HEREAS by the first section of "The Colonial Probates Act, 1892," it is enacted as follows :-

"Her Majesty the Queen may, on being satisfied that the legislature of any British possession has made adequate provision for the recognition in that possession of probates and letters of administration granted by the Courts of the United Kingdom, direct by Order in Council that this Act shall, subject to any exceptions and modifications specified in the Order, apply to that possession, and thereupon, while the Order is in

force, this Act shall apply accordingly."

And whereas Her Majesty is satisfied that the Legislatures of the British Possessions hereinafter mentioned have made adequate provision for the recognition in those Possessions of probates and letters of administration granted by the Courts of the United Kingdom.

Now therefore Her Majesty by virtue and in exercise of the powers by the above recited Act in Her Majesty vested is pleased by and with the advice of Her Most Honourable Privy Council to

order and it is hereby ordered as follows:
"The Colonial Probates Act 1892" shall apply to the British Possessions hereunder mentioned :-

HEREAS by an Order in Council made in pursuance of the "Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," and dated the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, Her Majesty on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade was pleased to direct that on and after the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, the Regulations contained in the Schedule thereto should, so far as regards British ships and boats, be substituted for the Regulations contained in the First Schedule to an Order in Council made as aforesaid, and dated the fourteenth day of August, one thousand

eight hundred and seventy-nine.

And whereas by two Orders in Council made in pursuance of the said Act, and on such joint recommendation as aforesaid, and dated respectively the thirtieth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, and the twentyfourth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, certain modifications and additions were made to the said Regulations contained in the schedule to the said recited Order in Council of the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, as regards British fishing vessels and boats.

And whereas by another Order in Council made in pursuance of the said Act and on such joint recommendation as aforesaid and dated the eighteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, certain modifications and additions were made to the said regulations contained in the schedule to the said recited Order in Council of eleventh August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, as regards steam Pilot

And whereas by the said Regulations contained in the schedule to the said Order in Council of the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, it is amongst other things provided as follows:---

ARTICLE 3. A seagoing steam ship when under

way shall carry

- (a.) On or in front of the foremast, at a height above the hull of not less than twenty feet, and if the breadth of the ship exceeds twenty feet, then at a height above the hull not less than such breadth, a bright white light, so constructed as to show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of twenty points of the compass, so fixed as to throw the light ten points on each side of the ship, viz. :- from right ahead to two points abaft the beam on either side, and of such a character as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least five miles.
- (b.) On the starboard side, a green light so constructed as to show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of ten points of the compass, so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to two points abast the beam on the starboard side, and of such a character as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least two miles.
- (c.) On the port side, a red light, so constructed as to show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of ten points of the compass, so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to two points abaft the beam on the port side, and of such a character as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least two miles.
- (d.) The said green and red side lights shall be fitted with inboard screens projecting at least three feet forward from the light, so as to prevent these lights from being seen across the bow.

ARTICLE 15. If two ships under steam are meeting end on, or nearly end on, so as to involve risk of collision, each shall alter her course to starboard, so that each may pass on the port side of the other.

This Article only applies to cases where ships are meeting end on, or nearly end on, in such a manner as to involve risk of collision, and does not apply to two ships which must, if both keep on their respective courses, pass clear of each other.

The only cases to which it does apply are, when each of the two ships is end on, or nearly end on, to the other; in other words, to cases in which, by day, each ship sees the masts of the other in a line or nearly in a line, with her own; and by night to cases in which each ship is in such a position as to see both the side lights of the other.

It does not apply, by day, to cases in which a ship sees another ahead crossing her own course; or by night, to cases where the red light of one ship is opposed to the red light of the other, or where the green light of one ship is opposed to the green light of the in the Schedule hereunto annexed:

other, or where a red light without a green light, or a green light without a red light, is seen alread, or where both green and red lights are seen anywhere but ahead.

And whereas there has been doubt or misapprehension concerning the effect of the said two Articles and whereas the Admiralty and the Board of Trade have jointly recommended to Her Majesty to make the following additions to the said Regulations for the purpose of explaining the the said recited Articles and of removing the said

doubt or misapprehension.

Now therefore Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct that, from the date of this Order the Regulations contained in the Schedule to the said Order in Council of the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, shall be further modified by the addition to the said recited Article three of the provisions contained in the Schedule hereto. SCHEDULE.

