A PROCLAMATION

Requiring all Seamen and Mariners to Render themselves to Their Majesties Service.

MARIE R.

W Hereas divers Seamen and Mariners have lately left their usual and ordinary Places of Abode, and have removed themselves into some private and obscure Places, endeavouring thereby to avoid or escape from Our present Service: We therefore, by the Advice of Our Privy-Council, have thought fit to Publish this Our Royal Proclamation; And do hereby strictly Charge and Command all Seamen and Mariners remaining in any County of England or Wales, and not Listed in Our Service, That they forthwith Render themselves unto the Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy in London, or to the Commissioners of the Navy at Chatham, or to the Commissioners of the Navy at Portsmouth, or to the Store-keeper and Muster-master for the Navy at Harwich for the time being, or to Henry Greenhill Agent for the Navy at Plymouth, or to Robert Henley at Bristol, or to Samuel Atkinson at Highlake and Liverpool, or to the respective Collectors of the Customs for the several Ports and Places following, viz. Ipswich, Wells, Lynn, Boston, Scarborough, Sunderland, Whitby, Southampton, Cowes, Poole, Weymouth, Lyme, Topsham, Dartmouth, Falmouth, Looe, Fowy, Truro, Pembroke, Newcastle, Hull, and Great Yarmouth, in order to their being Received into Pay, and Sent on Board such of Our Ships as shall be found most expedient for Our Service; And if any of them shall hereafter be found out, or discovered, to have neglected to Obey this Our Royal Command, they shall be proceeded against with all Severity. And We do hereby Require all Mayors, Bayliffs, Sheriffs, Justices of the Peace, Constables, and other Officers to whom it doth or may appertain, That they cause diligent Search to be made within all and every their Precincts for the said Seamen and Mariners, and to Seize and Secure the Persons of such of them as shall be there found, and also all loose and unknown Persons whatsoever, who may justly be suspected to be Seamen or Watermen, and Cause them to be sent to the Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy in London, or to such other of the Persons and Places aforesaid, to which they may most conveniently be sent, in order to their being Employed in Our Service; And also send up to Our Privy-Council a List of the Names of all such Seamen and Mariners as they shall procure for the service aforesaid, together with the Names of the respective Persons to whom, and Places to which, they shall send them. And the said Principal Officers and Commissioners, and other Persons aforesaid, shall give Receipts in Writing for the several Seamen and Mariners delivered to them in pursuance hereof. And we do hereby strictly Charge and Command, That no Person or Persons whatsoever do presume to Conceal, or to Further or Favour the Escape of any Seamen or Mariners, or loose and unknown Persons aforesaid, upon Pain that all and singular Persons offending herein, be forthwith committed to Prison by the next Justice of the Peace, or other Magistrate, and Prosecuted with all Severity according to Law, as Persons Conspiring against Us and the Safety of Our Kingdom. And We are hereby pleased further to make

known, That we have given effectual Orders to the respective Officers and Persons herein above appointed, to Receive the said Men, and for Paying forthwith to the Conductors the Imprest and Conduct-Money Disbursed upon this Service.

Given at Our Court at Whitehall the Ninth Day of February, 1690. In the Second Year of Our Reign.

Milan, January 31. We have an account by the last Letters from Montserrat, that the People on this side the River Tanero have agreed with Prince Eugene of Savoy about the Subliffence for the Imperial Troops quartered in that Country, but that those on the other side of the River do still refuse to pay any Contributions, and that Prince Eugene was thereupon expecting Directions, whether he should make use of Military Execution. Our Governor has received this week, by an Express from Spain, Bills for a considerable Sum of Money.

Vienna, February 4. Our Letters from Hungary arrive so slowly by reason of the ill Weather, that we have but now received the Particulars of those Actions of Colonel Polland, which we made mention of some time ago. He sent the Rascian Captain Antonio with a Party to seize some Cattel which grazed near Fackot, a place fortified with a good Trench and Palisades not far from Caranfibes. The Turkish Garison sallied out to oppose them, but were soon beaten back by the Rascians, who pursued them so closely, that they entred with them into the place, where they cut 500 Turks in pieces, and plundered and burnt the Town; afterwards, with the assistance of some Germans, they took another Fort called Waradia, where they killed 200 Turks, and set fire to the place. Some days after a considerable Body of Valachians (who delighted to joyn with 14 or 15000 Tartars that lay within 8 Leagues of Lippa under the command of Sulan Galza) endeavoured to force the Pass called Illebdia near Caranfibes, but Colonel Polland and Captain Antonio were ready to receive them, which they did with that bravery, that they killed 300 of the Enemy, and recovered a great deal of Booty. They write from Transilvania, that Lieutenant-Colonel Savire, who was commanded with a Party of 400 Horse to visit the Frontiers of Valachia, returned the 14th of the last Month to Cronstadt, after having made an excursion into that Province as far as Campolungo, within 2 Leagues of which place Teckelely lay encamped, his Troops, as the Country People as well as the Prisoners, reported, being in a very ill condition, and several of his Party deserting daily. These Letters tell us likewise, that the Marquis Doria has once more obtained leave of Teckelely to return hither upon his Parole, but that General Huzler is absolutely denied his Liberty, till the whole Ransom be paid which is demanded for him. From Buda we hear, that the Fortifications of that place are carried on with great diligence, notwithstanding the extream Rigours and Severities of the Season. We have fresh advices from Turkey, which say, that the Commonalty there desire nothing more than a Peace, and that they grow weary of the French for their insupportable Bravadoes and Insolencies, having killed a Turk publicly in the Market-place at Galata, which however the Caimacan durst not resent, for fear of disobliging the French Ambassador; who (they say) has lately sent 40000 Crowns to Teckelely. The Emperor's Envoy to Moscovy parted from hence on Monday last. 'Tis said, that the Imperial Forces, which are appointed to serve against the Turks the next Campaign, consist of 28800 Foot, 12816 Horse, and 10000 Dragoons, in all 51616 Men, without reckoning the Auxiliary Troops.

