

(PLEURO-PNEUMONIA.)

By the Board of Agriculture.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Board of Agriculture Act, 1889, and The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1890, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Place (namely),—the byre, shed, yard, and premises at Gibson-terrace, in the burgh of Edinburgh, in the occupation of Mr. James Grieve, Cowfeeder,—which was declared by Order of the Board dated the sixth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, to be a Place infected with pleuro-pneumonia, is hereby declared to be free from pleuro-pneumonia, and that Place shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be a Place infected with pleuro-pneumonia.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the sixteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety.

GULF OF BOTHNIA—SWEDISH COAST.

NORDMALING FIORD.

WITH reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 622 (1, 2) of 1890, on the exhibition of a flashing light on Storbadan, Nordmaling Fiord entrance, and Krikeudde, eastern shore of the fiord:—

The following amended limits of the sectors shown from those lights have been received from the Norwegian Government:—

(1.) *Storbadan Light—Amended Limits of Sectors.*

Storbadan Light, flashing, shows white from the bearing of S. 81° E., through north, to N. 68° W., and within the fiord towards Krikeudde from S. 7° W. to S. 45° W.; red over Jarnäsgrund and other shoals within Jarnäsudde from S. 45° W. to N. 68° W.; in a north-westerly direction the light is obscured.

Position, lat. 63° 24' 35" N., long 19° 35' 45" E.
