His Majesty in Council was this day pleased to Order the Right Honourable the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of England, to Appoint sit Persons to offer a Bind to the Masters of Ships that shall go out of the Downes, or other Port or Harbour of this Kingdom, to the Parts above-mentioned, to be Entred into by the said Masters of Ships, whereby they shall stand obliged in the Penalty of Forty Shillings per Tun for the whole Burthen of take Ship, neither directly nor indirectly to cause or suffering one or more English Sailor or Sailors more than the Number given in upon Glearing at the Custom-house, and alwed by Mis Majesty, to be taken or kept on Board; And that in case any Masters of Ships permitted to go Out, shall Refuse or Delay to Enter into such Bond, a Step or Embargo be laid upon the said Ships, until such Bonds be Entred into by the Masters respectively; The Persons appointed to Scarch the said Ships, being likewise directed to Publish and make known, As it is hereby Ordered and Declared, That if any Sailor, Passenger, or other Person, shall discover the Fraudulent Dealing of any Master herein, the Person discovering the same, shall receive for a Reward of his or their Service One fourth part of the Value that shall accure to His Majesty by the Forseiture of each Bond respectively. And on the 2d, the Vandois defeated another French Party that was going to Casal, and took 48. Priseners. Our Camp has been lately reinforced by some Spanish Fost and Horse, and we are daily expecting 800 Neapolitans. Paris, November 18. A French Party came the last week to English, and another of 1200 Horse marched at the same time to Geersbergen with a design to burn the neighbouring Villages, but our Troops quartered thereabours drawing together, the French upon their approach retired with 21l the halt they could. On our side Lieutenant-General d'Hubuy is posted with 8 Squadrons of Horse at Nivelle, and strong Garisons are put into all the Frontier Places. We hear, that the Duke of Luxemburg is expected shortly at Life.
