By the Board of Agriculture.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Board of Agriculture Act, 1889, and the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1890, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, and with reference especially to Article 96 of the Animals Order of 1886, do hereby license the Local Authority for the county of Buckingham to dig up or cause to be dug up, within fourteen days after the date of this Licence, the carcasses of ten pigs which were buried at Bradwell on or about the fifteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two; subject to the following conditions:—

1. When dug up the Local Authority shall forthwith cause the carcasses to be examined with a view to ascertain whether the animals were affected with contagious or infectious disease, and the Local Authority shall then cause the carcasses to be re-buried as soon as possible, and shall cause them to be covered with a sufficient quantity of quick lime or other disinfectant, and with not less than six feet of earth.
2. The expenses of and incidental to the digging up, examination, and re-burial of the carcasses shall be defrayed by the Local Authority.
3. This Licence is revocable by the Board of Agriculture.

(FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE.)

By the Board of Agriculture.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under

the Board of Agriculture Act, 1889, and the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1890, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Place (namely),—the lairs and other premises situate in Brandon-road, York-road, King's Cross, in the county of London, belonging to William James Markham,—which was declared by Order of the Board dated the thirteenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, to be a Place infected with foot-and-mouth disease, is hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and that Place shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be a Place infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the twenty-third day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two.
