Sunken Rock South-west of Gaas Islet.

INFORMATION has been received, that the Orient Company's steam-ship "Chimborazo," when passing westward of the shoals off Torg-hatten, and in the fairway of the entrance to Toft Sund, at 8h. 30m. P.M. on 10th July, struck on a sunken rock, the least depth on which was estimated to be about 17 feet, with probably deep water close around, lying with Gaas Islet Beacon bearing N. 67° E., distant about one mile, and Fleinen Islet S. 34° E.

Port Caldera—Sunken Wreck Northward of the Jetty.

INFORMATION has been received, that Captain Huguet, commanding the French vessel-of-war "Volta," reports that the wreck of the "Blanco Encalada" lies sunk, and lying on her side, head to the northward, with the foreyard and
