Board of Trade (Harbour Department), London, November 8, 1892.

THE Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Telegram, dated 8th November, 1892, from Her Majesty's Representative at Lisbon, stating that Amsterdam is declared infected with cholera, and all other Dutch ports suspected, from the 1st instant.

THE Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch, dated 5th November, 1892, from Her Majesty's Representative at Rome, enclosing the following Translation of a Decree issued on the 28th ultimo: - The Sanitary Ordinances of the 27th August and 14th October, 1892, are hereby extended, and the introduction into the Kingdom, by land or sea, from France and Austro-Hungary, of bedding in use is prohibited, even though it be not destined for commerce.

THE Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of the following Telegrams from Her Majesty's Representatives at Constantinople, Athens, and Madrid :-

" Constantinople, November 9, 1892. "Quarantine on arrivals from Italy, Egypt, and Montenegro, with passengers on board, reduced to three days; without passengers on board, medical visit only required.

"Quarantine on arrivals from New York suppressed, and medical visit substituted.

Quarantine on arrivals from every part of the North of Europe and South of France reduced to five days."

"Athens, November 9, 1892. "Medical inspection substituted for quarantine on arrivals from London, Liverpool, Swansra, Grimsby, and Shields, sailing on or after the 22nd ultimo."

"Madrid, November 9, 1892. " Free pratique allowed to arrivals from Rotterdam, which sailed after the 7th instant."

Board of Trade (Harbour Department), London, November 10, 1892.

THE Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch, dated 3rd November, 1892, from Her Majesty's Representative at Sofia, stating that ships in ballast arriving at Varna or Bourgas, as well as at ports on the Danube, will have to undergo quarantine, if they have touched at any port of an infected country.

The port of Sistov has now been opened to

both travellers and goods.

The entrance of macaroni and other farinaceous products into Bulgaria is prohibited.

THE Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch, dated 8th November, 1892, from Her Majesty's Representative at Stettin, enclosing a notice issued by the Police Director at that port. The following is an extract therefrom :-

November 5, 1892.

No case of cholera having occurred at Stettin since the 16th October, 1892, and therefore as I conclude that the cholera has terminated, I abolish herewith all my notices and probibitions, &c. In respect to the combatting and prevention of the spread of cholera, only those prohibitions remain that give effect to the hindrance of importing cholera from infected places and countries.
