HER Majesty was this day pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, in pursuance of the provisions contained in the fourth and eighth sections of the twenty-first and twenty-second *Victoria*, chapter ninety, to nominate *David Caldwell McVail, Esquire, M.D.*, Physician to the Royal Infirmary, *Glasgow*, to be, for five years, a Member of the General Council of Medical Education and Registration of the United Kingdom, for *Scotland*, in the place of *Professor Sir George H. B. Macleod, Knight, M.D.*, deceased.

WHEREAS, by "The Foreign Marriage Act, 1892" (in this Order referred to as the Foreign Marriage Act), certain enactments relating to the marriage of British subjects outside the United Kingdom are consolidated, and Her Majesty the Queen in Council is authorized to make Regulations for the purposes therein specified:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers conferred by the said Act or otherwise enabling Her in this behalf, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

Embassy Marriages.

1. The person before and by whom a marriage under the Foreign Marriage Act may be solemnized and registered in an Embassy house in a foreign country shall either be the Ambassador, or the officer for the time being performing the duties of the Ambassador, or be any of the Secretaries attached to the Embassy from time to time appointed for the purpose in writing by the Ambassador or by the officer performing his duties; and for the purpose of marriages solemnized in such Embassy house, such Ambassador, officer performing his duties, or Secretary shall, without any marriage warrant, be a Marriage officer.

2. For the purpose of the Foreign Marriage Act and these Regulations, the house in which a British Ambassador resides in the foreign country to the Government of which he is accredited, or which is occupied by him in that country for the purposes of his Embassy, shall be deemed to be the official house of such Ambassador, and is in this Order referred to as the Embassy house, and every place within the precincts or curtilage of any such house, and any church or chapel annexed to such house, or for the time being used with the consent of the Government to which the Ambassador is accredited as the chapel thereof, shall be deemed to form part of the Embassy house.

For the purpose of marriages in an Embassy house, the expression "office," when used with respect to the place where any act or thing shall or may be done, shall be construed to refer to such part of the Embassy house as the Ambassador may from time to time appoint as being sufficiently accessible to the public.

Embassy and Consular Marriages.

3. Where a marriage can be solemnized at a British Consulate in a foreign country, the leave of the Ambassador shall be obtained before the marriage is solemnized in the Embassy house in that country.

4.—(1.) Where a marriage according to the local law of a foreign country is valid by English law, then before the marriage is solemnized in that country under the Foreign Marriage Act, whether in an Embassy house or at a Consulate, the Marriage officer must be satisfied either—

(a.) That both the parties are British subjects; or

(b.) If only one of the parties is a British subject, that the other is not a subject or citizen of the country; or

(c.) If one of the parties is a British subject, and the other a subject or citizen of the country, that sufficient facilities do not exist for the solemnization of the marriage in the foreign country in accordance with the law of that country.

(2.) If a marriage officer, by reason of anything in this Article, refuses to solemnize or allow to be solemnized in his presence the marriage of any person requiring such marriage to be solemnized, that person shall have the right of appeal to a Secretary of State given by section 5 of the Foreign Marriage Act.

5. In the case of any marriage under the Foreign Marriage Act, if it appears to the mar-

riage officer that the woman about to be married is a British subject, and that the man is an alien, he must be satisfied that the marriage will be recognized by the law of the foreign country to which the alien belongs.

6. The following modifications of the requirements of the Foreign Marriage Act as to residence and notice which appear to Her Majesty to be consistent with the observance of due precautions against the solemnization of clandestine marriages, shall have effect in cases where one only of the parties has dwelt within the district of the Marriage officer:—

(1.) A marriage may be solemnized under the Foreign Marriage Act in the official house of a Marriage officer in whose district one of the parties has dwelt—

(a.) If the marriage officer is satisfied that such notice as is mentioned below in Sub-Articles (3) and (4) of this Article, has been given of the intended marriage in the place where the other party has dwelt; or

(b.) If a Secretary of State is satisfied that the intended marriage is not clandestine, and that adequate notice has been given, and gives permission for the same to be solemnized.

