

receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878.

(ii.) If an animal is not slaughtered as required by this Order, the person to whom the Movement Licence is granted, and the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person failing to cause the same to be so slaughtered, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878.

4. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority for the county of Kent.

5. Terms in this Order have the same meaning as in the Animals Order of 1886.

6. This Order may be cited as THE ISLE OF SHEPPEY (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1892.

7. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after this fifteenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two.

SCHEDULE.

Part of the District of the Local Authority of the county of Kent to which this Order applies.

The Poor Law Union of the Isle of Sheppey in the county of Kent, comprising the parishes of Eastchurch, Isle of Elmley, Isle of Harty, Leysdown, Minster in Sheppey, Queenborough, and Warden.

By the Board of Agriculture.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Board of Agriculture Act, 1889, and the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1890, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. No cattle, sheep, goats, or swine shall be moved out of the district described in the Schedule to this Order.

Provided that nothing in this Order shall be deemed to apply to the movement of animals by railway through the said district from a place outside the said district, to another place outside the said district, without untrucking within the said district.

2. The Order of the Board of Agriculture dated the sixth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two restricting the movement of cattle, sheep, goats, and swine out of the following districts or parts of districts (namely):

- Borough of Chatham.
- Borough of Rochester.
- Borough of Folkestone.
- Parliamentary Borough of Hythe, in the county of Kent.
- Parish of Aldershot, in the county of Hants.

is hereby revoked: Provided that such revocation shall not invalidate or make unlawful

anything done under the said Order, or interfere with the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of any offence committed against, or any penalty incurred under, the said Order.

3. This Order shall commence and take effect from and immediately after this fifteenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two.
