Genova, December 9.

BY a Vessel from *Provence* we have advice, that the French are fitting out 20 Gallies at *Marseilles*, and several Men of War at *Toulon*, and that there is much talk of their having a design upon *Nizza*. We hear from *Catalonia*, that six of the eight Spanish Gallies, that sailed lately from these Coasts, were arrived at *Barcelona*; The other two were separated from them in bad weather, and there is a report, that they are put into *Corfica*.

Milan, December 13. Our Governor has demanded of this State 24000 Crowns a Month, which are to be paid the Duke of *Savoy*, in pursuance of the Agreement made with his Highness for the maintenance of the German and Spanish Troops, who are to have their Winter Quarters in *Piedmont*. The French have made a great provision of Forage at *Casale*, which makes us believe, they expect a considerable Reinforcement of Horse from Monsieur *Catinar's* Army, to make Incurtions this Winter; for prevention whereof, our Governor has resolved to reinforce all the Spanish Garrisons on that side. Don *Livio Odescalchi*, Nephew to the late Pope, parted from hence two days ago on his return towards *Rome*.

Venice, December 16. Some German Troops, raised by the Prince of *Degenfelt* for the Service of this State, arrived here this week, and the rest are daily expected, in order to be sent with the next Convoy to *Corfou*, where 'tis not doubted but the Captain-General is arrived with his Convoy, the Wind having been exream fair for them ever since their departure from hence. On Tuesday last arrived here a Barque from *Dalmatia* with advice, that the Troops which the Proveditore-General *Molina* sent towards the Frontiers during the Expedition of *Vallona*, had in their return attacked the Fortrels of *Vergor*; They made themselves Masters of the Bridge, after having beaten the Turks that came to oppose them, and then the Town surrendered upon Articles. By the taking of this place, in which they found 4 Pieces of Cannon, and a good quantity of Provisions, a Passage is opened into the Province of *Primorgie*.

Madrid, December 13. The Duke de *Medina Cidonia* parted from hence the last week towards his Government of *Catalonia*. The

Duke of *Medina Celi* lyes dangerously ill. An Ambassador is arrived here from the Emperor of *Morocco*, to Treat about the Exchange of the Spaniards that were taken the last year at *Larache*, and he has had Audience of the King. By the Fleet which arrived the 19th of the last Month from *New-Spain*, under the command of the Conde de *Villa Nueva*, we have advice from *Cartagena*, that the Ships with Silver from the South-Sea were expected at *Panama* about the middle of *October*, and that they had a prospect of a very good Fair. We have not yet an exact account of the Lading of the said Fleet. The Galeons may be expected at *Cadix* about *May*.

Warsaw, December 12. The Bishop of *Poznia* will set out from hence on Friday next on his Embassy to the Court of *Newburg*, and in the mean time splendid Preparations are making for the Reception of the Princess, and for the Solemnizing the Marriage, which 'tis now resolved shall be performed in this City. The advices from the Frontiers give us some disturbance, they telling us, that a fresh Body of 6000 Tartars was come to *Caminnec*, with design, as 'twas feared, to make Incurtions into our Frontier Provinces.

Viena, December 17. The Elector of *Bavaria* has daily Conferences with the Emperor and his Ministers concerning the Prosecution of the War, as well on the *Rhine* as in *Hungary*, for which, Preparations are making here with extraordinary vigour and application. 'Twas thought, that Prince *Louis* of *Baden* would have been here by this time to have assisted at these Conferences; but a Body of Turks and Tartars, who have been of late about the *Thyssa*, do still keep him on the Frontiers of *Transilvania* to observe them, and to cover that Country, into which it's thought they design to make an Incurtion, while *Teckley* is preparing for a like attempt from *Valachia*. The Turks have at last made themselves Masters of the Island of *Orfowa*, the Imperialists that were posted there, after a long and brave resistance, surrendering upon Conditions, to be conducted with their Arms to the next Imperial Garrison, but they were not observed by the Turks, they cutting in pieces the Commandant, who was Major of the Regiment of *Seiches*. The Envoy, who is going from the Emperor to the Czar of *Moscovy*, has Orders to begin his Journey the next week.

Frankfurt, December 27. The three Regiments of *Saxe Getha* have pailed the *Alten* at *Aischffenburg*, and are on their march towards the *Bergstrait*, where they have their Quarters aliigned them. The Great Master of the *Teutonick* Order is arrived here from *Aischffenburg*, and intends to part again to morrow for *Alentz*, where a Chapter is appointed to meet for the choosing of a Coadjutor, but it's believed, they will not proceed to an Election till the arrival of Count *Coningssecke*, who is to assist thereat on the part of the Emperor. In the mean time the Elector of *Alentz* is fallen ill again.

Cologne, December 29. General *Becke* is returned hither by the Emperor's Order, and has again taken upon him the Command of the Troops in Garison here, which will in few days be reinforced by several thousand *Brandenburgers*. The Forces that had their Rendezvous at *Aldenborn*, are again separated: and those that marched lately from hence are come back. The States of this Diocesis desiring very earnestly to have the Fortifications of *Bon* demolished, because of the great Charge it would be to repair the Ruines of the last Siege, and to maintain a sufficient Garison there, which they cannot support at a time that they have *Keserwaert*, *Rheinberg*, and other Garisons to provide for and that they lye under other great Charges; We understand, that the Emperor and the Elector of *Cologne* have consented therunto, tho' tis not yet determined by them, whether all the Works of the Town shall be slighted, or only part of them.

Hamburg, December 29. We are told from *Berlin*, that the Elector of *Brandenburg* has resolved to send an Embassy into *Moscow*, to joyn with the Ministers of the Emperor and *Poland*, in endeavouring to persuade the Czars to fall upon the *Tartars* the next Spring with their whole Force; in which case, the King of *Poland* offers to quit his Claim to *Sudlensko*, and the other Pretentions he has upon the *Moscovites*. They write from *Munster*, that new Levies are making with great diligence and success for the Service of the Bishop of that name, who, besides the Troops which he has promised to send to the Emperor's assistance in *Hungary*, intends to have a good Body of an Army on the *Rhine* to act against *France*. From all the other Parts of *Germany* we hear likewise, that Troops are raising, Magazines providing, and other Preparations making for a vigorous prosecution of the next Campaigne.

Hague, January 2. The States-General have, upon the Instances of the Spanish Minister, gi-

vet: Orders for several Regiments of Horse and Foot to march towards *Andois* and *Brabant*. The Count *de Winditzgratz* is coming hither from the Emperor, to compliment his Majesty of *Great-Britain* upon his arrival in this Country. We have an account from *Austerdam* that there sailed on Friday last out of the *Texas* three Ships bound for the *East-Indies*, a fourth called the *Fata* likewise bound to the *East-Indies* running aground in her going out, which she the presently got off again, disabled her from proceeding then on her Voyage.

Whitchall, December 30. The *Seur de Danckelman*, Envoy Extraordinary from his Electoral Highness of *Brandenburg*, had yesterday his Audience of the Queen Dowager, and this day, of their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of *Denmark*, being conducted by Sir *Charles Cottrell* Master of the Ceremonies.

Whitchall, December 31. Yesterday at a Chapter of the most Noble Order of the *Garter* held at *Kensington*, in the Presence of the Sovereign, his Highness *George-William* Duke of *Zell*, eldest Prince of the most Serene House of *Brunswick* and *Lunenburgh*, was Elected a Knight-Companion of the said most Noble Order.