(2.) In either case the oath, affirmation, or declaration under section 7 of the Foreign Marriage Act shall, in addition to the matters specified in sub-sections (a) and (c) of that section, state that one of the parties has for three weeks immediately preceding had his or her usual place of abode within the district of the marriage officer, and further state the place where the party who has not dwelt within that district has, within three months immediately preceding, had for three consecutive weeks his or her usual place of abode, and the notice which has been given in that place during those three weeks.

(3.) The notice to be given where the marriage is not solemnized with the special permission of a Secretary of State shall, if the party has dwelt in a foreign country, be given, entered, and posted up in the manner and during the period provided by the Foreign Marriage Act, in like manner as if the marriage were to be solemnized by or before a Marriage officer in that country, and the Marriage officer to whom the notice is given in that country shall, on payment of the proper fee, give a certificate that the notice has been so given and posted up, and that he is unaware of any impediment which should obstruct the solemnization of the marriage.

(4.) If the party dwells in a place in the United Kingdom, the notice shall be given in the like manner and on payment of the like fee as if that party were about to be married in that place, and in England or Ireland shall be given to the Superintendent Registrar or Registrar, and in Scotland shall be given by proclamation of banns; and the Superintendent Registrar or Registrar shall deal with the notice and give a certificate for marriage in like manner and on payment of the like fee as in the case of a marriage in his district; and the Session Clerk of the parish in which the banns were proclaimed in Scotland shall, in like manner and on payment of the like fee as in the case of a marriage in his district, give a certificate of proclamation of such banns.

Consular Marriages.

7. For the purpose of marriages to be solemnized by or before a marriage officer who is also a Consul as defined by the Foreign Marriage Act, every place within the curtilage or precincts of the house in which the Consul is for the time

being resident, or of the building which is for the time being used for the purpose of his office, shall be part of the official house of such marriage officer, and every place to which the public have ordinary access in such official house shall be deemed to be part of the office of such marriage officer.

Registration of Marriages by Foreign Law.

8.—(1.) A Consular officer shall not be required to attend at the solemnization of a marriage solemnized in accordance with the local law unless the marriage is solemnized at the place where he is appointed to reside, nor unless the proper fee has been previously paid to him.

(2.) The Consular officer shall forthwith, after the solemnization of the marriage, register the marriage in duplicate in books furnished to him by the Registrar-General through a Secretary of State for the purpose, separate from any register books provided for marriages solemnized by him, and shall register the same in accordance with section 9 of the Foreign Marriage Act, save that if the person by whom the marriage has been solemnized declines to sign the same, the Consular officer shall enter the name of that person, and the fact that he declines to sign the same.

(3.) The Consular officer shall transmit copies and the certificate and the book when filled in manner provided by section 10 of the Foreign Marriage Act.

(4.) Nothing in this Order shall authorize any officer who is not a Consular officer to register a marriage solemnized in accordance with the local law.

(5.) The expression "Consular officer" includes a Consul-General, Consul, Vice-Consul, Pro-Consul, Consular Agent, and any person for the time being authorized to discharge the duties of Consul-General, Consul, Vice-Consul, or Consular Agent.

High Commissioners, &c.

9.—(1.) A Secretary of State, by a written authority under section 11 of the Foreign Marriage Act, may authorize a person to act in the place of a High Commissioner or Resident mentioned in that section, outside of Her Majesty's dominions.

