No. 379.—AUSTRALIA AND PACIFIC STATIONS.

PACIFIC OCEAN.—FRIENDLY ISLANDS.
Tongatābu—Alterations in Buoyage of Egeria Channel.

THE Tongan Government has given notice, that on 1st August, 1892, the following alterations would be made in the buoyage of Egeria Channel, western approach to Nukualofa:—

1. A fairway buoy, painted red and white in vertical stripes, would be moored with south end of Atatā bearing S.E. by E., distant nine cables, and Toke Toke S.W.

Approximate position, lat. 21° 2' 50" S., long. 175° 16' 20" W.

2. The white conical buoy, north-westward of Atatā, would be replaced by a conical buoy, painted red.

3. The red conical buoys, marking Friday and Johnnie Shoals, would be replaced by can buoys, painted black.

4. The white conical buoy, marking Campbell Rock, would be replaced by a conical buoy, painted red.

No. 380.—BALTIC STATION.

BALTIC—SWEDISH SHORE.—GULF OF BOTHNIA.
Flashing Lights on Kråkön and Lörudde.

THE Swedish Government has given notice, that on 25th August, 1892, lights would be exhibited from the south-west point of Kråkön, approach to Hudiksvall; and from Lörudde, westward of the north end of Bremö:—

1. Kråkön Light is a sixth order flashing light, showing white from N. 20° W., through north, to N. 17° E.; red from N. 17° E., through east, to S. 9° E. (but the light is obscured in part of this arc); and white from S. 9° E. to S. 5° E. It is elevated 23 feet above the sea, and in clear weather the white light should be visible from a distance of six miles, and the red light four miles.

The lighthouse is a small cylindrical iron building.

Approximate position, lat. 61° 33' 40" N., long. 17° 20' E.

2. Lörudde Light is a sixth order flashing light, showing white from S. 25° E., through south, to S. 23° W.; red from S. 23° W., through west, to N. 2° E.; and white from N. 2° E. to N. 11° E. It is elevated 16 feet above the sea, and in clear weather the white light should be visible six miles, and the red light four miles.
