As notice has been officially received of the fact that Asiatic cholera is raging in the ports of the Black Sea and the Sea of Azov, the provisions of the second section I of the law for protection against the introduction of contagious diseases into the kingdom, of the 2nd of July, 1880, duly come in force until further notice as regards ships which arrive from or have been connected with the said ports, in view of which by section 32 of the same law, is prohibited the importation from the said ports into this kingdom, of dirty linen, dirty garments, and dirty bed-clothes (so far as these articles do not form part of the personal baggage of those on board), rags, dirty wadding, carding wool, and waste paper; and the washing under public superintendence of all linen, garments, and bed-clothes, which have been brought as personal luggage from the said ports, is made obliga-