(2.) If a Secretary of State gives such authority, or, in pursuance of the said section, authorizes any High Commissioner, Resident, or other officer outside Her Majesty's dominions, not being an Ambassador or a Consul, to be a marriage officer, then, for the purpose of marriages solemnized and registered by or before any High Commissioner, Resident, or officer, or person so authorized, expressions in the Foreign Marriage Act shall be construed as follows:—

(a.) Expressions referring to the district of a marriage officer shall be construed to refer to the district for which such High Commissioner, Resident, or officer, or person is authorized to act for the purpose of the Foreign Marriage Act;

(b.) The expression "official house of a marriage officer" shall be construed to refer to the building or part of a building or place specified in the document by which he is authorized to act;

(c.) The expression "office," when used with respect to the place at which any act or thing shall or may be done, shall be construed to refer to such portion of the building, part, or place so specified as is ordinarily accessible to the public.

Her Majesty's Ships.

10.—(1.) Marriages, under the Foreign Mar-

riage Act, on board one of Her Majesty's vessels may be solemnized by or before a commanding officer of such rank and of such vessel as is for the time being authorized for that purpose by or in pursuance of any Admiralty instructions, and for the purpose of any such marriages a commanding officer so authorized shall, without any written warrant, be a Marriage officer, and, for the purpose of such marriages, expressions in the Foreign Marriage Act shall be construed as follows:—

- (a.) Expressions referring to the district of a marriage officer shall be construed to refer to such parts of the foreign station to which the commanding officer is attached as may be specified in that behalf by Admiralty instructions;
- (b.) The expression "official house of a marriage officer" shall be construed to refer to the vessel of the said commanding officer;
- (c.) The expression "office," when used with respect to the place where any act or thing shall or may be done, shall be construed to refer to the part of the ship on which public notices are affixed.

(2.) The commanding officer, before he solemnizes a marriage, shall be satisfied that, at the port or place where the marriage is solemnized, sufficient facilities do not exist for the solemnization of the marriage on land, either in accordance with the local law of the country or in accordance with the Foreign Marriage Act.

(3.) The requirements of the Foreign Marriage Act as to residence and notice shall be modified

as follows, namely, not less than three weeks' notice of the intended marriage must have been given in such public manner, or to such relatives or friends of the parties, as satisfies the commanding officer that as much notice of the intended marriage has been given as would be given if the marriage took place in England, and that the marriage is not clandestine.

11. The forms in the Schedule to this Order, or forms to the like effect, shall be used in all cases to which they are applicable.

Definitions, &c.

12. In this Order the expression "Ambassador" includes Minister and Chargé d'Affaires, and references to the Embassy or Embassy house shall be construed accordingly.

Other expressions have the same meaning as in the Foreign Marriage Act.

13. This Order shall come into operation on the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, and from and after that day the Order in Council made on the twenty-fourth November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, with respect to foreign marriages, shall be repealed.

14. This Order may be cited as "The Foreign Marriages Order in Council, 1892."

And the Right Honourable the Earl of Rosebery and the Most Honourable the Marquis of Ripon, two of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

3. Both I and C. D. have for three weeks immediately preceding this date had our usual place of abode within the district of [here insert the official title of the marriage officer, and, in the case of a Consul, the place where he is appointed to reside], that is to say, I at , and C. D., at .

4. Neither I nor C. D. is under the age of 21 years; [or, as the case may be, I am under the age of 21 years, but I am the widow of , who died on the day of , 18], [or I am under the age of 21 years, and the consent of G. H., whose consent

is required to my marriage, is given as shown by the writing under his hand now shown to me and marked .]

NOTE.—Where the requirements of the Foreign Marriage Act as to residence have been dispensed with, the form of paragraph 3 of the oath by A. B. will be as follows:—

I have for three weeks immediately preceding this date had my usual place of abode within the district of [here insert the official title of the marriage officer, and, in the case of a Consul, the place where he is appointed to reside], namely, at , and to the best of my knowledge and belief C. D. has, within three months immediately preceding this date, namely, for three consecutive weeks from the day of to the day of , had his [or her] usual place of abode at , and notice of our intended marriage has been given there during those weeks by , as appears by the certificate now shown to me and marked .