(e.) To ensure that the red and green side lights shall show an uniform light from right ahead of the ship to two points abaft the beam on the port and starboard sides respectively, and shall not show across the bow of the ship itself, the said lights must be fixed and the screens fitted so that the rays from the red and green lights shall cross the line of the ship's keel projected ahead of the ship

at a reasonable distance ahead of the ship. With regard to all vessels whose lights are inspected by the officers of the Board of Trade the red or green side light will not be deemed to be fixed and fitted in accordance with the Regulations unless it is so fixed and screened that a line drawn from the outside edge of the wick to the foremost end of the inboard screen of such light shall make an angle of four degrees or as near thereto as may be practicable with a line drawn parallel with the keel of the ship from the outside edge of the wick.

And whereas the Corporation of the Guild or Brotherhood of Masters and Pilots Seamen of the Trinity House in Kingston-upon-Hull, being a Pilotage authority within the meaning of the said Act, in exercise of the powers vested in them by that Act, made and submitted for the consent of Her Majesty certain Bye-laws and Rates of Pilotage for the Port of Wisbech, which were approved by Order in Council dated the twenty-ninth day of January one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine:

And whereas it has been deemed expedient by the said Corporation to repeal the said Bye-laws and Rates of Pilotage, and to make new Rates of Pilotage and Bye-laws in lieu thereof, as set forth

Bye-laws.

1. A Pilot Master shall be appointed by and during the pleasure of the Sub-Commissioners to direct the Pilots to take their respective turns in piloting ships and vessels inwards and outwards, the times at, order and numbers in, and distances to which they shall go, and to regulate their con-

duct generally.
2. The Pilots shall in all things relating to the performance of their various duties submit to the direction and management, and strictly conform

to the instructions of the Pilot Master.

3. The Pilots shall take charge of vessels into and out of the port and harbour of Wisbech and the waters thereof and from the town of Wisbech through the Cross Keys Bridge to the Lower Roads at Sea outwards and from the said Lower Roads at Sea through the Cross Keys Bridge to the said town of Wisbech inwards and from and to all intermediate places between the said town and the said Lower Roads, and also (if and when required by the Master of the vessel) from the said Lower Roads to and across the bar, and to the Roaring Middle Buoy, outwards; and from the Roaring Middle Buoy to and across the bar and to the said Lower Roads, inwards; and from and to all intermediate places between the said Lower Roads and the Roaring Middle Buoy; and each ship or vessel shall be brought up from the Eye or from the said Lower Roads or from any place between the said Lower Roads and the Roaring Middle Buoy if required, by the Pilots in | or Roaring Middle Buoy, if required.

their regular turns in the order and succession in which each vessel shall have passed or shall pass the Bar Buoy (if brought up from below the Lower Roads) or the West Mark Knock Beacon (if brought up from the Eye or the Lower Roads) and not otherwise unless by the consent of the Master or Owner of the vessel which shall have previously arrived at the Bar Buoy or West Mark Knock Beacon (as the case may be) ; or for want of water.

4. Every Pilot shall use his utmost care and diligence to conduct vessels under his charge safely and without damage to other vessels and shall behave himself with strict sobriety and with due respect towards the Owners Masters and Officers of vessels in his charge.

5. The Pilot shall without delay report any accident occurring to any vessel in his charge to the Pilot Master who shall report the same in writing to the Sub-Commissioners together with any particulars or explanation with regard thereto.

6. Every Pilot shall always on arrival at Sutton Bridge or Wisbech report immediately to the Pilot Master at Sutton Bridge and to the Harbour Master at Wisbech of what ship he has been on board and where he has left her.

7. If any Pilot shall by accident or otherwise lay any ship aground which he shall have in charge, such Pilot shall not of his own accord

under any pretence whatever leave the ship until

she shall be afloat and in safety.

8. The Pilots shall (when required by the Pilot Master) attend every day at the Pilot Office when not employed in piloting from the beginning of flood until high water and at other times of the day (if required by the Pilot Master) to receive his orders and directions.

9. No Pilot who shall have the charge of any ship or vessel lying in the Roads, or at any place between the Roads and the town of Wisbech or between the Roads and the Roaring Middle Buoy, either inward or outward bound, shall leave such ship or vessel and go on shore without first obtaining permission from the Muster of such ship or vessel.

10. Ships or vessels delivering at or loading from the Eye shall pay the same rate of pilotage is vessels from the Eye to and through the Cross Keys Bridge but Pilots shall take charge of such ships or vessels to the Lower Roads or Bar Buoy

11. Pilots taking charge of letters shall deliver the same to the Master or other proper persons on board ships or vessels on their arrival in the

12. The Pilots shall make report to the Pilot Master of any buoy or beacon misplaced or lost and shall also in equal numbers and by equal terms under the directions of the Pilot Master assist in laying the buoys, setting the beacons, and shifting the same in the Channel, and shall also in regular turns hang out night lights and do all other matters and things necessary to be done by the Pilots under the direction and according to the orders of the Pilot Master or of the Sub-Commissioners.

