Venice, November 24.

**T**HE new Captain-General *Macenigo* has taken his Leave of the Senate, in order to his departure for the *Levant*, and has received Assurances from them, that a Reinforcement of 10 or 12000 Men shall be sent to him early in the Spring, with several new Ships and Gallies that are now building in the *Arsenal* here. The Officers that are to be employed in the new Levies, have many of them already received their Commissions, and the rest will likewise have theirs very speedily. We have an account from *Dalmatia*, that General *Molino* was come to *Cassel-Novo*, to view the Fortifications of that place, and to take an account of the State of the Garison, and that from thence he would go to *Spalatro*, intending to draw a Body of his Troops together, in order to some considerable Enterprize, so soon as the Weather is proper for it.

*Vienna, November 30.* The Elector of *Bavaria* is daily expected here, after whose arrival a Great Council of War will be held, to concert the Measures for the approaching Campaign, as well in *Germany* as in *Hungary*. On the 18th instant passed by this place 1800 Horse and Dragoons, detached out of several Regiments on their march towards *Hungary*, where our Army will take the Field the next year much earlier than they have yet done since this War. Several Officers that escaped from *Belgrade*, have been Examined before the Council of War concerning the loss of that Place; and General *Aspremont*, late Governor of it, will in few days be brought to his Tryal before them. Prince *Louis* was, by our last advice, advanced within 6 hours march of the Enemy, who lay encamped near *St. Job*. The Imperialists, upon the taking of *Lippa* by

the Turks, have raised the Blockade of *Great Waradin*.

*Francfort, December 6.* The States of *Suabia* and *Franconia* are still assembled, to consult about the new Levies, and the other Preparations they intend to make against the next Campaign. The Bishop of *Wurtsbourg*, besides Recruits for the Regiments he has already on foot, has resolved to raise this Winter a Regiment of Cuirassiers, and another of Foot. We have an account from *Heydelberg*, that they work very hard on the Fortifications of that City, and that they have a Garison there of 4000 Men; The *Hussars*, that are Quartered thereabouts, have of late defeated several small French Parties, which were sent out from *Philipsbourg* and other Places to make Incursions into the Palatinate.

*Mentz, December 5.* Our Governor the Baron *de Thunghen* employs his utmost care for the putting this place into such a posture, as not to fear any attempt of the Enemy, who seem'd lately, by their drawing together about *Wormes*, to have some design this way, but our Parties bring us an account, that they are retired again. Our Elector being perfectly recovered of his late Indisposition, is gone to reside at *Aschaffenburg*; We are told, that the Prince of *Neubourg*, Great Master of the *Teutonic* Order, is shortly expected here, and that he is to have the Chief Command of the Imperial Forces that are lodged on the *Rhine*, in the place of General *Souches*, who is going to serve in *Hungary* in the Quality of Lieutenant-General.

*Liege, December 10.* The Governor of *Dinant*, which is in the hands of the French, has sent out an Order to all the Country People of that Neighbourhood, to bring all their Corn and Forage into that place, upon very severe Penalties against such as shall not comply therewith. They likewise make great Provision of Forage

in all their places between the *Sambre* and the *Meuse*; and are now hard at work to fortify *Limburg*.

*Plymouth, December 11.* On Monday last came into *St. Ives* a small Vessel from *Limburg*, having on Board 20 Irish Soldiers with their Arms, who pretend to have deserted from that Garrison, and that they stole away this Vessel, designing for some Port in *England*; They say, that there were no Succors arrived there from *France*. On Tuesday came in here the *Pomeroon* Frigate: She met the day before out of *Sey* a French Man of War of about 36 Guns, (and two more were in fight) with whom she exchanged several Broadides, but the Weather parted them. The *Virginia* Ships, now in this Port, will sail to-morrow, under the Convoy of the *Portsmouth* and the *Pomeroon*, for the *Dunes*.

*Plymouth, December 14.* This morning the outward-bound Merchant Ships, with their Convoys, were under sail, but the Wind coming Westerly presently after, they are not yet gone out. Yesterday arrived here the *Katherine* of *London* from *Majorca*.

*Portsmouth, December 16.* On the 15th instant sailed from hence to the Eastward the *Phoenix*, with several Merchant Ships under her Convoy.

*Dial, December 15.* Yesterday arrived in the *Dunes* Their Majesties Ships the *George* and *Phoenix*, having under their Convoy several homeward-bound Merchant Ships.

*Whitehall, December 12.* His Majesty has been pleased to appoint *William Probert* Esq; to be High-Sheriff of the County of *Rutland* for the Year ensuing.

*Whitehall, December 15.* His Majesty having appointed Sir *Charles Porter* to be one of the Lords Justices and Lord Chancellor of *Ireland*, he set out this day accordingly on his Journey towards that Kingdom.

*Whitehall, December 16.* The President *de la Tour*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of *Savoy*, had yesterday his Audience of Leave of the Queen Dowager, being conducted by Sir *Charles Corbell* Master of the Ceremonies.
