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Madrid, November 15.

Their Catholick Majesties are returned hither from the *Escorial*. The Council is at present taken up about sending considerable Supplies of Money to *Flanders* and *Milan*. Count *Mansfeld*, the Emperor's Ambassador, is gone home by the way of *Italy*; and the Count *de Lobowitz*, who is now here, expects Orders from *Vienna* to succeed him in that Employment. We are told, that Directions have been sent to *Cadix*, to hasten out the Squadron of Men of War that are designed to go and meet the *New-Spain* Fleet, which is now suddenly expected home. The Letters from *Lisbon* inform us, that the *Infanta* of *Portugal* died there the 21st of the last Month, in the 22th year of her Age.

Venice, November 18. The new Captain-General *Mocenigo* will part from hence the next week for the *Levant*, and with him will be sent a great Convoy of Provisions and Ammunition. The Duke *de Guadagny*, General of our Land Forces, is arrived here from *Vallona*, and is now performing his Quarters. He left the Fleet ready to sail for *Corfou*; and several hundred Men at work to fortify *Vallona*, in which they proceed with the more diligence, because it is believed the Turks will endeavour, with the first opportunity, to recover that place. The Senate give out Commissions daily for new Levies, and several Ships and Gallies are building in the Arsenal here, which will be ready to joyn our Fleet in the Spring. We have an account from *Cypris*, that a new *Bassa* was arrived there from *Constantinople*, and that having drawn together the *Ottoman* Troops in that Island, he had attack'd, and, after a sharp dispute, routed the Natives that were in Arms against the Turks, killing about 300 of them, and taking divers Prisoners. The *Ottoman* Fleet was by our late advice still at *Foos*, the Ships of *Argiers* and *Tow* having left them, pretending they had orders to return home.

Basse, November 21. The Dyet of the *Swiss* Cantons, held at *Baden*, is broke up, after having unanimously resolved to oppose, with all their power, the new Works the French design to make at *Hunningen*. The French Ambassador has desired 3 weeks time to acquaint the King his Master with this their Resolution, and to receive his Orders thereupon; And in the mean time we hear from *Hunningen*, that a stop is given to those Works. The said Cantons have likewise resolved to protect the Bishoprick of *Basse*, and the Forest Towns.

Milan, November 22. All the news we have from *Piedmont*, is, that the French Troops, since the taking of *Susa*, are going into their Winter Quarters. And that the Marquis *de la Barre*, who with 4000 *Savoyards* had possessed himself of *Chaftaux Dauphin*, designed to make an Incurfion into *Dauphine*.

Vienna, November 23. The Officer who arrived here some days ago from *Transilvania*, with the news of *Teckley's* having been forced to abandon that Country, and to retire into *Valachia*, is sent back with Orders to Prince *Louis* about the disposi-

tion of his Army into Winter Quarters. This week passed by here by Water the Regiments of Foot of *Chizzola* and *Caunitz* in their way to *Hungary*; The Horse march by Land. The Pope has remitted to this Court 10000 Florins, to be employed in the War against the Turks; for which, vigorous Preparations are making here, the Emperor resolving to have in *Hungary*, early the next year, an Army of 50000 effective Men. The Imperial Garrison of *Orfowa* hold out yet, though attack'd by 10 Pieces of Cannon and 3 Mortars, (which were designed to be sent to *Teckley*) and are like still to do so, the Turks employed in the Siege of that place beginning to want Ammunition, and the ill weather growing very uneasy to them. The Letters from *Lemberg* of the 7th instant tell us, that the Polish Court continued still at *Zolkiew*, and would stay there till the return of an Express sent lately hither, for the final conclusion of the Marriage between the Prince of *Poland* and the Princess Palatine of *Neubourg*. The same Advices say, that the Tartars had conveyed a great quantity of Provisions into *Caminiec*, and had afterwards made an Incursion into the Polish Territories, where they burnt 5 large Villages, and carried away a great number of People.

Vienna, November 30. This week came in Letters of the 14th instant from *Transilvania*, which gave an account, that Prince *Louis* was come with 11 Imperial Regiments to *Englt* near *Clausenburg*, and that he had ordered a strong Detachment towards the River *Theys*, the rest of his Forces being appointed to have their Winter Quarters in *Transilvania*; That on the 13th most of the Nobility and Gentry of that Country came to wait upon him in his Camp; That the young Prince *Abassi* was at *Clausenburg* and would remain there all the Winter; That 300 of the *Siculi*, who had joyned with *Teckley*, and were now returning home, were pursued by our Troops, and most of them cut in pieces; That great dissensions were risen in *Palschia*, upon account of *Teckley's* rigorous exacting of Winter Quarters; And that the famous Raician Captain *Antonio* had ravaged and destroyed a great part of that Country. At the same time we received the confirmation of the Turks having taken *Lippa*, which was besieged by the Grand Visier in Person, and after a vigorous resistance, obtained Conditions for the Garrison to march to *Sagedin* with their Arms and Baggage; The Turks lost in that Siege 800 Men, and the Garrison 40; These Letters said farther, That General *Nigrelli* being inform'd, that the Turks had a design upon the Bridge of *Zoinock*, that they might be Masters of a Pass on the *Theys*, he hastened thither with the Regiment of *Scheitke* to oppose them. The 28th arrived here an Express with Letters of the 19th from Prince *Louis*, which say, that he was advanced with the Imperial Regiments to *Simojivar*, upon the Confines of *Upper Hungary*, and had sent 4 Regiments before to observe the Enemies motions, designing to follow by the way of *Magybaria* towards *Zatmar*, so soon as the Officer he had sent hither (who went away last Saturday) was come back to him. 'Tis expected that he will shortly return hither, leaving the command of the Army with General *Veterani*, who has orders to use his utmost Endeavours for the Relief of our Troops, that are posted in the Island of *Orfowa*. Yesterday arrived here an Express from General *Nigrelli* with an account, that he was at *Zoinock*, waiting the Enemies motions, who in a great Body were encamped between *Debrezin* and *St Job*, which last place they had summoned to surrender, but were answered by the Governour, That General *Nigrelli* kept the Keys of the Town, and that he would receive no more Messages from them.

