CEREMONIAL observed on Wednesday, 20th January, 1892, when the Remains of His late Royal Highness Albert Victor Christian Edward, Duke of Clarence and Avondale and Earl of Athlone, K.G., K.P., Eldest Son of Their Royal Highnesses The Prince and Princess of Wales, and Grandson of Her Majesty The Queen, were removed from Sandringham, for Burial in St. George's Chapel, Windsor Castle.

At a quarter to three o'clock, those who had the honour to receive the Queen's commands to be present at the Ceremony, but who did not take part in the Procession, were admitted at the South Entrance to St. George's Chapel, and shown to seats in the Choir by Her Majesty's Gentlemen Ushers.

At three o'clock, those who had been appointed to take part in the Procession assembled at the West Entrance of St. George's Chapel, and awaited the arrival of the Remains of His late Royal Highness.

At ten o'clock, the Royal Remains were removed from Sandringham Church, after a short Special Service, conducted by the Reverend F. Hervey and Honourable and Reverend L. Tyrwhitt, on a gun carriage of the Royal Artillery, under the command of Lieutenant H. White-Thompson, to Wolferton Station, where a Guard of Honour of the 3rd Battalion Norfolk Regiment, under the command of Captain Lloyd Payne, was mounted.

The Coffin was preceded by the Tenantry of the Sandringham Estate and followed by Their Royal Highnesses The Prince and Princess of Wales, The Prince George of Wales, The Princess Louise, Duchess of Fife, and The Duke of Fife, The Princesses Victoria and Maud of Wales, The Duchess of Teck, and Her Serene Highness The Princess Victoria Mary of Teck, and by the Household, the Heads of Departments, Keepers, Servants, and Labourers of the Sandringham Estate.

At half-past eleven A.M. o'clock, a Special Train left Wolferton Station to convey the Remains of His late Royal Highness to the Windsor Station of the South-Western Railway, where it arrived at three o'clock.

The Train also conveyed Their Royal Highnesses The Prince of Wales, K.G., and The Prince George of Wales, K.G., and The Duke of Fife, K.T., with the following Gentlemen in Attendance upon them, and the Household of His late Royal Highness:—General Sir Dighton Probyn, K.C.B., K.C.S.I., V.C., Sir Francis Knollys, K.C.M.G., C.B., Rear-Admiral H. F. Stephenson, C.B., The Reverend F. A. J. Hervey, The Reverend J. Mitchell, Dr. Manby, Major-General Sir Francis de Winton, K.C.M.G., and Captain G. Holford.
