“My telegram of 14th.—Following quarantine measures taken in view of spread of cholera:—

“Passengers from Roumanian ports subjected to five days' quarantine.

“Passengers from Russian Danubian ports in vessels not previously subjected to quarantine to undergo eleven days' quarantine.

“Passengers from Austro-Hungarian Danubian ports to undergo examination.

“Arrivals from Russian Black Sea ports and Turkish ports between Russian frontier and Trebizond to undergo eleven days' quarantine.

“Arrivals from Roumanian Black Sea ports, via Dobrudja, to undergo five days' quarantine.

“Arrivals from Constantinople and other places not submitted to quarantine to undergo examination.”