And the form of paragraph 3 of the oath by C. D. will be as follows:—

I have within three months immediately preceding this date, namely, for three consecutive weeks from the day of to the day of , had my usual place of abode at , and notice of our intended marriage was given there during those weeks by , as appears by the certificate now shown to me and marked , and to the best of my knowledge and belief A. B. has for three weeks immediately preceding this date had her [or his] usual place of abode within the district of [here insert the official title of the marriage officer, and, in the case of a Consul, the place where he is appointed to reside].

Where a Secretary of State has been satisfied that adequate notice has been given, and gives permission for the solemnization of the marriage, the form of so much of paragraph 3 of the oath as relates to the notice of the intended marriage will be as follows:—

A notice of our intended marriage has been given by [here state what notice has been given], as appears by the certificate [or other evidence of the notice] now shown to me and marked , and a Secretary of State has been satisfied that such notice is adequate and has given permission for the marriage to be solemnized.

N.B.—Any person entitled, under 51 & 52 Vict., cap. 46 (the "Oaths Act, 1888"), or otherwise, to affirm or declare, may make an affirmation or declaration in lieu of an oath.

No. 3.—Form of Certificate of Notice.

WHEREAS by "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it was (among other things) enacted that Her Majesty might from time to time, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, fix the establishment to be maintained by each of the General Lighthouse Authorities on account of the services of lighthouses, buoys, and beacons, or the annual or other sums to be paid out of the Mercantile Marine Fund in respect of such establishments, and that no increase of any establishment or part of an establishment so fixed should be made without the consent of the Board of Trade:

And whereas Her Majesty, by Orders in Council, dated the fourth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine, and the sixteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, was pleased to fix the establishment which might be maintained by the Corporation of Trinity House of Deptford Strond (hereinafter called the Trinity House) and to fix that in respect of such said establishment the aggregate amount of the salaries which under the provisions of the said Orders in Council should, for the time being, be paid to the officers of the said establishment should be paid out of the Mercantile Marine Fund:

And whereas it is expedient that the establishment by the said recited Orders fixed to be maintained as aforesaid by the Trinity House on account of the services of lighthouses, buoys, and beacons, should be varied in manner hereinafter appearing:

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that such variation in the establishment of the Trinity House mentioned herein has, in pursuance of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," been made with the consent of the Board of Trade:

And whereas it is not at present clear at what age it is compulsory on the officers of the Trinity House to retire from the lighthouse service, and it appears desirable that the regulations in respect of retirement from the public service contained in clause ten of an Order in Council dated the fifteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, should be made applicable to the Establishment of the Trinity House:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in Her by "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to revoke, and Her Majesty hereby revokes as from the twenty-sixth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, the Order in Council dated the fourth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine, relating to the Engineering Establishment of the Trinity House, and to fix, and doth hereby fix, the Engineering Establishment which may be maintained in lieu thereof as from the said twenty-sixth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, as follows, that is to say:—

One Engineer at a salary of eight hundred pounds per annum rising by increments of fifty pounds per annum, to a maximum of one thousand pounds per annum:

One Engineering Clerk at a salary of three hundred pounds per annum rising by increments of twenty pounds per annum to a maximum of four hundred and fifty pounds per annum, but each annual increment in the salary of the said Engineering Clerk shall be only granted on a Certificate by the Trinity House that the preceding year of his service has been distinguished by zeal, industry, and regularity:

Provided as follows:—

The salary of Mr. Thomas Williams, the present Engineering Clerk, shall as from the twenty-sixth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, be not less than four hundred and twenty pounds per annum:

And Her Majesty is further pleased, by and with the advice aforesaid, to direct as follows:—

(1.) The annual salary of Mr. Edgar G. Weller, one of the Second Class Clerks mentioned in the Schedule to the aforesaid Order in

Council dated the sixteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, shall as from the first day of April, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, be increased by thirty-seven pounds, provided his maximum salary of three hundred pounds per annum be not exceeded.

