Milan, January 31. We have an account by the last Letters from Montferrat, that the People on this lide the River Tanero have agreed with Prince Eugene of Savoy about the Sublistence for the Imperial Troops quartered in that Country, but that those on the other fide of the River do still refuse to pay any Contributions, and that Prince Eugene was thereupon expecting Directions, whother he should make use of Military Execution. Our Governor has received this week, by an Express from Spain, Bills for a considerable Sum of Money.

Vienna, February 4. Our Letters from Hungary arrive so slowly by reason of the ill Weather, that we have but now received the Particulars of those Actions of Colonel Polland, which we made mention of some time ago. He sent the Rascian Captain Antonio with a Party to seize some Cattel which grazed near Fackor, a place fortified with a good Trench and Palisadoes not far from Caranseser. The Turkish Garison sallied out to oppose them, but were soon beaten back by the Rascians, who pursued them so closely, that they entred with them into the place, where they cut 500 Turks in pieces, and plundered and burnt the Town; afterwards, with the assistance of some Germans, they took another Fort called Waradia, where they killed 200 Turks, and set fire to the place. Some days after a considerable Body of Valachians (who designed to joyh with 14 or 1500 Tartars that lay within 8 Leagues at Linga under the command of Sulsan Gasa) endeavoured with 14 or 15000 Tartars that lay within 8 Leagues of Lippa under the command of Sulsan Galga) endeavoured to force the Pass called *Illehdia* near Garassistes, but Coto force the Pals called Illehalia near Garanjebs, but Colonel Polland and Captain Antonio were ready to receive them, which they did with that bravery, that they killed 300 of the Enemy, and recovered a great deal of Booty. They write from Transilvania, that Lieutenant-Golonel Savire, who was commanded with a Party of 400 Horse to visit the Frontiers of Valachia, returned the 14th of the last Month to Gransiade, after having made an Incursion last Month to Cronstadt, after having made an Incursion into that Province as far as Campolungo, within 2 Leagues of which place Teckeley lay encamped, his Froops, as the Country People as well as the Prisoners, reported, being in a very ill condition, and several of his Party descripting daily. These Letters tell us likewise, that the Manquis Doria has once more obtained leave of Teckeley to return hither upon his Parole, but that General Heaster is absolutely denied his Liberty, till the whole Ransom be paid which is demanded for him. From Buda we hear, that the Fortifications of that place are carried on with great diligence, notwithstanding the extream Rigours and Severities of the Season. We have such advects from Turker, which say, that the Commonalty there desire nothing more than a Peace, and that they grow weary of the French for their insupportable Bravadoes and Insolencies, having killed a Turk publickly in the Market-place at Galata, which however the Caimacan durit not refert, for fear of disobliging the French Ambasilador; who (they say) has lately obliging the French An ballador; who (they fay) has lately fint 40000 Crowns to Teckeley. 'I's said, that the Imperial Forces, which are appointed to serve against the Turks the next Campagne; consist of 23800 Foot, 12816 Horse, and 10000 Drogoons, in all 51616 Men, without reckoning the Auxiliary Troops.

Fransfort, February 11. The Elector of Bavaria affieved here last night, and intends to morrow to continuo his Journey towards Holland. The Hasfars, who are posted

posted near the Rhine, make frequent Incursions into the Enemies Quarters, and with very good Success.

Cologne, February 13. The Letters from the Upper Rhine inform us, that the Marquis a Uxelles, who passed the Rhine at Hunningen with 5 or 6000 Men the 21st of the last Month, designing to make an Incursion towards Frithall and the Forest Towns, was retired again, and had sent back his Troops to their several Quarters, upon the intermation he received, that the Germans were drawing together from all the Neighbouring Garisons to oppose them. A Party of Brandenburghers, quartered in this Dioces, have lately made an Incursion into the French Territories, from whence they brought back a good Booty.

Paris, February 13. The last Letters from Piedmont give an account, that Monsieur Catinat and the Marquis de Feaquieres having formed a design upon Veillane, they marched thither on the 26th of the last Month, in the night, the first from Susa, and the other from Pignarol, each with a Detachement of about 1500 Foot and 800 Holse, and several Pieces of Cannon; But the Marquis de Faquiere: arriving there some hours before Monsieur Catinat.
