COQUET ISLAND HIGH LIGHT.

Intended Alteration in Character.

THE Trinity House, London, has given notice, that towards the end of October, 1891, both the high and low lights on Coquet Island will be considerably increased in power, and the character of the high light will be altered from fixed, as at present, to an occulting light, giving one occultation every minute.