13. All the Pilots shall observe particularly any alteration which may take place in the Channel and report from time to time such altera-

tion to the Pilot Master.

14. Every Pilot shall immediately after the receipt by him of any pilotage money pay the same over and render a true account thereof to Pilot Master, or other person appointed for that purpose at the Pilot Office and enter in the proper and usual book the name of the vessel piloted, and of the Master thereof the draft of water of such vessel and the sum received by him with such other particulars as the Pilot Master or such other person shall require and in no case shall a Pilot be allowed to take charge of a vessel on his own account without the special consent and direction of the Pilot Master.

15. The Pilot Master and the several Pilots shall keep and duly enter up proper books of account of pilotage as and when received by them respectively, and shall attend the Sub-Commissioners upon the summons of any two or more of them, or of their Secretary, and shall produce their books and accounts when thereto required

by the Sub-Commissioners.

16. The compensation or reward which the Pilots may merit for extra service or assistance to vessels in distress or in perilous situation shall be referred by them to the Sub-Commissioners whose determination shall be final.

17. Every Pilot shall attend on board the pilot sloop (if there be one) at such times as shall be appointed by the Pilot Master unless prevented by illness or other cause to be allowed by the Pilot Master.

18. The Pilot Master shall not excuse any Pilot from the exercise of any duty unless on account of illness duly certified in writing under the hand of some known physician surgeon or apothecary, or for other sufficient cause at the discretion of the Pilot Master.

19. Each Pilot shall be allowed leave of absence for a fortnight in all in every year at the discretion of the Pilot Master as to time, such leave not to be granted between the first of April and the thirty-first of October, unless under special circumstances other than illness: and any Pilot having leave granted under such special circumstances shall pay to the earnings account three shillings and sixpence per day during his absence. Nevertheless the Pilot Master shall be authorized to give leave to any Pilot if and when he shall deem it expedient to employ himself in fishing or in any other approved manner between the first of November and the following thirty-first of March.

20. In all cases of breach of any of the foregoing Bye-laws the Sub-Commissioners may at their discretion impose such penalty not exceeding ten pounds as in their opinion the case may require. All pecuniary fines and penalties may be appropriated by the Sub-Commissioners to such pilotage purposes as to them may seem best.

21. Every Pilot who shall offend against any of the foregoing Bye-laws shall for every such offence (whether the same shall subject him to any pecuniary penalty or not) and in addition to such penalty (if any) be liable to have his licence. cancelled or suspended at the discretion of the Sub-Commissioners.

22. Besides conforming himself strictly to these Bye-laws every Pilot shall observe and obey the enactments and provisions relating to Pilots contained in Part V of the Merchant Shipping Act 1854 (a copy of which part of such Act has been delivered to him) and also the provisions of any general Act of Parliament now in force, or hereafter to be passed, relating to pilotage or pilotage dues, and in the event of non-observance or disobedience will subject himself to the penalties thereby provided.

23. All complaints against any of the Pilots or against any Master of any vessel shall be made in writing and signed by the person complaining and delivered to the Pilot Master or to one of the

Sub-Commissioners or their Secretary.

WHEREAS by the forty-sixth section of "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," it is enacted, that if any lighthouse, buoy, or beacon is erected, or placed, or re-constructed, repaired, or replaced by any Local Authority having jurisdiction in the matter of lighthouses, buoys, or beacons, Her Majesty may, on the application of the said Local Authority, by Order in Council, fix such dues to be paid to the said Local Authority in respect of every ship which enters the port or harbour under the jurisdiction of such Local Authority, or the estuary wherein such lighthouse, buoy, or beacon is situate, and which passes the said lighthouse, buoy, or beacon, and derives benefit therefrom, as Her Majesty may deem reasonable:

And whereas by the forty-seventh section of the said Act, it is enacted, that Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, and subject to certain conditions, from time to time reduce, alter, or

increase all or any of such dues:

And whereas the Corporation of the Trinity House in Kingston-upon-Hull, hereinafter called the Hull Trinity House, being the Local Authority having jurisdiction in the matters hereinafter mentioned, did, previously to the month of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, erect and exhibit four beacons, each carrying a light, whereof two are on the west side of Whitton Ness, in the parish of Whitton, in the county of Lincoln, and two are on the east side of the said Ness, in the parish of Winteringham, in the said county, and did also place a buoy in the River Humber off Whitton Ness aforesaid:

