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Cadiz, December 3.

A French Privateer having lately taken an English Vessel in the Road of St. Cruz on the Coast of Barbary, the Emperor of Morocco has caused all the French Ships that are in his Ports, together with the French Merchants and their Effects, to be seized, till the said Prize with her Lading be restored, and farther Reparation made, by the punishment of the Privateer, &c. We hear from Madrid, that the Ambassador of Morocco has had Audience of the King, and that Commissioners were appointed to Treat with him about the Exchange of the Prisoners taken the last year at Larache.

Rome December 9. The French Ambassador (the Duke de Chaulnes) has begun to take his Leave of the Cardinals, and pretends to part from hence about the middle of the next Month on his return home. He had on Sunday last a long Audience of the Pope, and the next day a Congregation was held concerning the Affairs of France, about which new difficulties arise daily, insomuch that the differences between the two Courts seem to be still as far as ever from an Accommodation. The Ambassador of Venice has had his Audience of Leave of the Pope, and will begin his Journey the next week for Venice.

Zurick, December 18. Upon the breaking up of the late General Dyet of the Swiss Cantons held at Baden, an Express was sent to Vienna, to acquaint the Emperor with the Resolutions they had taken concerning the Security of the Passage of Augst, and the Neutrality of the Forest Towns, and the Bishoprick of Balle. This Express returned four days ago with his Imperial Majesties answer to the Letter the Cantons wrote to him on that occasion, wherein his Imperial Majesty refers them, as to the Matters they had in debate at their said meeting about the Forest

Towns, &c. to his Ambassador the Count de Lodron, who is on his way hither. The French Ambassador, though the three weeks, which he desired to receive the King his Masters Orders in upon the last Representation of the Cantons about the new Works designed at Humingen, are expired, has not yet said any thing farther of that matter; tho' tis believed, that he has received an answer from the French Court, but that he does not think fit to communicate the same, till he sees what the Count de Lodron will propose to the Cantons on the part of the Emperor. The Swissers have put a new Reinforcement of 8 or 900 men into Geneva.

Vienna, December 17. The Turks are gone into their Winter Quarters, except a Body of 10 or 12000, who have been of late about the Theysse. The last advices from Upper Hungary said, That upon the march of Prince Louis to Zamar, they were retired towards Transilvania, making a shew as if they designed an Incurtion into that Country; to prevent which, Prince Louis was moving back towards Clusenburg. By the freshest advices from the Turkish Frontiers we understand, that the Grand Signior lay very ill at Adrianople; that the Grand Visier was daily expected there; and that upon his arrival a great Council of War would be held, at which the Cham of Tary, or at least his Son, was to be present, to regulate the Preparations for the next Campagne; towards which we are assured from all hands, that the Turks are resolved to make their utmost Efforts, being encouraged thereunto by the French Ambassador, who is extremely busie at that Court. We hear from Sclavonia, that things are at present very quiet on that side. And in Croatia the Ban or Viceroy was drawing the Militia of the Country together, with a resolution to attack a small Body of the Enemy, who were got together near their Frontiers. The Council of War continues to meet here frequently; The new Levies advance very successfully, and particular care is taken to provide Magazines for our Army, which will take the Field much earlier the next year than it has yet done since this War. His Electoral Highness of Bavaria will part from hence towards the end of this Month for the Hague.

Merz.

Munich, December 24. The Prince of Neuchamp, Great Master of the Teutonic Order, is daily expected in this City, where he will have his Residence this Winter. The Troops of Hesse are still posted in our Neighbourhood; and besides these, we have now a Garrison here of about 4000 Men. There is likewise a Garrison of 2000 Men in Hildesburgh. It's believed, the Chapter of Mainz will meet in 2 or 3 days, in order to proceed to the Election of a Coadjutor.

Bransfort, December 27. New Levies are making in all these Parts, as well for the Service of the Emperor, as the Princes of the Empire. The Commissaries are busied with providing of Magazines; And the other necessary Preparations for a most vigorous Prosecution of the War, are carried on with all possible diligence and application. The three Regiments of Saxe Gotha have passed the Main, and are on their march towards the Bergstræet.

Hamburg, December 26. A great many Officers arrive daily in Hulslein, to raise men, not only for Recruits, but for forming of several new Regiments. The last Letters from Poland say, that the King had finally resolved, that the Marriage between the Prince of Poland and the Princess of Neubourg shall be solemnized at Warsaw about the middle of February.

Amsterdam, December 30. The Admiralty here have named Vice-Admiral Allemonde, and Rear-Admiral Schey, to command the Squadron fitted out by this College for the next Summer's Fleet, and they have likewise appointed most of the Captains. By Letters from Legborne we are advised, that a Vessel was arrived there from Cyprus, and brought an account, that the English and Dutch Convoy arrived there on the 4th of November, and that on the 5th they sailed again from thence for Scanderone.

Falmouth, December 29. On Friday last came into this Port six Ships belonging to the Elector of Brandenburg, viz. The Prince of 30 Guns, the Princess of 30, the Salamander of 20, the African of 12, the Griffin of 8, and the Dragon of 4 Guns, being all bound for Guinney. Their Majesties Ship the Milford is come in here from the Coast of Ireland.

Plimouth, December 30. This day passed by this Harbor two Dutch Men of War, with 5 or 6 Merchant Ships, bound to Cadix. The King Charles the Second, the Elephant, and the Golden Grape, all three of Copenhagen, with the King William of Amsterdam, are come into this Port, being bound for Lisbon.

Whitehall, January 1. This day the Right Honourable Sir John Trevor Kt. Speaker of the Honourable House of Commons, and first Lord Commissioner of the Great Seal of England, was, by His Majesties Command, sworn of His Majesties most Honourable Privy-

Council, and accordingly took his Place at Board.
