## A PROCLAMATION

For Discovering and Apprehending the late Bishop of Ely, William Penn, and James Grahme.

MARIE R.

Hereas Their Majesties have received Information, That Francis late Bishop of Ely, William Penn Esqs. and James Grahme Esq; with other Ill-affected Persons, have defined and Endeavoured to Depose Their Majesties, and Subvert the Government of this Kingdom, by precuring an Invasion of the same by the French, and other Treasonable Practices, and have to that end held Correspondence, and Conspired with diens Enemies and Traitors, and particularly with Sir Richard Grahme Baronet, (Viscount Preston in the Kingdom of Scotland) and John Ashton Gent. lately Attainted of High-Treason; For which Cause, several Warrants for High-Treason have been Issued out against them, but they have withdrawn themselves from their usual Places of Abode, and are fled from Fustice: Their Majesties therefore have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Their Privy-Council, to Issue this Their Royal Proclamation; And Their Majesties do hereby Command and Require all Their Loving Subjects to Discover, Take and Apprehend, the faid Francis late Biship of Ely, William Penn, and James Grahme, wherever they may be found, and to carry them before the next Justice of the Peace, or Chief Magistrate, who is hereby Required to Commit them to the next Gral, there to remain until they be fornce Delivered by due Course of Law; And Thir Majesties do hereby Require the Said Justice, trother Migistrase, immediately to give Notice threef to Trem or Their Privy-Council. And Their Majesties do hereby Publish and Declare to all Persons that Stall Conceal the Persons above named,

Milan, January 22. The Letters we have re-ceived this week from Moncalvo, give us this particular account of the late Action in Monsferrat. On the 8th instant 300 French Horse and 200 Foot marched from Cazal in the night, with a design to surprise 4 Troops of Horse of the Regiment of Taff that were quartered at Grana, and having joyned with 600 of the Country People, who were very well Armed, they advanced towards that place, and arrived there before the Germans had any notice of their approach, however they had time enough to retire into the Castle, where they made a Fire upon one of the Towers, which was the Signal agreed upon with the other Quarters when any of them stood in need of Succor; whereupon 6 Troops that were quartered at Cagliano hastened to their Assistance. The French being informed thereof, endeavoured to retire towards Cafal, but being surrounded by the 6 Troops from Cagliano, and the other four that sallied out of the Castle of Grana, they were charged to vigoroully, that about 250 were killed upon the place, and 156 taken Piloners, who were carried to Asti, and among these was a Colonel and 6 Captains, besides other inferior Officers; Of the Montferrins likewise few escaped. Since this the Country has submitted to the Emperor's Orders, and has agreed with Prince Eigene of Savoy, who commands the German Troops in the Service of the Duke of Savoy, and has now his Head Quarter at Moncalvo, about the Contributions to be raised for their Subfiltence. The Germans had but to men killed and 25 wounded in this Action, and never made use of their Fire-Arms, but falling in with the French, cut them down with their Sabres. Our Maitre de Camp-General the Count de Louvegny will part from hence in few days for Flanders.

Venice, January 26. The Senate having received

the last week an account from their Relident at Naples, that a Contageous Difference was broke out in the Province of Puglia, have forbid all Commerce with that Kingdom, and ordered that very strick Quarantains shall be performed by all Persons who come from any suspected Places. We hear, that the like Precautions have been taken at Rome, where several of the Gates of the City are kept shut, and Guards appointed at the others, under the duection of a Cardinal, to examine all Persons and Goods that come in; that Commissioners have been tent for the same purpose to the frontier places of the Ecclesiatical State, and that the Prince of Beiveder, who was come from Naples to Miring, had been obliged to return to that Kingdom: From whence the fall Letters do all affine us, that the City of Naples is wholly free from all Intection. Warfaw, January 8. The Court is not exor ted here from Zolkiew till towards the end of this Month. In the mean time very magnincent Preparations are making for the Marriage of the Prince of Poland with the Princels Palatine of Neubourg, which will be celebrated here about the 25th of February. By the last advices from our Frontiers we are informed, e that the Tartars, who have their Station about Caminies, continue to infelt the Province of Ruffia with their frequent Incursions, which they make with that iwiftness, that they have for the most part executed their design before we know of their march, and no tooner do we hear of their being in one place, but they appear in another, to that our Troops are feldom able to meet with any of their Parties. have advice likewise, that another great Convoy is preparing at Juffi, the Capital City of Mildavia, for the relief of the Garifon of Caminiec, and that to conduct it thither a strong Party of Tartars was expected from Budziack. The King of Poland has given our Committions for the raising of divers new Regiments against the next Campagne, and the Officers are gone into the feveral Provinces of this Kingdom to make their Levies, which they are to have compleat by the end of April. At the same time other Preparations are likewile making in order to an early Campagne

Vienna, January 28. The Treaty between this Court and the Duke of Hanouer for 6000 men, to be fent by the latter to the Emperor's athitance in Hungary, feems to be to far advanced, that there is little doubt made of its speedy The Recruits and new Levies that conclution. were ordered to be made in Boltemia and Sile sia, are all compleat, and in the Quarters affigned them, from whence they will march towards *Hungary* fo foon as the Weather will permit; as will likewife the Forces from all other Quarters, in order to the opening the

Campagne very early the next Summer.

Bruffels, February 9. The Marquis de Bedmar our Maistre de Camp-General, and the Marquis de Grigny Lieutenant-General or the Horse, are returned hither from visiting the Garisons of Louvain, Namur, Mons, and Aeth. The Dutch Troops are moving this way, and will be so posted, that they may in 24 hours form a Body of 20000 men. Towards the Meuse the Confederates are likewise in a readiness to draw together upon any motion of the Enemies Forces. We are affired, that by the next Spanish Courier a very considerable Supply of Money will be remitted hither.

Falmouth. February 2. On Saturday last arrived here the Joseph of London from News and Antigon; They came from thence about two Months ago, and give an account, that Their Majesties Forces in those Parts were preparing to attack Guardalupa, and the other French Islands. Yesterday came in here a Ship of 18 Cuns belorging to Oftend, laden with Fruit and Wine from Malaga.

This day a Dutch Plimouth, February 3. Caper sent in to this Port a small Prize, which

they took on the Coast of France.

Harwich, February 4. Their Majesties Ship the Garland, Captain Rebinson Commander, 15 come in here, having on the 25th of the last Month taken a French Privateer, who yielded upon the first Broadlide.