And whereas by an Order in Council, dated the first day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act, was pleased to direct that there should be paid to the Hull Trinity House certain dues in respect of every ship which, being in the River Humber, should pass and derive benefit from the said beacons, lights, and buoy, or any of them:

And whereas previous to the month of February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, the Hull Trinity House had placed and exhibited a floating light in the River Humber off Whitton Ness in lieu of the said buoy, and had also erected, and were then exhibiting, eight additional beacons; and-by an Order in Council, dated the fifth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act, was pleased to direct that the said dues should be paid to the Hull Trinity House in respect of every ship which, being in the River Humber, should pass and derive benefit from the floating light and shore lights enumerated in the Schedule annexed to the said Order, or any of them:

And whereas the Hull Trinity House have placed and exhibited certain additional floating lights in the River Humber above Hull, and have also erected and exhibited certain additional shore lights and beacons, and owing to the shifting nature of the sands and channels of the Humber above Hull, it is requisite from time to time to alter and vary the position of the said lights and beacons, or some of them, and to discontinue others, and exhibit and maintain new and additional lights and beacons, and they have represented that the said dues now payable are inadequate for the maintenance of the floating and shore lights and beacons now maintained by them, and that further provision should be made for the maintenance of the said floating and shore lights and beacons, and have submitted that the dues which are now leviable under the said Order in Council of one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, should, on and after the date of the present Order in Council, cease to be leviable, and that dues as undermentioned should be leviable in respect of the floating and shore lights and beacons to be from time to time maintained and exhibited by them above Hull (or any of them):

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the application is reasonable

and. proper :

Now therefore, Her Majesty, upon the applica-tion of the Hull Trinity House, and in exercise of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct that there shall be paid to the Hull Trinity House in respect of every ship (whether British or foreign), which, being in the Humber, shall pass or derive benefit from the floating and shore lights and beacons, or any of them, for the time being maintained or exhibited above Hull by the Hull Trinity House (except vessels of Her Majesty's Royal Navy, Government Revenue vessels, vessels belonging to, or used by the General Lighthouse Authorities, or by the Board of Trade, and vessels when supplied with the ordinary fishing gear, and employed in catching fish, or in carrying to port fresh tish from the fishing grounds) for each time of passing or deriving benefit from such floating and shore lights and beacons, or any of them, if the burthen of such vessel shall be less than twenty tons, the sum of threepence; and if the burthen of such vessel shall amount to or exceed twenty tons, a sum which shall be at the rate of threepence for every entire number of ten tons in the burthen of such vessel, including the first twenty tons.

Majesty chapter ninety-four of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her Majesty chapter ninety-four and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her Majesty chapter ninety-four duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme or representation bearing date the seventeenth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four, and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Saint Stephen Islington in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the thirty-first day of July in the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine and published in the London Gazette upon the eighth day of October in the same year a part of the parish of Saint Mary Islington in the county and diocese aforesaid was assigned as a chapelry district to the consecrated church of Saint Stephen situate within the limits of such parish and the same chapelry district was called 'The Saint Stephen's District.'

"And whereas by the authority of another Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the twenty-first day of May in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine and published in the London Gazette on the twenty-ninth day of the same month the boundaries of the said Saint Stephen's district were altered and the same district was called 'The Chapelry District of Saint Stephen Islington.'

"And whereas the said chapelry district of Saint Stephen Islington has under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and four become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act, and by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-seven and by the above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas it has been represented to us, and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Stephen Islington should be altered in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Frederick Bishop of the said diocese of London (in testimony whereof lie has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Stephen Islington shall be altered so that all that portion of the district parish of Saint Paul Balls Pond which is described in the schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended and is thereon coloured pink shall be annexed to and shall in

future form part of the said new parish of Saint |

Stephen Islington.

And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The territory to be annexed to the new parish (sometime chapelry district) of Saint Stephen Islington in the county of Middlesex

and in the diocese of London being :-

" Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Richard, Bishop of the said diocese of Llandaff (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion be expedient that all that part of the said new parish of Saint German Roath which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Saviour situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Saviour Roath.' And with the like consent of the said Richard, Bishop of the said diocese of Llandaff (testified as aforesaid) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Saviour situate as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The district chapelry of Saint Saviour, Roath,

being:—
"All that part of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint German Roath in the county of Glamorgan and in the diocese of Llandaff which is bounded upon the south-west partly by the new parish of All Saints Cardiff, partly by the parish of Saint Mary the Virgin Cardiff and partly by the district of Saint Stephen, Cardiff, all in the county and diocese aforesaid, upon the south-east by the low water mark in the estuary of the River Severn upon the north-east by the parish of Roath in the county and diocese aforesaid and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the north-west partly by the said parish of Roath and partly by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Roath from the new parish of Saint German Roath aforesaid at the centre of the bridge which carries Splott-road over the line of the South Wales Section of the Great Western Railway and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of thirty-five and a half chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint German Roath from the new parish of All Saints Cardiff aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the lifteenth day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, in the words and figures following, that is to

