Poplar District Electric Lighting (Provisional Order).

(Application to the Board of Trade under the Electric Lighting Acts, 1882 and 1888, for a Provisional Order, enabling the Board of Works for the Poplar District to produce and supply Electric Light for Public and Private Purposes within the Poplar District, and to levy, make, and recover Rates and Charges therefor; to break up Streets, Tramways, and Railways, and to cross Rivers, Navigations, and Canals; to construct Works, and lay Electric Lines; to manufacture, hire, sell, and let Electric Apparatus; and other incidental Powers.)

NOTICE is hereby given, that the Board of Works for the Poplar District (hereinafter called "the Board"), and whose address is 117, High-street, Poplar, London, E., intend to apply to the Board of Trade, on or before the 21st day of December next, for a Provisional Order, under the Electric Lighting Acts, 1882 and 1888, for the following purposes, or some of them, that is to say:—

1. To enable the Board to make and maintain, on any lands now belonging to them or which they may hereafter acquire, works for the production, storage, supply, and distribution of electricity, and to supply the same for all or any public and private purposes within the Poplar District, as defined by the Metropolis Local Management Act, 1855 (hereinafter called the "area of supply"), and to exercise (with or without modification) with respect to such production, storage, supply, and distribution, all or any of the powers of the Electric Lighting Acts, 1882 and 1888, and any Act amending or extending the same respectively, and such other rights and powers as may be conferred by the intended Order, including the power to levy, charge, and recover rates, rents, and charges, for the supply of electricity, and to make, lay down, erect, construct, and place all such works, buildings, engines, dynamos, meters, machinery, mains, wires, pipes, conductors, accumulators, apparatus, matters, and things as may be necessary or expedient for all or any of the purposes aforesaid.

2. The following are the names of the streets in which it is proposed that electric lines should be laid down within a specified time, that is to say:—
