Jamaica, August 31.

**T**HE 29th of July last, the Negroes, belonging to Mr. *Sutton's* Plantation in the Mountains, being about 400, broke into Rebellion, and having forced the House, and killed the Man that look'd to it, they seized upon 50 Fuzees, Blunderbusses, and other Arms, a great quantity of Powder and Shot, four small Field-Pieces, and other Provisions, and marching to the next Plantation, killed the Overseer, and would have persecuted the Negroes there to joyn with them, but they hid themselves in the Woods; then they returned back, preparing to defend themselves in the great House. But the Alarm being given through the Quarters, about 50 Horse and Foot marched towards them, and being joyned by other Parties, the next day they attack'd the Negroes, who had taken into the Canes, firing them as they went. But a Party of our Men falling upon their Rear, routed them, and sent thirty Men in pursuit of them several Miles, who killed divers of them; and afterwards about 200 of them came in, and as many others being found dead of their Wounds, we look upon this Rebellion as quite over.

**Cardiz, October 24.** The Governor of this place has received Orders from *Madrid*, to send a Vessel to *Tetuan* for the Ambassador of the Emperor of *Morocco*, who is coming hither to Treat about the Rankom of the Spaniards taken the last year at *Larache*. Our Fleet from *New-Spain* is expected here the next Month.

**Rome, November 11.** The Pope having appointed a Congregation of Cardinals to consult about the present State of Affairs in *Christendom*, and particularly to consider how he may be able to give the most effectual Assistances for the vigorous prosecution of the War against the Turks, they have had lately several Meetings on this Subject, and are at present chiefly taken up to find out ways of raising supplies of Money for the War in *Hungary*. The Pope's Gallies, that served in the *Levant* this Summer, are daily expected at *Civita Vecchia*, together with the Land Forces, the number whereof will be considerably encreased the next year, when they return to the assistance of the Venetians. This week passed through this place a Courier from *Milan*, who was going to *Naples* with Orders, as we are assured, to the Viceroy of that Kingdom, to furnish 300000 Crowns, to be paid to the Duke of *Savoy* for the use of the War.

**Sawarow in Poland, October 28.** The Court returned hither this week from *Zolkiew*. The Bishop of *Possie* is likewise come to this place with a very splendid Train, to receive the King's late Instructions concerning the Solemn Embassy, which he is designed to be employed in, to the Courts at *Vienna* and *Neubourg*, for the performing the Ceremonies of the Marriage between the Prince of *Poland* and the Princess *Elizabeth* of *Neubourg*, and the conducting the Princess hither. We hear, that the Tarrars have put a new Conroy of Provisions into *Cavutiac*, and that dividing themselves afterwards into several Parties, they made Incursions into our frontier Provinces, where they took divers Slaves, and destroyed great part of the Forage that was laid up for the subsistence of our Horse in their Winter Quarters. Our Troops, upon notice of this Inruption,

immediately drew together, and pursuing the Enemy, recovered part of the Booty they had got, and took several Prisoners; who reported, That the 6000 Tartars that were sent to the assistance of Count *Teckelej*, and were entred with him into *Transilvania*, had abandoned him, upon the approach of the Imperial Army commanded by Prince *Louis* of *Baden*; That the Troops of *Moldavia* and *Valachia* are likewise gone home, and that *Teckelej* himself was retiring in great disorder towards *Valachia*. The King of *Poland* has summoned a great Council to meet here, to consult about the present Juncture of Affairs, and the Preparations to be made against the next year. The Forces of this Crown posted at *Saczow*, and other places in *Moldavia*, have so well fortified themselves, that they do not fear any attempt the Enemy can make upon them this Winter; A Party of Moldavians advanced lately near to *Saczow*, with a design to have seized upon our Horses that were feeding in the Meadows hard by, but the Garrison being informed of it, sent out a Detachment, who put them to flight, and took several Prisoners. All the Letters from *Moscow* say, that the Czars make vast Preparations of War through all their Dominions, in order to invade the *Crim Tartary* the next Spring.

