

Hungary, the Baltic Sea, or the State of New York, for twelve days previous to their arrival.

(c.) Passengers arriving direct from England on vessels having a duly qualified Medical Officer on board are to be allowed to land without medical inspection or the declaration of not having been in an infected place, provided that the Medical Officer in charge on board shall declare on oath that during the voyage there has not been on board a case of dysentery, diarrhoea, cholera, cholera, or any disease with symptoms resembling cholera either among the passengers or the crew.

(d.) The declaration above referred to shall be counter-signed by the master of the vessel.

#### 6. Susceptible Goods.

(a.) The importation of the following articles is forbidden from any ports subjected to quarantine or on vessels calling at any such ports:—Rags, cotton seed, raw silk, hair, and feathers.

(b.) The importation of soiled wearing apparel before disinfection is prohibited.

(c.) The importation of rags from Egypt is prohibited.

(d.) The importation of vines, vine shoots, vine leaves or roots from any port of the Mediterranean is prohibited.

(e.) The importation of grapes, raisins, poles, or supports used in the cultivation of vines, vegetable earth, vegetable or mixed manure, is prohibited unless the importation is accompanied by a sworn declaration, made by the shipper before the British Consular Authority of the place of its origin to the effect that the shipment does not contain vine plants or cuttings, or that its contents come from nurseries, hothouses, fields, or gardens, which are at least 200 yards distant from the nearest vines or vineyards, and that moreover the phylloxera is not known to exist at the place or origin.

(f.) Provided, however, that the Collector of Customs may grant permission for the importation of plants and vegetable produce under proper restrictions when application has been made and the precautions necessary are established before the shipment leaves the place of origin.

THE Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch, from Her Majesty's Representative at Madrid, forwarding the following information with regard to quarantine, viz. :—

Arrivals from Hull which have left that port after 11th instant, clean; arrivals from ports within 165 kilometres of Hull, whatever the date of sailing, admitted to free pratique provided they carry a clean bill of health.

Dangerous goods which have been at Hull during the epidemic will continue until 31st instant to be subjected on arrival to the regu-

lations prescribed by the Royal Order of 19th October, 1886.

The Royal Order of 12th September relating to arrivals from Great Britain and her possessions in the Mediterranean respecting the prohibition of entry or disinfection of goods and medical inspection of passengers is hereby revoked.

THE Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch, from Her Majesty's Representative at Belgrade, containing the following information respecting quarantine, viz. :—

1. The entry into Servia of the following articles from Austro-Hungary or other infected countries is prohibited:—Cheese, butter, milk, curds, cream, fruit, salad, tomatoes, pimento, ghirkins, hogs-flesh, ham, dried provisions, all kinds of bread and confectionery.

2. All colonial produce coming from contaminated districts or which has passed in transit through contaminated districts will be submitted to a quarantine of ten days.

3. The passage of fresh workmen at the Iron-gates through Servian territory is prohibited:

4. A cordon will be established along the Sare and the Danube to prevent the passage of barges from Austro-Hungary into Servia.

5. The local boat service between Chibatz and Metrovitze is permitted, but subject to the provisions of paragraph 5 of the Circular of the 22nd September relative to local service between Semlin, Belgrade, and Parresova.

6. Merchant ships, tugs, and rafts can enter Servia after medical inspection of crew. In stations where there is no doctor the crew must produce a certificate that they have undergone medical examination at the nearest station.