say:—
"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-seven have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes to be taken partly out of the consolidated chapelry or new parish of Saint Mary Hook-with-Warsash in the county of Southampton and in the diocese of Winchester, partly out of the new parish of Sarisbury in the said county and diocese and partly out of the parish of Titchfield in the same county and diocese.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said consolidated chapelry or new parish of Saint Mary Hook-with-Warsash of the said new parish of Sarisbury and of the said parish of Titchfield which are hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed separate district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the

purposes of Divine worship.

"And whereas Frank Bradshaw of Lifton Park Lifton in the county of Devon, and of Great Abshot in the county of Southampton aforesaid one of Your Majesty's Justices of the Peace and James Buller Bradshaw of Lifton Park aforesaid also one of Your Majesty's Justices of the Peace acting as trustees of the will of the late Mrs. Charlotte Hornby formerly of number 11 Hyde Park-terrace in the county of Middlesex Widow have transferred to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners and into our name a certain sum of two pounds fifteen shillings per centum Consolidated Stock in order to provide (inter alia) for the endowment of the said proposed district and for the provision of church and parsonage for the same.

"And whereas we have agreed in conformity with the terms of the said will to set apart out of the said stock a sum sufficient to produce a clear yearly stipend of one hundred and fifty pounds as and for the endowment of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted and (so soon as the said district shall have become a new parish under the provisions of the herein-before mentioned Act) then of the said new

amount of the dividends as they accrue due upon the said sum of stock so set apart as aforesaid to be paid over from time to time to the minister of the said proposed district when duly licensed thereto in accordance with the provisions of the said hereinbefore mentioned Act and when the same proposed district shall under the provisions of the same Act have become a new parish then to the incumbent of the same new parish.

"And whereas it is intended that out of the balance of the said sum of stock certain sums shall be applied by us towards providing a church for the said district and new parish and a house of residence for the minister or incumbent

thereof.

"And whereas the firstly mentioned sum of stock has been transferred as aforesaid upon the understanding and condition that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) we should recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council that the whole right of patronage of the said district or new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereof should be assigned in the manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas the said Frank Bradshaw and the said James Buller Bradshaw have nominated to us the Right Reverend Anthony Wilson Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester and his successors as the person or persons to whom they desire that the whole right of patronage and appointment of the minister or incumbent of the said proposed district or new parish should be

assigned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Anthony Wilson Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all those portions of the said consolidated chapelry or new parish of Saint Mary Hook-with-Warsash of the said new parish of Sarisbury and of the said new parish of Titchfield which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named 'The District of Lock's Heath' and shall be endowed with the yearly sum of one hundred and fifty pounds to arise and be payable as aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose that the right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted and (when such district shall have become a new parish as aforesaid) then of the said new parish, and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereof shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid be assigned to and be absolutely vested in and shall and may be exercised from time to time by the said Anthony Wilson, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester and by his successors bishops of the same diocese for ever,

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them parish, and of the maintenance of the minister in accordance with the provisions of the said Act or incumbent thereof for the time being, the or of any other Act of Parliament.

" The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing

Scheme has reference. (c.) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order, viz.:—widows, widowers, parents and unmarried children as can be buried at or below that depth.

WARNFORD.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Warnford, in the county of Hants; and also in the churchyard after the thirtieth June one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three except as follows:—

In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

WITHINGTON (MANCHESTER).—Forthwith and entirely in Saint Paul's Church, in the parish of Withington (Manchester) in the county of Lancaster; and also in the churchyard except as follows :-

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) WEST ROUNTON.-Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of West Rounton, in the county of York; and also in the churchyard after the thirty-first August one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three except as follows :-

(a.) In such wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

buried at or below that depth.

(c.) In such reserved grave spaces in the churchyard (as have never before been buried in and which when opened are free from water) burials may be allowed of so many members of the families to whom they may be allotted as can be buried at or below the depth of five feet.

WOOTTON.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Wootton in the county of Northampton; and also in the churchyard after the thirtieth June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three except as follows:

In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the sixteenth day of March next:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette, and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation one month before the said sixteenth day of March.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the sixteenth. and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning" "the burial of the dead in England beyond the "limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act "concerning the burial of the dead in the Metro-"polis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-

ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burialgrounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and vestry clerk or churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas by another Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning "the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit:
