And Our further will and pleasure is that you do not interfere to prevent the free publication of all or any such metrical Psalm Book, Book of Common Prayer, Confession of Faith, and Larger or Shorter Catechism, and of such Acts of Parliament, Edicis, Proclamations, or other papers not purporting to be printed by Our Authority.

Provided always that nothing herein contained shall he held or construed to affect the rights and privileges of existing licensees in regard to the printing and publication of Acts of Parliament, Edicts, Proclamations, or other such papers. V.R.

5. A person in a state of intoxication shall not be allowed to enter or mount upon any carriage, and if found in or upon any carriage shall be immediately removed by or under the direction of the conductor.

6. No person shall swear or use obscene or offensive language whilst in or upon any carriage, or commit any nuisance in or upon or against any carriage, or wilfully interfere with the comfort of any passenger.

7. No person shall wilfuily cut, tear, soil, or damage the cushions or the linings, or remove or deface any number plate, printed or other notice, in or on the carriage, or break or scratch any window of, or otherwise wilfully damage, any carriage. Any person acting in contravention of this Regulation shall be liable to the penalty prescribed by these Bye-laws and Regulations, in addition to the liability to pay the amount of any damage done.

8. A person whose dress or clothing might, in the opinion of a conductor of a carriage, soil or injure the linings or cushions of a carriage, or the dress or clothing of any passenger, or a person who, in the opinion of the conductor, might for any other reason be offensive to passengers, shall not be entitled to enter or remain in or upon any carriage, and may be prevented from mounting any carriage, and shall not mount any carriage after having been requested not to do so by the conductor, and if found upon any carriage shall, on the request of the conductor, leave the carriage upon the fare, if previously paid, being returned.

9. Each passenger shall, upon demand, pay to the conductor, or other duly authorized officer of the Company, the fare legally demandable for each and every stage.