(2.) Any officer in the service of the Trinity House may on appointment to a post on their Establishment as fixed by Order in Council receive such salary as the Board of Trade may approve, not exceeding the maximum salary of such post as fixed by Order in Council.

And Her Majesty is further pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to direct that the following provisions in respect of retirement shall take effect from and after the date of this Order, that is to say:—

(1.) It shall be competent for the Trinity House to call upon any officer on their Establishment to retire at the age of sixty on such pension as by the length of his service he is qualified to receive.

(2.) Retirement shall be compulsory for every officer on the Establishment of the Trinity House on attaining sixty-five years of age, but in special cases the Board of Trade may, at the instance of the Trinity House, extend the employment of any such officer for a further period, in no case exceeding five years, on being satisfied that such officer's retirement at sixty-five would be detrimental to the interests of the lighthouse service.

And Her Majesty, by virtue and in further exercise of the power so vested in Her as aforesaid, and by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to fix, and doth hereby fix, that the salaries which, under the provisions of this present Order in Council, are, for the time being, payable to the officers of the Establishment of the Trinity House, shall be paid out of the Mercantile Marine Fund.

WHEREAS by section twenty-six of "The Pluralities Act 1838" after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may in some instances with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That when with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or district within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be

"annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes: and the said Archbishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested: and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas the Right Reverend Mandell, Lord Bishop of Peterborough, hath, pursuant to the enactment aforesaid, represented in a writing dated the twenty-seventh day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

"To the Most Reverend Father in God Edward White Lord Archbishop of Canterbury:—

"I the Right Reverend Mandell Lord Bishop of Peterborough do hereby represent to your Grace that there is in the county of Leicester within my diocese the perpetual curacy or vicarage of Market Harborough and that there is in the county of Northampton and within my said diocese the rectory of Bowden Parva.

"That the parishes of Market Harborough and Bowden Parva adjoin and are contiguous and the boundaries thereof are well known and defined.

"That according to the census of one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one the population of the parish of Market Harborough is two thousand one hundred and thirty-one, and the population of the parish of Bowden Parva one thousand four hundred and eighty-six.

"That the net annual value of the benefice of Market Harborough arising from glebe, Queen Anne's Bounty, Ecclesiastical Commissioners and Christ Church Oxford is two hundred and seventy-three pounds.

"That the net annual value of the benefice of Bowden Parva arising from glebe and houses (one hundred and fifty acres and five cottages) is three hundred and eighty pounds.

"That there is a church in each of the said parishes.

"That the church at Market Harborough affords accommodation for seven hundred persons and the church of Bowden Parva for two hundred and fifty persons.

"That with the exception of a pew assigned under and by virtue of the authority of a faculty bearing date the twenty-sixth day of July one thousand eight hundred and four to John West in the chancel of Bowden Parva church it does not appear that any of the inhabitants or parishioners of the said parishes possess any legal right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any pews or sittings in either of the said churches.

"That the patronage of the said vicarage of

Market Harborough is vested in me the said Mandell Lord Bishop of Peterborough by virtue of my bishoprick and that the patronage of the said rectory of Bowden Parva is vested jointly in the Reverend Thomas Frederick Jerwood Clerk in Holy Orders and his brother the Reverend John Barlow Jerwood as trustees under the will of the late T. J. Jerwood Esquire.

"That the Reverend Robert Guinness Clerk is the present vicar or incumbent of Market Harborough and the said Reverend Thomas Frederick Jerwood Clerk is the present rector of Bowden Parva.

"That the said Robert Guinness is desirous of relinquishing and the said Thomas Frederick Jerwood is desirous of having annexed to Bowden Parva aforesaid that portion of the parish of Market Harborough aforesaid known as Saint Mary-in-Arden described in the scheme hereunder written the population of which portion is about eight hundred but no transfer of the endowments of either of the said benefices is to be made.

