(6.) In the parishes of Bolton, Ireby, and Uldale, in the county of Cumberland, comprised within the following boundary, that is to say, commencing at the north side of the river Ellen near Poplar Tree Wood, thence crossing the Ireby and Bolton Gate-road, thence along the south side of the road leading to Prior Hall Mill and Cockshot Beck, thence along the west side of the said Beck to Snittlegarth Bridge, thence by the west side of the high road to High Ireby Grange, thence to the fence dividing Mr. Peel's and Mr. Mattinson's fields, thence along the said fence to, and across the main-road leading to Ruthwaite and Ireby to Jane Beck, thence along Jane Beck in an easterly direction to the river Ellen, thence about one hundred and fifty yards along the river Ellen opposite to Mrs. Fothergill's fence, all in the parish of Ireby, which divides Seven Darricks and Far Flat meadows to the highway leading from Ireby to Uldale, thence along the east side of the said road to Woodhouse Plantation, thence along Woodhouse lonning to Mr. Cox's fence dividing Walker's fields to the road leading from Uldale to Aughtertree, thence in a northeasterly direction along the said road to Mr. Harrison's fence dividing Mr. Harrison's Fog Close field and Mr. Scott's New Close field, crossing the road leading from Aughtertree to Uldale Mill to the road leading to Pyerigg, thence along the south side of the said road to Mr. Scott's fence dividing Mr. Scott's Crofts, Skelton field, and cows meadows to the road leading from Aughtertree to Ireby, thence along the south side of the said road to Aughtertree Bridge, thence along the south side of Aughtertree-road and across the Dale-road to Mr. Nelson's fence dividing Orchard and Hogghouse fields to Longbank lonning, thence along the said lonning in a north-westerly direction to Cowx's hedge and to Mr. Foster's fences, thence to Hogg's Plantation and along the Reservoir stream to the river Ellen, and thence along the north side of the river

Ellen to Poplar Tree Wood aforesaid:

(7.) In the parishes of Allonby, Bromfield, Aspatria, Plumbland, Gileruix, and Crosscannonby, in the county of Cumberland, comprised within the following boundary, that is to say, commencing at Allonby Bay on the sea-board, thorse by the porth cost side of the Silloth word. thence by the north-east side of the Silloth-road to the Edderside-road, thence on the south-west side of the road to Edderside, Cowper Mealrigg, Westnewton and Yearngill to Sandwith Beck, along the said Beck in an easterly direction to Wellington Plantation, thence along the south side of the said Plantation fence to where it joins the Maryport and Carlisle Railway, thence along the south-west side of the said Railway to the bridge at Noble Temple joining the high-road feading from Aspatria to Parsonby, thence by the north side of the said high-road to Threpland Gill Beck, thence along the said Beck in a westerly direction to Threpland Quarry where it joins the high-road leading to Plumbland, thence along the north side of the said high-road to Guards, Gilcruix, Rosegill Colliery, Crosby Village, and Crosscannonby, and thence by the north side of the said road to Allonby Bay aforesaid: and

(8.) the borough of Workington,—
are, except such portion thereof as is included in
the Area described in Article 2 of this Order,
hereby declared to be free from pleuro-pneumonia,
and the Areas above described, except as aforesaid,
shall, as from the commencement of this Order,
cease to be Areas infected with pleuro-pneumonia.

2. The borough of Workington,—
shall continue to be and is hereby declared to be
an Area infected with pleuro-pneumonia.

3. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the eighth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and ninety.
