A Court of Mayor and Aldermen holden in the Inner Chamber of the Guildhall of the City of London, on Tuesday, the 19th day of January, 1892, and in the 55th year of the reign of Victoria, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, &c.

Resolved unanimously,—

That the Court of Lord Mayor and Aldermen of the city of London desires with loyal sympathy respectfully to express to Her Most Gracious Majesty how deeply it is moved by the early death, amid such touching surroundings, of Her Majesty's Grandson, His Royal Highness the Duke of Clarence and Avondale, K.G., K.P.; and very humbly prays that the Almighty Father will vouchsafe to grant to Her Majesty His true Comfort which alone can really assuage the acute sorrow resulting from the decease of the Heir Presumptive to the Throne of England.