"That it appears to me that under the provisions of the Act of Parliament of the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty chapter one hundred and six the portion of the parish of Market Harborough known as Saint Mary-in-Arden described in the scheme hereunder written may with advantage to the interests of religion be separated from the said parish of Market Harborough and annexed to the said parish of Bowden Parva for all ecclesiastical purposes.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the said Act of Parliament I have prepared the following scheme which I submit to Your Grace to the intent that Your Grace may if on full consideration and enquiry you shall be satisfied with such scheme certify the same to Her Majesty in Council.

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the consents of the patrons and of the incumbents of the said benefices, are as follows:—

" SCHEME.

"That the inhabitants residing within the said hereinbefore described portion of the parish of Market Harborough shall not be entitled to any pews or sittings or other accommodation within the church belonging to the said parish of Market Harborough but shall be entitled to accommodation in the said church of Bowden Parva and shall be exempt from all rates charges or assessments to be made for or in respect of the church within and belonging to the said parish of Market Harborough but shall be subject to all rates taxes charges or assessments made for or in respect of the church of Bowden Parva aforesaid.

In such partly walled graves and earthen graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order, viz.: widows, widowers, parents and children, as can be buried at or below that depth.

TUDHOE (BRANCEPETH).—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Tudhoe (Brancepeth), in the county of Durham; and also in the churchyard, except as follows:—

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

4. All vessels arriving in Cyprus from Kurrachi and any Persian port in the Persian Gulf shall, unless they have undergone quarantine at an intermediate port and are provided with a clean bill of health, be subjected to a quarantine of ten clear days, to be undergone at Larnaca.

5. All vessels arriving in Cyprus from Yemen and any port from Guardafui to Massowa inclusive, shall, unless they have undergone quarantine at an intermediate port and are provided with a clean bill of health, be subjected to a quarantine of ten clear days, to be undergone at Larnaca.

Government Notice. No. 162.

His Excellency the Governor, having heard the opinion of the Board of Health, has been pleased to direct that Government Notice No. 160 of the 15th October, 1892, is to be modified, and that the following regulations are to be observed, viz:—

1. Exclusion from the harbour (Sfratto) with provision for coaling under such restrictions as may in each case be directed by the Collector of Customs.

The following shall not be permitted to enter the harbour, but may be allowed to coal and take provisions in strict quarantine, with the least delay, and subject to the orders of the Collector of Customs: and shall in all cases be ordered, after coaling, to quit with all despatch.

(a.) Vessels with pilgrims from the East.

(b.) Vessels having cases of cholera on board.

(c.) Vessels which have had on board a case of diarrhoea, cholera, or any disease with symptoms resembling cholera either among the passengers or the crew.

(d.) Vessels from North or South America when cases of yellow fever have occurred on board during the voyage.

(e.) Vessels arriving from Arabian ports in the Red Sea which have not been admitted to free pratique at Suez and Port Said.

2. Quarantine for twenty-one days to be reckoned from the commencement of the voyage with provision for handling cargo in quarantine.

(a.) The following shall be subject to a period of twenty-one days' quarantine, but shall be permitted, under the directions of the Collector of Customs, to discharge goods (which are not suspected of communicating contagion) by means of the vessel's crew on lighters or to employ for coaling local labourers under twenty-one days' quarantine.

(b.) Vessels arriving from the Persian Gulf, the Arabian ports of the Red Sea, the Black Sea, French ports, Austro-Hungarian ports, Belgium, Holland, Germany, Denmark, the Baltic Sea, and the State of New York.

3. Quarantine ten days.

(a.) The following shall be subject to a period of ten days' quarantine.

(b.) Vessels arriving direct from Adalia and Jaffa and from the coast of Turkey in Asia between those ports, provided that, if such vessels had been admitted to pratique at intermediate ports, they are to be admitted to free pratique in these islands.

4. Medical Inspection.

(a.) All vessels arriving at Malta shall undergo strict medical inspection.

