

“To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty  
in Council.

“We the undersigned Edward White Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury Primate of all England and Metropolitan do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council :

“That the Right Reverend Augustus Lord Bishop of Lichfield as Bishop of the diocese within which are situate the vicarage or chapelry of Dunston and the vicarage or chapelry of Coppenhall, both in the county of Stafford having represented unto us that the said benefices being contiguous to each other and of which the aggregate population does not exceed one thousand five hundred persons might with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice, we inquired into the circumstances of the case.

“That on such inquiry it appeared to us that such union might be usefully made and would not be of inconvenient extent and that Edward George Percy Baron Hatherton of Tiddesley in the county of Stafford (being the patron or person entitled to present to the said benefices if the same respectively were now vacant) consents to the proposed union.

“That six weeks and upwards before certifying such inquiry and consent to Your Majesty in Council we caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed on the principal outer door of the parish church of each of the said benefices with notice to any person or persons interested that he she or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his her or their hand or hands to us the said Archbishop against such union and no such cause has been shown.

“The representation of the said Lord Bishop of Lichfield our inquiry into the circumstances of the case the statement of circumstances in reply thereto the consent in writing of the patron and the copies of the representation and notice before-mentioned are hereunto annexed.

“And we do hereby certify the inquiry and consent as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes.

“As witness our hand this twenty-sixth day of July, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two.

Now therefore Her Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the vicarage or chapelry of Dunston, situate in the county of Stafford and diocese of Lichfield and the vicarage or chapelry of Coppenhall, situate in the same county and diocese, shall be united into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King

George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four ; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine ; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the fourteenth day of July in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, in the words following, that is to say :—

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four ; of the Act of the second and third years of Your Majesty, chapter forty-nine ; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Andrew Woodside in the parish of Caddington which parish is situate partly in the county of Bedford and partly in the county of Hertford and wholly in the diocese of Ely.

“Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Andrew Woodside situate as aforesaid.

“Now therefore, with the consent of the Honourable and Right Reverend Alwyne Bishop of the said diocese of Ely (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Caddington which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Andrew Woodside situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named ‘The District Chapelry of Saint Andrew Woodside.’

“And with the like consent of the said Alwyne Bishop of the said diocese of Ely (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Andrew Woodside situate as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being : Provided always that so long as the Reverend Thomas Bates Clerk in Holy Orders the present vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Caddington shall continue to be such vicar or incumbent all the fees which may be received in respect of such publication solemnization, or performance at the said church of Saint Andrew Woodside situate as aforesaid shall be paid over by the minister thereof to the said Thomas Bates : and Provided also that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

“We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal Wisdom, shall seem meet.
