

(c.) Dogs which have on a collar with the name and address of the owner of the dog legibly engraved on such collar and the requirements as to muzzling contained in the said Article 6 shall not apply to such dogs as aforesaid in that part of that District.

Saving as to Application of the Muzzling Order in other Districts.

2. Nothing in this Order shall in any way amend or affect the Rabies (Muzzling of Dogs) Order of 1889, in its application to any District or part of a District of a Local Authority which is not mentioned in the Schedule to this Order.

Short Title.

3. This Order may be cited as THE RABIES (MUZZLING OF DOGS) ORDER OF 1889, AMENDMENT No. 10.

Commencement.

4. This Order shall commence and take effect from and immediately after the twenty-seventh day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two.

SCHEDULE.

By the Board of Agriculture.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Board of Agriculture Act, 1889, and the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1890, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, and with reference especially to Article 96 of the Animals Order of 1886, do hereby license the Local Authority for the borough of Kingston-upon-Hull to dig up or cause to be dug up, within fourteen days after the date of this Licence, the carcases of two pigs buried in Mr. William Norman's Garden, Somerset House, Anlaby-road, subject to the following conditions:—

1. The carcases shall be dug up in the presence of, and under the superintendence of, an officer specially appointed in that behalf by the Local Authority.
2. The carcases dug up shall be disinfected, and shall then be taken, in charge of an officer of the Local Authority, to the Refuse Destructor situate in Chapman-street, in the said borough, and shall be there destroyed by exposure to a high temperature, or by chemical agents.
3. The expenses of and incidental to the digging up, disinfection, removal, and destruction of the carcases shall be defrayed by the Local Authority.
4. This Licence is revocable by the Board of Agriculture.
