to the Aimiral commanded by the Sienr de Martel: in the dispute, the Sieur d' Almeras giving language of provocation, the Marquis returned it with a blow of his Cane, and has fent to complain to His Majesty of the affront offered

to him by the said Sieur d' A meras.

His Majesty has advanced 100000 Crowns for several Masts for his ships, growing in the Pyreneans, from whence they pretend to be furnished with as good serviceable ones as any are brought from the Northern parts. An offer being made to supply His Majesty with 600000 Crowns worth more, and for convenience of Transportation, a way is found by fluces to convey them to the Garonne.

The Venerian Amballador to this Court has three days fince dispayehr a Courier to inform that Republique that His Majesty has consented that 4000 Lorainers employ'd in his service shall immediately after the publication of the peace between the two Crowns be sent to assist them in their wars, and 'tis believed fome other of his French forces may be also joyned with them. The Duke of Lordin has by his Deputies rreated with the faid Ambassador, and tis said those forces will be o deted to march by Alfatia and Tirol, under the Command of the Count de Vaudemont.

Letters from Zante say, that General Morofini with 24 Gallies and 6 Galeass e shad engaged 50 Gallies of the Turks with 100 Saiques, that he Captain Baila and General Morofini were both killed, but the Turks were in the end defeated with much flaughter, and tis laid, the Viner thereupon has raised his Siegesthe confirmation with the particulars we may fuddenly expect.

The Swifles have fince the leparation of their Assembly at Balen, drawn their forces logether in two distinct bo-dies to the number of so thouland able fighting men, but

as yet have not re olged upon action.

From t e F ontiers we have notice that a prey drawn out of Cambras, marched lately towards Chastelet, near which place they fee fire to three Villages; and from Luxemburg they write that a confiderable party marching out from Arion had surprifed 120 of the F ench horse as they were forrageing in the Countrey, of which the Duke of Luxemburg having intelligence, was with a thouland men marched with an intention to recover them.

Quartermafters.
Tis faid that a confiderable part of the Forces new upon the Frontiers, may be emertained in the Bishop of Munsters Service, and the E ofter of Cologne's 5 and that part of the the Infantry may march to the affiftance of the Duke of Sa! voy, who ('is given out) is sclolved to oblige the Republick of Geneva to persuit the free Exercise of the Roman Retigion in their City 5 and hopes by his Majesties assistance to carry on his Deli .n. although the Swiffes their Allyes should cipouse their Interest.

Some few days have the Cantons, of Swifferland sent a Letter to his Majestyn the Contents whereof are not yet known, his Majesty refusing to receive it as being dissatisfied with their proceeding in their Assembly fince thetaking of Francle Comit.

His Majefty intends of all-his Army to Reform 500 Companies of Foot, each of them to be commanded by 4. Captains, with 25. men in each Division, and 40. Troops of Ho.fe.

Eruges, May 23. Notwithstanding the great progress which is made in the Treaty of Peace between the two Crowns, these Countries remain still very jealous and apprehensive of the intentions of the French; They continuing still their Leaguer at Bellum, beween this City and Ghent, and keeping guard upon the two Bridges which they lately made upon the Rivet 3 but have not of late exercited any acts of hostility; their Army is within two or three dayer encreased by the accession of three or four thoufand men from Lille and Tourney. The Dake of Grequy commands in the Leaguer; to whom are lately come several great Officers from France. Great numbers of Carriagehorles are provided at Lille, and firme hundreds of Malons and Carpenters are come down to Desnie & forther they are every way provided for the carrying on of the war y if the timely arrival of the Ratification from Spain prevent them

26th of this present moneth.

trey contributaries to them.
