NORTH AMERICA -- WEST COAST. -- CALIFORNIA-San Diego Bay.

Point Loma - Establishment of a New Light, and discontinuance of Existing Light.

THE United States Government has given notice, that on 23rd March, 1891, a light will be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected near the south extreme of Point Loma, western side of entrance to San Diego Bay; and that on the same date, the light now shown from the summit of Point Loma will be discontinued:

The light to be exhibited on Point Loma will be a flashing light of the third order, showing red and white flashes alternately, with an interval of twenty seconds between the flashes. It will be elevated 88 feet above high water, and should be visible in clear weather from a distance of 15 miles.

The lighthouse consists of a square, pyramidal, iron framework, surmounted by a room and lantern, the whole painted brown; it stands about 28 yards southward of two frame dwellings, painted white, with red roofs, and is situated approximately with the old lighthouse bearing north, distant three-eighths of a mile, and the south-east angle of Coronado Hotel N.E. by e. 🖁 e.

Light-Vess & Marking Dangerous Sunken Wreck Westward of Weser Light-Vessel, and Amended Pusition.

WITH reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 112 of 1831, that a steam vessel was lying sunk (her masts showing above water) with Weser Light-vessel bearing about E. by S., distant 20 miles, or in approximately lat. 53° 53' N., long. 7° 16′ E.:-

The German Government has given notice, dated 7th March, 1891, that as soon as the weather permits, a light-vessel will be placed about 11 cables northward of the wreck:

The wreck-marking vessel has three pole masts, is painted red, and has the word "Wreck" in white letters on a black ground on her sides, and will exhibit the usual balls and lights, indicating that vessels should pass on that side of her on which two balls or two lights are shown. She carries the German ensign at the taffrail, with the pilot flag.

Vessels (within signal distance of the wreckmarking vessel; seen standing into danger, will be warned by a gun fired twice at intervals of three minutes, by strokes of a bell, or signals made by the International Code.

Amended approximate position of wreck, lat. 53°, 50½' N., long. 7° 17' E.

The Italian Government has given notice, that 15th March, 1891, the light would be exhibited:

Point Vergogna Light is a flashing white light every ten seconds, visible through an arc of 250°, or from the bearing of S. 73° E., through south, to N. 3° W. It is elevated 105 feet above the sea, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of about 16 miles.

Navigation in the North Sca.

IN consequence of the considerable number of British vessels that ground off the coasts of Holland, when bound through the North Sea, it is thought desirable to call the attention of Mariners to the absolute necessity for the use of the lead when nearing or passing along this shore in thick weather, as mentioned in North Sea Pilot, Part IV 1887, pages 40.43

IV, 1887, pages 40-42.

Apart from the tidal streams, the currents in the North Sea are uncertain both in direction and strength, and being sensibly affected by the winds, may at times set directly towards the shore, the safety of vessels therefore can in thick weather only be assured by timely use of the lead, and mariners should be prepared, on getting into shallow water, to anchor or stand off the land as circumstances may require. Reference to the charts shows that by keeping outside the depth of 12 or 10 fathoms a vessel would in most cases be in safety, but this does not apply to the approaches to the Texel, where the water quickly shoals from 10 fathoms to the outlying sands.

CANADA.—GULF OF ST. LAWRENCE.

(1.) Anticosti Island—Foul Ground Reported off
South Coast.

WITH reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 649 of 1890, on the possible extension seaward of the recf westward of South Point, Anticosti Island; and on which a British steam ship had been wrecked:—

The Government of the Dominion of Canada has given notice, dated 20th January, 1891, that the position of the steam ship "Idaho," wrecked in the summer of 1890 off South Point, indicates that dangerous reefs extend farther seaward than was previously charted. The wreck is stated to lie about 2 miles off shore, with South Point lighthouse bearing E. by S. distant about 3 miles, on a ledge of sand over limestone, about one cable in extent, with a depth of 21 feet on it, and deeper water around.

Note.—Information derived from the Masters of coasting vessels leads to the inference that foul ground extends farther seaward than charted, at different points between South and Heath points, and Mariners are reminded that the survey of this dangerous and inhospitable shore is very incomplete, and that it is exceedingly undesirable to

close the shore without due cause.

Mariners are also warned that the fog whistle and horn at South Point Lighthouse appear under certain conditions of the atmosphere to be inaudible at any serviceable distance. A test of this alarm made last July showed that it was wholly inaudible from a vessel in dangerous proximity to the reefs lying off the lighthouse, while at the same time it was audible at a distance of five or six miles down the coast. Under these circumstances Mariners are advised not to try to make this point in thick weather.

(2.) St. Anne Point—Discontinuance of Fog Signal.

Also, dated 12th February, 1891, that the steam fog horn heretofore maintained at St. Anne Point, south shore of the Gulf of St. Lawrence, is not of sufficient use to justify its continuance, and that consequently it will be discontinued on the opening of navigation this spring.

Approximate position, lat. 49° 8' N., long.

66° 3๋3′ W.

Note.—It is contemplated, during the season of navigation in 1891, to estathlish fog signals at Cape Mugdalen and Cape Chatte Lighthouses, south shore of Gulf of St. Lawrence. Should this be done, due notice will be given.

CANADA.—RIVER ST. LAWRENCE.
(1.) Crane Island Light—Intended Alteration in Character.

THE Government of the Dominion of Canada

has given notice, that on the opening of navigation in the spring of 1891, the following alteration will be made in the character of the light on the outer extreme of the wharf at Crane Island, River St. Lawrence :-

Crane Island Light will be an occulting white light every half minute, visible for a period of twenty-six seconds, and eclipsed four seconds. It will be elevated 48 feet above high water, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of

The illuminating apparatus will be dioptric, or by lenses, of the sixth order.

Approximate position, latitude 47° 3' N., longitude 70° 38' W.

Note.—No further notice will be given of the above alteration, unless unforeseen circumstances prevent its being carried out at the time specified.

> (2.) Less Depths between St. Croix and Richelieu Rapids.

Also, dated 20th January, 1891, that soundings recently taken between St. Croix and Richelieu Rapids (above Quebec), river St. Lawrence, indicate less depths than those heretofore charted, and that it is not safe to count upon more than 22 feet at low water in parts of the channel fairway in this reach of the river.

(3.) Leading Beacons on the Platon.

Also, of the same date, that two leading beacons have been erected on the Platon (above Quebec) to indicate the middle of the ship channel recently surveyed, at the Barre à Boulard, Richelieu Rapids, river St. Lawrence :-

The front beacon on the Platon consists of a rectangular frame structure, 18 feet high and 18 feet wide, on two posts 50 feet in height; it is painted white, with a black vertical stripe (3½ feet in width) down the middle, and the top is 170 feet above high water. It is situated 820 yards N. 42° E. from Platon Back Lighthouse, on and near the edge of the cliff.

Approximate position, latitude 46° 39′ 35″ N., longitude 71° 52′ 45″ W.

The back beacon on the Platon is similar to the front beacon, but stands on posts 37 feet high, and the top is 234 feet above high water. It is situated on high land, showing against the sky, and bears N. 70° E. from the back beacon, distant 900 yards.

Note.-Vessels proceeding down the river should keep the abovementioned beacons in line bearing E. by N. 3 N. from abreast Merant Islet until Lotbinière leading lighthouses come in line; the least depth in this channel is 22 feet at low water. For vessels proceeding up the river the same directions reversed hold good.
