THE Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch, dated 1st September, 1892, from Her Majesty's Representative at Copenhagen, stating that the ordinances issued against ports in the Elbe are extended to all German ports of the North Sea between the Danish frontier and the Dutch frontier.

The ordinances issued against arrivals from Lisbon are removed.

THE Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of the following Telegrams relating to quarantine:—

Telegram from Madrid. September 3:—
"Royal Order to-day that arrivals from Aarhus, in Denmark, and Rouen, in France, be sent to foul lazaretto. Three days' observation on arrivals from other ports on River Seine and from Bruges and Malines in Belgium."

Telegram from Lisbon. September 3:—
"Dover, Falmouth, Kiel, Bremen, Bordeaux, Grangemouth, and all Dutch ports declared to be infected with cholera. Official notification published by the Portuguese Government that no ship from any port infected by cholera or having had cases of cholera on board will be allowed to land passengers or cargo or to embark cargo in Portugal or in the adjacent islands. All articles of cargo on board ships subject to quarantine are considered very susceptible with reference to quarantine regulations."

Telegram from Madrid. September 4:—
"Royal Order to-day imposes three days' observation on arrivals from London, Liverpool, Grimsby, Swansea, which left those ports since the 31st ultimo; also on arrivals from Glasgow which left since 24th, and sends to foul lazaretto arrivals which left Cronstadt since 8th and Riga since 22nd ultimo."

Telegram from Stockholm. September 4:—
"Jutland is declared infected with cholera, but communication was reopened yesterday evening with Danish Islands, on condition that passengers produce certificates signed not later than four hours before their departure, that they have been forty-eight hours at some place not infected with cholera and are in good health."