We hear, that *Teckley* has given General *Haußler* his liberty, taking *Hoffack* for the payment of his Ransom. They write from *Efflack*, that the *Turks* have entirely quit-*ted Selaworia*. The Marriage between the Prince of *Po-land* and the Princess of *Neuburg* is finally concluded.

Nordingen, November 22. The Deputies of the *Circles of Suabia and Franconia* have had several Meetings in this City, to consult about the Troops they intend to raise against the next Campaign; They have before them a Project for 12000 Men, and it's believed they will agree to it.

Frankfurt, December 6. The French Troops that drew lately together near *Kayfelauterne*, and were thought to have a design upon *Mentz*, are retired again, after having demolished the Walls of *Alzey*, and some other small places. In the mean time the Garrison of *Mentz* has been reinforced, and several Regiments of *Hesse* are expected in 2 or 3 days at *Hochbii* and *Koungstein*, who are to be posted in the Archbishoprick of *Mentz* on this side the *Rhine*. The Prince de *Vaudemont* passed some days ago through this place in his Journey towards *Italy*.

Mentz, December 5. The Enemy gave us an alarm the last week, by their assembling together in a considerable Body about *Wormes*, upon which our Garrison was reinforced with three Regiments of *Hesse*. But they are since drawn back, and seem to have had no other design than to demolish *Alzey*, *Oderheim*, and some other places on that side, which they heard the Confederates intended to possess themselves of. Our Elector is gone to *Alshaffenburgh*, where he intends to reside this Winter.

Cologne, December 5. The Generals of the *Brandenburg* and *Munster* Forces, quartered within this Diocese, have had several Conferences at *Nuis*, to consider how the said Troops may be most advantageously posted for the security of the Country, and the annoyance of the Enemy during the Winter. The Count de *Cominsseke* is shortly expected here, to settle several publick Affairs in the name of the Elector of *Cologne*, who does not yet think it convenient to repair hither himself. We hear from *Trier*, that the French have laid a Bridge of Boats over the *Moselle*, and that they are making great Provision of Forage in that place.

Paris, December 4. The Advices from *Piedmont* say, that Monsieur *Catinat* had separated his Troops, in order to put them into Winter Quarters in *Savoy*, *Dauphine*, and *Languedoc*; and that the Marquis de *Larre* is to command in *Dauphine* this Winter, and Monsieur de *la Hoquette* in *Savoy*. Signior *Nicolini*, the Pope's Nuncio, has had a private Audience of the King at *Versailles*. This week was published here the Edict for the Creation of the two new Presidents, and the other Officers in the Parliament of *Paris*.

Brussels, December 6. The Marquis de *St. George*, who lately commanded a Regiment of the Duke of *Savoy's* Subjects in *France*, with his Lieutenant-Colonel, Major, 10 Captains, and 25 Subalternes, are arrived here, having quitted that Service, and designing to return home. The French burnt the last week several Houses near *Mons*, and carried away some Cattel, though not without the loss of several of their Company, who were killed by a Party of the Garrison that sallied out upon them. Our Governor has ordered the Castle of *Sansjon* near *Namur* to be demolished.

Elzue, December 12. The news we have from *England*, that the King will be here suddenly, has hastened the Preparations for His Majesties Reception; There will be 4 Triumphal Arches, and several Fireworks, the finest that have yet been seen. Two days ago arrived here 80 of the Dutch Guards du Corps from *England*, with some of His Majesties Horses. The Heer *Van Dickvelt* is going for *Flanders*, to confer on the part of this State with the Governor of the *Spanish Netherlands*.

Falmouth, December 1. On Saturday last a Vessel of this Port called the *Sarah and Dorothea*, being hired to carry the *Spanish Mail* to the *Groyne*, was taken in her Voyage thither by a French Privateer of 22 Guns, but the Mail was thrown over Board. The French agreed with the Master for the Vessel and the liberty of the Seamen, who returned hither this morning, the Master remaining on board the Privateer for the security of the payment of the Money. This Accident will not hinder the continuing the passage of the Mails to the *Groyne* by other Vessels at the appointed times, there being three excellent Sailors of good force designed for that Service.

Plmouth, December 2. Yesterday morning Sir *Clouesly Skovell*, with their Majesties Ships under his command, came to an Anchor here in the *Sound*, and it's said, he will sail again to-morrow to the Westward.

Whitehall, Decemb. 5. His Majesty has been pleased to appoint *Alexander Rigby* of *Latou* Esq; to be High-Sheriff of the County Palatine of *Lancaster* for the Year ensuing.

His Majesty being graciously pleased to confer a mark of his Royal Favour upon Colonel *John Cates*, for his faithful Services and zealous Affection to his Royal Person and Government, has thought fit to Create him a Baron of the Kingdom of *Ireland*, by the Style and Title of Baron Cutts of *Gowran* in the said Kingdom.
