Turin, November 18.

**T**HE late Governor of *Susa*, and several of the Principal Officers of that Garison, are now Prisoners here, and it's believed they will be Tryed by a Council of War. The Duke of *Savoy* has named the Marquis *du Pre* to go his Ambassador to the Emperor, the Count de *Prinds* is designed in the same Quality to *England*, and the Prince *della Siferina* to *Spain*. Our Army lyes between *Susa* and *Rivole* to observe the Enemy, but in all appearance the Troops on both sides will now quickly be going into their Winter Quarters. The Marquis *de Parelle* is with 5000 Men near *Chasteau Dumbin*, and we expect every day to hear of his being advanced farther towards *Dauphine*. Eight hundred French Protestants marched from hence on Monday last to joyn him.

*Venice, November 24.* The new Captain General is making Preparations for his departure to the *Levant*, his Baggage begins to be shipped to morrow, and it's believed, he will Embark himself the beginning of the next week. On Monday last Signior *Sebastiaen Soranzo* made his Publick Entry, and took possession of his new Dignity of Procurator of *St. Mark*. Divers Officers are come hither to Treat about new Levies.

*Warsaw, Novemb. 24.* The Marriage being finally concluded between the Prince of *Poland* and the Princess of *Neuburg*, the Bishop of *Pozna* will set out in few days on his Embassy to the Courts at *Vienna* and *Neuburg*, in order to Conduct the Princess hither, for whose Reception preparations are already making here and at *Cracow*. The Tatars continue to do a great deal of mischief on our Frontiers.

*Vienna, November 30.* Some Officers that escaped from *Belgrade* have given a particular relation of the unfortunate loss of that place, which differing in many particulars from what has been commonly reported, we here give you the substance thereof. The Garison consisted of 5000 serviceable Men, and was sufficiently provided with all Necessaries, so that had not that unlucky accident of firing the Magazine happened, they would have despised all the force and stratagems of the Turks; The Grand Visier had drawn a Line of Communication quite round from the *Danube* to the *Savo*, and from thence Parallel Lines of Approach to the Counter-scarp, which was yet untouch'd on the morning of that fatal day, when a Bomb set fire to the Tower of that day, the Enemy having with them extraordinary good French Engineers, who pointed their Cannon and Mortar-pieces so justly, as to do the Garison great mischief. The Fire (in all appearance) was quenched without much damage, but about 4 in the afternoon the Magazine in the Castle blew up, at the time that 1500 Men were drawn out to relieve the Guard, who were almost all either killed or wounded, and half buried in Stones and Rubbish, and besides these, almost an entire Regiment were killed in the Castle by a heap of prepared Grana-

does, which there took fire. The Turks, upon this sudden noise and confusion, gave a vigorous assault to the Counter-scarp, and were twice bravely repulsed by the Guards that remained there, but fresh numbers of the Enciny coming on, and no Relief being sent from the Town, and the other Magazines blowing up likewise with an astonishing noise, our Men at the third Assault began to give ground, upon which the Turks leaped over the Palisadoes, and entered with them pell mell into the Town. In this Confusion about 1500 Men that remained un-wounded in *Belgrade* made their escape, and the Turks possessed themselves of the Town and Castle, the Fortifications, contrary to what has been formerly said, remaining for the most part entire, and in the same condition they were when the Siege began; General *Alpremont*, who was Governor, and is now a Prisoner here, is to be tryed this week by a Council of War, of which General *Dunewald* is President. From *Gronia* there are Letters of the 19th instant, which advise, that the Troops there, under the command of the Bar and Vice-Bar, were obliged by the bad weather to separate, but so, as in a days time, upon occasion, they may be drawn together again.

*Berlin, Decemb. 5.* Their Electoral Highnesses of *Brandenburg* arrived here last Night from *Hanover*. The Elector has given out Commissions for the raising of 4000 Men.

*Hamburg, Decemb. 8.* Two Regiments are raising here and at *Lubecke* for the Emperors Service. Here are new Levies likewise making for the Duke of *Hanover*. The last Letters from *Stockholme* say, That the Count *de Staremburg*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor, arrived there the 26th of the last Month, and had a private Audience of the King of *Sweden* the next day.

*Cologne, Decemb. 8.* General *Berk*, who commanded the *Neubourg* Troops the last year, is on his departure from hence for *Vienna*, being to serve in *Hungary*. The Quarters are now settled for the *Brandenburg* and *Munster* Troops that are to Winter within this Diocesis. Considerable Magazines are providing in this City, *Coblentz*, *Frankfort*, *Rhinberg*, and other places.

*Dublin, December 2.* Lieutenant-General *Ginkel*, having seried several Matters with the Lords Justices for the good Government of the Soldiers in their several Quarters, and the providing them with Provisions at reasonable Rates, is gone back to *Kilkenny*, and the rest of the Generals, and other Officers, that were here, are likewise returned to their several Quarters. The Report we had lately of the arrival of several Vessels at *Galloway* and *Limerick* with Arms, Provisions and Ammunition, from *France*, proves false, there being no Ship with such Stores come to either of those places since the French went off from *Galloway*. But it is still said, that a French Frigate laden with Arms and Ammunition, and which had on Board divers French Officers, was lately cast away at the Mouth of the *Shannon*. And it is confirmed from all hands, that the Rebels in *Connacht* are in great distress for want of many Necessaries; and that the Duke of *Berwick*, who commands thre, to make their Brass Money current, had put out an Order, That no Silver Money should, after the first of this Month, be taken in payment for Provisions, or any other Commodities, upon pain of Death. This scarcity of Victuals and Forage in *Connacht* has, we hear, put the Enemy upon a design of marching several of their Regiments over the *Shannon*, but our Frontiers are very well provided and reinforced, and in case the Rebels pass that River, our Troops are in a readiness to draw together, who, we doubt not, will

quickly drive them back again. We have an account from Bar, that Colonel *Gustavus Hamilton* having on the 29th put sent out a Detachment towards *Portonnia*, they met a Party of the Enemy, whom they routed, killed several, and took 2 Officers and 11 Common Soldiers Prisoners. There was lately taken up in the Borders of the County of *Kildare* a supply of Meal, Salt, Tobacco, and other Commodities, which was sent through By-ways, and in the night towards *Bunaker*, for the relief of the Rebels, but the Persons who conducted it made their escape; however a Letter was found, which gives sufficient grounds to believe, that the Protected Papists in our Quarters had Correspondence with the Rebels, and that they had some ill Design in hand; whereupon on Sunday night last a general search was made through this City, and most of the Papists forced till further order.

On the 31st instant such of the Lords of the Privy-Council, as are now here, met, together with the Lords Justices, in the Council Chamber, and took the Oaths of Privy-Councillors.

*Southwark, Dec. 8.* *Gadfray Cross* of Lydd in the County of *Kent*, Innholder, who went on Board the French Fleet, whilst it lay on that Coast, was this day Executed according to the Sentence Pronounced against him at the Court of Kings Bench, having been Try'd at the Bar there, and found Guilty of High Treason.