5. Passengers.

(a.) Passengers arriving by any vessel subject to exclusion from the harbours under paragraph 1 are not to be permitted to land.

(b.) Passengers will not be permitted to land at Malta unless they declare on oath before the Local Authorities that they have not resided or been in any port of Arabia, the Black Sea, France, Belgium, Holland, Germany, Denmark, Austria-Hungary, the Baltic Sea, or the State of New York, for twelve days previous to their arrival.

(c.) Passengers arriving direct from England on vessels having a duly qualified Medical Officer on board, are to be allowed to land without medical inspection or the declaration of not having been in an infected place, provided that the Medical Officer in charge on board shall declare on oath that during the voyage there has not been on board a case of dysentery, diarrhoea, cholera, cholera, or any disease with symptoms resembling cholera either among the passengers or the crew.

(d.) The declaration above referred to shall be countersigned by the master of the vessel.

6. Susceptible Goods.

(a.) The importation of the following articles is forbidden from any ports subjected to quarantine or from Italy or on vessels calling at any such ports:—Rags, cotton seed, raw silk, hair, and feathers; cotton seed, may however, be imported from Sicily, provided it be accompanied by a British Consular Certificate stating that it is the produce of that island.

(b.) The importation of soiled wearing apparel before disinfection is prohibited.

(c.) The importation of rags from Egypt is prohibited.

(d.) The importation of vines, vine shoots, vine leaves, or roots from any port of the Mediterranean is prohibited.

(e.) The importation of grapes, raisins, poles or supports used in the cultivation of vines, vegetable earth, vegetable or mixed manure, is prohibited unless importation is accompanied by a

sworn declaration, made by the shipper before the British Consular Authority of the place of its origin, to the effect that the shipment does not contain vine plants or cuttings, or that its contents come from nurseries, hothouses, fields, or gardens which are at least 200 yards distant from the nearest vines or vineyards, and that moreover the Phylloxera is not known to exist at the place of origin.

(f.) Provided, however, that the Collector of Customs may grant permission for the importation of plants and vegetable produce under proper restrictions when application has been made and the precautions necessary are established before the shipment leaves the place of origin.

In view of the decision of the Supreme Sanitary Corps in its Session of yesterday, and taking into consideration—

1. That it is necessary to adopt the most efficacious measures to guard against the invasion of the Republic by cholera, that a strict quarantine, conformable to the prescriptions of the Science and to what is laid down in the General Regulations, cannot yet be established for want of a Lazaretto and other causes.

It is decreed—

1st. That all the ports on the coast of the Republic be closed for vessels coming direct from the infected ports of Europe, and that have sailed from thence later than the 15th of August last.

2nd. That the ports of the coast be also closed for all vessels bringing foul bills of health, or that during the voyage have had any case which would alter the character of their bills of health.

3rd. That vessels proceeding from Europe, which have been received at other ports of the Pacific, undergone in any of them their quarantine, and bring clean bills of health without their character being changed by reason of any incident on the voyage, shall be subjected to a quarantine of observation.

4th. That the Health Committees on the coast shall determine in each case the duration of quarantine, being guided always by that which is set forth in Article 8 of the General Regulations,

and reporting fully to the Supreme Sanitary Corps that it may decide what is convenient in the matter before the vessels are placed in free pratique.

Royal Decree of October 28, 1892, declaring that Article IV of the Royal Decree of August, 1892, containing regulations against the introduction of cholera into the Kingdom, shall be altered into the following—

Paragraph 1. When a vessel, as directed by Article II, has arrived at a station of observation, it shall remain there with its crew, passengers, and cargo for twelve hours, to be examined by the doctor stationed there, excepting in the cases stated in paragraph 3; the doctor can however extend the time of observation to a period not exceeding forty-eight hours, if circumstances require such an extension.

Paragraph 2. If there should be no reason to suppose that cholera can be brought in by the persons or cargo on board, the vessel, on the expiry of the time of observation, may, with crew, passengers, and cargo, continue her journey, as soon as the doctor shall have given written permission according to the form prescribed by the Board of Health.