Frankfort, February 11. The Elector of Bavaria arrived here last night, and intends to morrow to continue his Journey towards Holland. The Hussars, who are posted

posted near the Rhine, make frequent Incurfions into the Enemies Quarters; and with very good Succels.

Cologne, February 13. The Letters from the Upper Rhine inform us, that the Marquis d'Uxelles, who pallid the Rhine at Humingen with 5 or 6000 Men the 21st of the last Month, designing to make an Incurfion towards Frisball and the Forest Towns, was retired again, and had sent back his Troops to their several Quarters, upon the information he received, that the Germans were drawing together from all the Neighbouring Garifons to oppose them. A Party of Brandenburgers, quartered in this Diocefs, have lately made an Incurfion into the French Territories, from whence they brought back a good Booty.

Hamburg, February 13. The Duke of Zed has been obliged by a hurt in his Leg to defer his Journey to Holland for some days; But his Highness is now so well, that he intends in few days to set out towards the Hague.

Paris, February 13. The last Letters from Piedmont give an account, that Monsieur Catinat and the Marquis de Feuquieres having formed a design upon Veilane, they marched thither on the 26th of the last Month, in the night, the first from Susa, and the other from Pignerol, each with a Detachment of about 1500 Foot and 800 Horse, and several Pieces of Cannon; But the Marquis de Feuquieres arriving there some hours before Monsieur Catinat, (whose march proved to be more difficult by reason of the badness of the Ways) and being, as 'tis believed, desirous to have alone the honour of the Enterprize, he fell on without staying for Monsieur Catinat, but met with so stout a resistance from the Garifon, that after the loss of many of his Men, being himself wounded in the Face and the Thigh, he was forced to retire, which they within the place no sooner perceived, but they made a vigorous Sally, and took two Field-pieces, and most of our Ammunition. In the mean time Monsieur Catinat came up, and finding the disorder the Troops of the Marquis de Feuquieres's Detachment were in, he thought fit to retire towards Susa. By an Express from Rome we have advice, that the Pope was taken ill on the 13th of the last Month, and that he had had a Fever for several days, but was much better when this Courier came away. The Count d'Estree is arrived at Toulon, and the Chevalier de Noailles at Marseilles; the latter is to command the Galleys which are fitting out there, and 'tis said, that with these are to Joyn 10 or 12 Men of War, in order to attack Nice by Sea, while Monsieur Catinat does the like by Land. Another Venetian Ship has been brought in to Marseilles, which has renewed the Complaint of the Ambassador from that Republick, though with little appearance of his obtaining Satisfaction. We are told, that the Marquis de Croissy has positively declared to the Pope's Nuncio, that if the Bulls be not dispatched for the French Bishops, in pursuance of the Concordat between Leo the Tenth and Francis the First, before Easter next, the King will take new Measures; and at the same time Orders have been sent to the Duke de Guines, our Ambassador at Rome, to press that Court for a final and positive Answer in this matter. The Archbishop of Besen is lately dead in the 87th Year of his Age.

Brussels, February 14. Our Governor-General the Marquis de Gastanaga parted from hence yesterday for Antwerp, where he will stay to dispatch the Spanish Courier, and then proceed on his Journey to the Hague. The States of Brabant assembled here the same day; to whom it has been proposed, that for the future they themselves shall pay the Troops that are upon the Reparation of this Province, viz. 12 Regiments of Foot, 2 of Horse, and one of Dragoons, out of the Subsidies by them granted; which they have now under Consideration, and 'tis not doubted but 'twill take effect, and that the like will be done by the States of the other Provinces. On the 9th instant arrived here a Dutch Regiment of Foot from Maastricht.

Hague, February 17. On Wednesday last His Majesty was present in the Council of State, and was pleased to go from thence with all the Members of the said Council in a Body to the Assembly of the States-General, where the State of the War was delivered in for the present Year 1691. On the 17th His Majesty treated the Elector of Brandenburg at his House in the Wood; And on the 15th his Electoral Highness entertained His Majesty at his Envoy's House where He is lodged. The Elector of Bavaria came hither last night. The Prince Administrator of Wirtemberg, Prince Wicdecke, and the Count de Winditzgratz the Emperor's Plenipotentiary, are likewise arrived here. The Landgrave of Hesse, and the Governor of Flanders are expected in a day or two; and the Duke

The Duke of Hanover has sent hither Monsieur Gluck to Compliment His Majesty; and the like has been done by the Ministers from the Elector of Saxony, the Elector Palatine, the Electors of Mainz, Trier, and Cologne, and other Princes of the Empire. Lieutenant-General Webbomus, Governor of Breda, was two days ago seized with an Apoplexy, of which 'tis feared he will hardly recover.

Plimouth, February 8. Yesterday came into this Port two Dutch Capers, to look after their Prizes which they sent in lately, laden with Wine, Brandy, and Salt.

These are to give notice, That for preventing any Irregular Proceedings for the future, by the Officers employed in Impressing Men for Their Majesties Fleet, two Captains are appointed to go daily on Board the Vessels lying in the River of Thames for Impressing Men, who are directed upon their finding any Men on Board them unfit for Their Majesties Service, to cause them to be immediately discharged. Which two Captains are to be heard of every day at the Navy-Office in Crutched-Fryers, London.
