

right of his vicarage, and the Reverend Henry Oswald Crow is the present vicar thereof, both of whom are consenting parties to the scheme hereinafter proposed.

"3. That it appears to the said Archbishop that under the provisions of the said Act of Parliament the said township of Low Worsall may be advantageously separated from the said parish of Kirk Leavington to which it at present belongs and be united for ecclesiastical purposes to the said parish of High Worsall.

"4. That pursuant to the directions contained in the before-mentioned Act the said Archbishop has prepared a scheme in writing appended to this report describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alterations above proposed may be best effected and how the changes consequent upon such alterations in respect of ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithes rent-charges and other ecclesiastical dues rates and payments and in respect of patronage and the rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested and the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with such scheme he doth by this report to Your Majesty certify the same to Your Majesty in Council with the consents in writing to the said scheme of the patrons and incumbents of the parishes to be affected to the intent that Your Majesty may in case it shall be thought expedient so to do make an Order for carrying such scheme into effect.

And whereas the scheme and consents referred to in the said Archbishop's Report are in the words following:—

**"SCHEME.**

"That the township of Low Worsall in the parish of Kirk Leavington in the county and diocese of York shall be separated from such parish and be united for ecclesiastical purposes to the adjoining parish of High Worsall and that the same shall be known as the vicarage of High Worsall-with-Low Worsall.

"That the vicar of the parish of Kirk Leavington shall cease to have cure of souls within the limits of the said township of Low Worsall and the vicar of the parish of High Worsall shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of such township.

"That the inhabitants of the said township of Low Worsall shall have the same rights as to pews and as to the performance of all offices and services of the church at the parish church of High Worsall as other inhabitants of the said parish of High Worsall.

"That the fees for all such offices and services so performed for the inhabitants of the said township of Low Worsall as aforesaid or arising within the limits of the same and usually payable to the incumbent of a benefice shall belong to the vicar of High Worsall.

"That save as aforesaid no alteration shall be made in the endowment of either of the benefices to be affected by this scheme.

"That the patronage or right of presentation to the said vicarage of High Worsall-with-Low Worsall shall be vested in the Archbishop of York and his successors in right of the See of York and the vicar of Northallerton and his successors in right of such vicarage who shall exercise the right of patronage as follows:—On the occasion of the next three vacancies which shall occur after the taking effect of this scheme the Archbishop of York shall be entitled to exercise the right of

presentation, and on the fourth vacancy the vicar of Northallerton shall be entitled to exercise such right and thereafter the Archbishop of York and vicar of Northallerton for the time being shall exercise the right of presentation successively provided always that the Archbishop of York for the time being shall be entitled to exercise such right of presentation three times in succession after every presentation made by the vicar of Northallerton for the time being.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen of the Act of the fifth and sixth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and eight, and of the Act of the twenty-first and twenty-second years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-seven, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the thirtieth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen of the Act of the fifth and sixth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and eight and of the Act of the twenty-first and twenty-second years of your Majesty chapter fifty-seven have prepared and now humbly submit to your Majesty in Council the following scheme relating to the vicarage and parish of Saint Mary Islington in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London.