**From the Imperial Camp near Reps in Transilvania, November 3.** The Endeavours of our General to engage *Teckelej* to a Battel having been frustrated, by his retiring still as we advanced towards him, keeping always 5 or 6 Leagues before us, Prince *Louis* tryed to surprize him, to which end having sent his Foot and Baggage to *Medjes*, and secured the Passes on the left hand in the Country of *Giorgio*, by which the Enemy might have got to *Bistritz* or *Clausenburg*, he decamped the 23d past in the night with his Cavalry, and having marched 6 Hungarian Leagues in one day, came to the River *Alta*, and passed the same near *Mariembourg*, before *Teckelej* had any notice of his march, who being the 25th in the morning informed of the near approach of our Forces, and finding he must either fight, or quit *Transilvania*, he chose the latter, and retired with great precipitation and disorder, through the Pass of *Borza* into *Valachia*. Prince *Louis* sent out several Parties after him, who took part of his Baggage; and we hear since, that *Teckelej* is fled to *Tergovista*, the Capital City of *Valachia*, and that the Turks and Tartars that were with him are gone home, the first by the way of *Nicopolis*, and the others by *Braila*. After this, Prince *Louis* having provided for the Guard of the Passes towards *Moldavia* and *Valachia*, on the first instant separated his Forces, consisting of about 15000 men. Eight of the strongest Regiments under General *Veterani*, who is to command in *Transilvania* this Winter, are to remain near *Cronstadt* till the Passes thereabouts are farther secured by the Snow, and Prince *Louis* will march with the rest towards *Clausenburg*, where he intends to expect the Emperor's Orders about their Winter Quarters.

**Ratsbonne, November 23.** The news of *Teckelej's* being driven out of *Transilvania*, with the loss of part of his Baggage, was brought 2 or 3 days ago to Prince *Herman* of *Baden*, (the Emperor's first Commissioner at the Dyet) by an Express, who having

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ving deliver'd his Letters here, went on to *Newbourg*, to carry this advice to the Elector Palatine. Yesterday the Imperial Commissioner communicated to the Dyet the Emperor's Approbation of their late Conclusions about the Restitution of the Duchies of *Lorraine* and *Deuxponts*, and the Guaranty of the Alliance with the Duke of *Savoy*. Containing in substance, as follows.

*His Imperial Majesty* having been made acquainted with the Conclusion of the States assembled here, on the 29th of August last, concerning the Dutchy of *Lorraine*, and having well considered the Contents thereof, does not only think it reasonable, and for the common Good of the Empire, but likewise looks upon himself to be obliged, together with the whole Empire, as well in consideration of the several Treaties and Alliances established between the Empire and the House of *Lorraine*, as of the extraordinary Services done to his Imperial Majesty, the Empire, and all Christendom, by the late Duke of *Lorraine*, to procure to his Heirs and Successors, Dukes of *Lorraine* and *Barr*, a full Restitution of all the Duchies and Lands, of which they are unjustly dispossessed by the Crown of *France*, with Reparation for the Damages and Losses they have sustained; and to that end, that the Ministers of *Lorraine*, when a Treaty of Peace shall be set on foot, shall be admitted thereunto, and furnished with the necessary Passports. And therefore his Imperial Majesty does confirm and strengthen with his Imperial Authority the said Conclusion of the Dyet.

*His Imperial Majesty* having seen the Memorial presented in the name of the King of *Sueden* as *Pfalzgraf* of the *Rhine*, concerning the Dukedom of *Deuxpontz*, which the French have forcibly possessed themselves of, and the Conclusion of the Dyet taken thereupon on the 30th of October last, does confirm and approve thereof, and will endeavour in the most effectual manner the performance of the same.

*His Imperial Majesty* being informed of the Conclusion of the Dyet on the 2d of October, concerning the Guaranty of the Treaty Concluded between his Imperial Majesty and the Duke of *Savoy*, he does approve and confirm the same.

*Frankfort*, November 30. The Deputies from the States of *Franconia* have had several Conferences with the *Saxon* Commissaries about the Winter Quarters for those Troops, and we hear, that all Matters are adjusted between them, and that the said Forces will be lodged near the *Rhine* and the *Neckar*, to protect the Country against the IncurSIONS of the Garrison of *Philipsburg*. They write from *Muncken*, that the Elector of *Bavaria* has resolved to assist the Emperor with 4000 men, who will begin their march towards *Hungary* some time the next Month; and that his Electoral Highness intends to take very suddenly a Journey to *Vienna*, to concert with that Court the Preparations for the next Campaign.

*Hamburg*, December 1. The *Suedish* Auxiliary Troops are come back from the *Rhine*, and are going into their Winter Quarters in *Pomeran* and *Bremen*. The Elector of *Brandenburg* arrived the 27th of the last Month at *Hanover*.

*Falmouth*, November 27. Yesterday came in here the *Antelope* of *London* from *Jamaica*, having about 3 weeks ago been separated in bad weather from the rest of her Company.

*Plymouth*, November 30. The 24th instant arrived here the *Richard* and *Sarah*, and the 26th the *Endeavour*, both belonging to *London*, and homeward bound from *Jamaica*. Yesterday failed from hence Their Majesties Ships the *Porosmouth*, the *Mitford*, *Pembroke*, and *Nantwich*, to the Westward. And this afternoon we discovered several Sail in the *Offin*, which is supposed to be the Squadron commanded by Sir *Claude* Shove.
