties near *Esseck*.

Hamburg, Novemb. 7. The Letters from *Poland* tell us, that their Army was separated, and going into Winter Quarters. We are told, that the Princes of *Luxemburg* are very much inclined to assist the Emperor with a good Body of their forces in *Hungary*.

Cleves, Novemb. 1. The States of this County are now assembled here, to give his Electoral Highness of *Brandenburg* a Supply for the ensuing Year. There is a discourse, that his Electoral Highness intends to make a new Levy of 8500 Men. The Landgrave of *Hesse* is expected here the next week.

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Chambré, Novemb. 7. The States of this Arch-bishoprick are still assembled here, expecting the return of the Deputies they lately sent to Cleves to treat with the Elector of Brandenburg about his Troops, which they desire may be quartered in this Country to secure it, during the Winter, against the Emperor's Incursions. In the meantime the Forces of *Munster* and *Padoborne*, with 4000 *Hessians*, continue in these Parts, but the rest of the Troops of *H. H.* are marched towards *Wetteravia*, where they are to have their Winter Quarters. The Auxiliary Troops of *Saxony* are at present in the Country of *Fidda* and *Eysfelden*, whither Count *Beaumont*, Commissary-General of the Imperial Army, is gone to confer with Major-General *Waldeck*, who commands them; but as yet we do not know, whether these Troops will return home, or have Winter Quarters assigned them near the *Rhine*. The French have at present a very strong Garrison at *Trier* under the command of the Marquis de *Harcourt*, who arrived there the first instant from *Luxemburg*; he is likewise to command all the French Troops on the *Moselle* during the Winter. From the *Upper Rhine* we hear, that the French Army has repass'd that River, and that the Troops are separate and gone into their Winter Quarters; That the French have broken their Bridges of Boats at *Numbourg*, and sent their Cannon by Water to *Strasbourg*. The Imperial Forces that were quartered near the Forest Towns, are thereupon likewise breaking up, in order to go into Winter Quarters. The City of *Geneva* has been at last persuaded to receive into Garrison 300 Men more from the Canton of *Berne*, so that there are now 600 *Swissers*, of which 400 are to be maintained by the said Canton, and 200 by that of *Zurich*; and besides these, the Magistrates of *Geneva* are going to raise 200, and a good number of Men will be kept in a readiness in that Neighbourhood, with Orders to put themselves into the Town whenever there is need of it.

Paris, Novemb. 7. The Duke of *Luxemburg* is daily expected here from *Flanders*, where the Marquis de *Boufflers* is to command the French Forces this Winter; the Marquis d'*Uxelles* in *Alsace*; and Monsieur de *Biffi* in *Lorraine*, and on the *Saar*. The last advices from *Saroy* say, that the French Forces were moving towards their Winter Quarters, which they cannot take or maintain in *Piedmont*, and it's believed, that Monsieur *Catinat* has by this time repass'd the Mountains, leaving strong Garrisons in *Pignerol* and *Cazal*. On the 3d instant dyed at *Versailles* the Marquis de *Saligny* Secretary of State, and Sur-Intendant of the Marine, in the 39th year of his Age. The Marechal d'*Estree* is to command the French Fleet the next year.

Hague, Novemb. 10. The Troops are now every where in their Winter Quarters, and Prince *Waldeck* is gone to *Maestricht*, from whence he is shortly expected here. They write from *Berne* of the 28th inst, that the Magistrates of *Geneva* had resolv'd to augment their Garrison, part of which new Reinforcement will be paid by the Cantons of *Berne* and *Zurich*; and that a great many Men were daily at work on the Fortifications of that City. We have advice likewise, that the *Vaudois* and French Protestants have defeated a Detachment that was ordered to conduct the Sick and Wounded Men from Monsieur *Catinat's* Army to *Pignerol*. On the third instant the Magazine of Powder, that's kept in this place, took fire by some accident and blew up, but there happening to be at that time but a small quantity of Powder, it did no great mischief, only damaged some of the neighbouring Houses, and killed and wounded 2 or 3 persons. The French have taken a Dutch Man of War of about 40 Guns, who convoyed a Fleet of Merchant Ships bound to *St. Ubes*; The Dutch defended themselves for several hours against 2 French Men of War of 60 Guns apiece, till their Main-Mast was shot down. And during the Fight, all the Merchant Ships escaped, except 3 or 4 that afterwards fell into the hands of the Privateers of *St. Malo*; This Action happened off of *Cape Finister*.

Hague, Novemb. 14. The Letters from *Viennois* of the 2d instant give an account, that they had that morning received advice from *Esbeck*, that the Grand Visier with his whole Army appeared on the 30th of the last Month before that place, which not being in a condition to resist so great a Force, the Duke of *Croy* had Orders to retire with his Troops, and to set the Bridge on fire, that it might be useless to the Enemy. The same Letters tell us, that they heard by a Courier from *Poland*, that Prince *Louis* of *Baden* had engaged *Teckeley*, and had given him an entire defeat, of which they expected a confirmation. They write from *Frankfort*, that 5000 Imperial Foot and 1000 Horse were actually on their march towards *Hungary*. That the States of *Saxony* have resolv'd to raise several Regiments against Spring; And the States of *France* intend to do the like. The Elector of *Saxony's* Forces are to have their Winter Quarters between the *Main* and the *Neckar*. This day being His Majesty of *Great Brit-*

tain's birth-day, was celebrated here with all the Solemnity imaginable; The States and Foreign Ministers were invited by my Lord *Dursey*, His Majesty's Plenipotentiary and Envoy Extraordinary, to a very splendid Entertainment; The Front of his Lordship's House is all one great Illumination; and Wine has run from two Pipes ever since Noon for the Common People.

Deale, Novemb. 7. Yesterday and the day before were brought into the Downs by the *Ostend* Privateers, four *Succes* and *Danes* laden with Wine and Brandy from *Bordeaux*, as also a French Prize.
