Hamburg. **December 8.** General Charette, who commanded the Forces of Hanover that were employed this Summer on the Rhine, is returned to Zell. A general Assembly has been since held there amongst the Hanoverians. We hear from Hamburg, that the French have declined leave to sail to the Seamen in that Port, or in the service of their Fleet, but that the King had absolutely required it. The Minister of State, that has resided here some time, is gone home to complete his Electoral Highness's Will in the Transactions in the districts of Saxe-Lauenburg.

Aug. 23. The Troops of Hesse that remained in these Parts, passed the Rhine two days ago in their march homeward. The Münster Troops are entered into their Quarters in the Eifel, and the Brandenburgers have theirs in the Lower Diocese; the Count de Coninck is daily expected here, being appointed by the Elector of Cologne to reside in this City as President of his Council. They write from Mayen, that the French had drawn a Body of 12 or 1400 Men together about Kœfslautern, but that after having demolished some small places, with which they apprehended the Imperialists would pollish themselves off, they retired again. In the mean time General Turenne, who now commands at Mayen, continues his care for the putting that place into a very good posture of defence.

Plimouth, December 9. On the 7th instant Their Majesties Ships cruizing in the Scouding under the command of Sir C. Mely Shore, discovered a small French Man of War, being a Ship of 15 Guns and 100 Patereros. The *Crown* and *Deprived* gave chase to her, and the *Crown* being got up with her, after they had exchanged some Guns, laid her on board, and took her; The French Captain and his Lieutenant were wounded, and his Master with divers of his Men killed. This Chase brought Sir C. Mely Shore up the Channel as far as the Lizard, and the Wind blowing hard at West, he returned into this Port yesterday with the said Prize, which came it in *Rough* about 10 days ago, and was bound to *Brest*, but the Wind put her off the Shore towards Scilly. The French Prisoners say, that in the beginning of the Winter a Squadron of 10 or 12 French Men of War sailed to the *Lemnos*, and that there lie at *Brest* 12 Ships ready to sail, supposed to be designed for the Coast of Spain. That there are no Successors gone from France to *Ireland*, unless it be in June small Vessels upon the account of particular Men; And that they look upon their Affairs in that Kingdom to be quite lost. Yesterday came in a Ship of *British* that had been taken in her Voyage to *Virginia* by a French Privateer, but about 6 days after their Majesties Ship the *Pembroke* fell in with her, and took her.
