(PLEURO-PNEUMONIA.)

By the Board of Agriculture.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Board of Agriculture Act, 1889, and the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1890, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Place (namely),—the premises and cow-houses and the two grass fields adjoining the same at Field Head Farm, Dodworth, near Barnsley, in the West Riding of the county of York,—which was declared by Order of the Board dated the twenty-eighth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, to be a Place infected with pleuro-pneumonia, is hereby declared to be free from pleuro-pneumonia, and that Place shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be a Place infected with pleuro-pneumonia.

(FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE INFECTED ZONE—
REVOCATION.)

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Board of Agriculture Act, 1889, and the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1890, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The Orders described in the Schedule to this Order are hereby, as from the commencement of this Order, revoked: Provided that nothing herein shall be deemed to invalidate or make unlawful anything done under the said Orders or either of them before the commencement of this Order, or interfere with the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of any offence committed against, or any penalty incurred under, the said Orders or either of them before the commencement of this Order.

2. This Order shall commence and take effect from and immediately after the twentieth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two.
