same is hereby substituted for the said old parish church (dedicated to Saint Saviour as aforesaid) of the same new parish, and that such new church shall henceforth be the parish church of the said new parish of Saint Saviour, Oxton, in lieu of the said old parish church of Saint Saviour, as fully in all respects as if the said new church of Saint Saviour so hereby substituted had been originally the parish church of the same new parish.

And we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in further pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities aforesaid, and with such consents as aforesaid (testified as hereinafter mentioned), do hereby transfer all the endowments, emoluments, and rights of or belonging to the said old parish church (dedicated to Saint Saviour as aforesaid) of the said new parish of Saint Saviour, Oxton, or of or belonging to the Vicar or Incumbent thereof, to the said new church of Saint Saviour (now being by virtue of these presents the parish church of the said new parish of Saint Saviour Oxton) and to the Vicar or Incumbent thereof and his successors for ever.

The Leicester Extension Act, 1891.
Borough of Leicester.

WHEREAS by the Leicester Extension Act, 1891, it was provided that the extended Borough of Leicester should be divided into such number of wards with such boundaries and names and such number of councillors as may be determined by a Commissioner to be for that purpose appointed by a Secretary of State within three weeks after the passing of the said Act;

And it was further provided that the said extended borough should have 16 aldermen and 48 councillors;

And the said Commissioner was by the said Act empowered to alter and re-arrange the boundaries of the existing wards, and reduce or add to the number thereof, and to form the whole or any portion of the added area into new wards, or a new ward, or to add any portion or portions thereof to any existing ward or wards;

And whereas special provision was made by the said Act for a portion of the added area known as the parish of Belgrave;

And whereas it was by the 37th section of the Act further provided that the several persons who are Councillors of the existing borough should go out of office on the 1st day of November, 1891, and that the several persons who are aldermen of the existing borough should go out of office on the 9th day of November, 1891; and by the same section it was directed that an election of councillors and an election of aldermen should be held on the second day and on the ninth day respectively of the said month of November;

And whereas all such further provisions were made by the said Act as might become necessary in consequence of the extension of the borough, and of the division or alteration of the wards, and of the number of aldermen and councillors so determined by the Act as aforesaid;

And whereas by Section 4 of the said Act it was provided that for the purpose of the division of the Borough into Wards, and for all proceedings preliminary to the Municipal Elections of 1891, the said Act should come into operation on its passing, to wit on the 3rd day of July, 1891;

And whereas within three weeks of the passing of the said Act the Right Honourable Henry Matthews, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, did duly warrant and appoint Charles Neve Cresswell, Esquire, Barrister-at-Law, to be such Commissioner for the purposes of the said Act; and furthermore, did, in exercise of the power given to him by Section 34 of the said Act, fix the 31st August, 1891, as the later day before which a scheme for the division of the said Borough into Wards should be completed;

Now I, the said Charles Neve Cresswell, do hereby, in pursuance of the said warrant and appointment, fix and determine that the extended Borough of Leicester shall be divided into 16 Wards, the numbers, names, and boundaries of which shall be as follows:—