Paragraph 3. If, however, it happens that the vessel, during her journey, has had on board sick persons or deaths from cholera or from a disease suspected to be cholera, or should such a disease manifest itself on board while the vessel is in the quarantine station, or should there exist on board clothes or bedding or other similar goods or effects through which it is suspected that cholera might be introduced, then the vessel shall at once be sent to the quarantine station in order to perform quarantine there.

The Board has likewise suppressed the medical visit hitherto applied to arrivals from the coast of Syria, extending between Beyrut and Jaffa.

WHEREAS by Section 27 (1) of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1891, it is enacted that:—

“The occupier of every factory and workshop (including any workshop conducted on the system of not employing any child, young person, or

woman therein) and every contractor employed by any such occupier in the business of the factory or workshop shall, if so required by the Secretary of State by an Order made in accordance with section sixty-five of the principal Act, and subject to any exceptions mentioned in the Order, keep in the prescribed form and with the prescribed particulars lists showing the names of all persons directly employed by him, either as workman or as contractor, in the business of the factory or workshop, outside the factory or workshop, and the places where they are employed, and every such list shall be open to inspection by any Inspector under the principal Act or by any officer of a sanitary authority.”

Now I, the Right Honourable Herbert Henry Asquith, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by this Order, made under section 65 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1878, and section 27 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1891, require the occupier of every factory and workshop (including any workshop conducted on the system of not employing any child, young person, or woman therein), and every contractor employed by any such occupier in any of the businesses mentioned in the Schedule hereunder, to keep in the form, and with the particulars hereunder prescribed, lists showing the names of all persons directly employed by him, either as workman or as contractor, in the said business outside the factory or workshop, and the places where they are employed, and every such list shall be open to inspection by any inspector under the Factory and Workshop Act, 1878, or by any officer of a sanitary authority.

The Order of the 18th July, 1892, under the above recited enactments, is hereby revoked.

This Order shall come into effect on the 20th day of November, 1892, and shall continue in force until revoked.

GENERAL ORDER of the Local Government Board: Allowance of Tobacco and Snuff to certain Paupers in the Workhouse :—

To the Guardians of the Poor of the several Unions and Separate Parishes in England and Wales ;—

And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS by certain General and other Orders the Poor Law Commissioners, the Poor Law Board, and the Local Government Board, have made Rules and Regulations with regard to the government of the Workhouses of the said several Unions and Separate Parishes :

And whereas it is expedient that further provision should be made as hereinafter mentioned :

Now therefore, We, the Local Government Board, in pursuance of the powers given to Us by the Statutes in that behalf, hereby Order that, from and after the date hereof, the following regulations shall be in force in the said several Unions and Separate Parishes,—

ARTICLE I.—Tobacco or snuff may be allowed to such of the inmates of the Workhouse, who are not able-bodied, or are employed upon work of a specially disagreeable character, as the Guardians may consider should be supplied with the same, the quantity to be allowed in each case, or in any class of cases, to be such as the Guardians may by resolution prescribe.

ARTICLE II.—So much of each of the said Orders as provides that no pauper shall smoke

in any room in the Workhouse, except by the special direction of the Medical Officer, shall be rescinded, but the Guardians may from time to time, by resolution, determine in what rooms and at what times smoking shall be allowed, and no pauper shall smoke in the Workhouse in any other room or at any other time than is so allowed.

ARTICLE III.—In this Order,—

The word "Union" includes any Union of Parishes incorporated or united for the relief or maintenance of the Poor under any Act of Parliament ;

The term "Separate Parish" means a Parish or Place which is under a separate Board of Guardians ;

The word "Guardians" includes any Governors, Directors, Managers, Acting Guardians, Vestrymen, or other Officers appointed or entitled to act in the distribution or ordering of relief to the Poor from the Poor Rates under any Act of Parliament.
