And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop, and the consents referred to in the said representation, are as follows :—

" **SCHEME.**

" It is proposed to separate a district from the ecclesiastical parish of Chelmsford and unite such district for ecclesiastical purposes to the parish of Broomfield.

" It is further proposed that such district shall consist of all that detached portion of the ecclesiastical parish of Chelmsford which is surrounded on all sides by the parish of Broomfield.

" That such district shall accordingly consist of the lands coloured round with pink on the ordnance map of the parish of Broomfield and marked thereon ' Formerly Chelmsford Det. No. 1 amalgamated with Broomfield Ph. 1889 ' and numbered 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24 and coloured round with pink on the plan hereto annexed which is an extract from the said ordnance map.

" That the incumbent of the benefice of Broomfield shall have the sole and exclusive cure of souls within the said district.

" That the parishioners of such district shall be exonerated from all liability to repair the parish church of Chelmsford but shall be liable to the repairs of the parish church of Broomfield.

" That the fees for marriages churchings and burials and other ecclesiastical dues offerings and emoluments arising from the said district shall henceforth belong to the incumbent of the benefice of Broomfield aforesaid.

" **CONSENTS.**

" We John Wogan by Divine permission Lord Bishop of Saint Albans being the patron or person entitled in right of the see of Saint Albans to present to the benefices of Broomfield and Chelmsford in the county of Essex and diocese of Saint Albans in case the same were now vacant and the Reverend William Trimmer Clerk incumbent of the said benefice of Broomfield and the Venerable Henry Frank Johnson Clerk incumbent of the said benefice of Chelmsford do hereby respectively signify to Your Grace our several consents to the scheme above proposed for separating a district from the parish of Chelmsford and annexing the same to the parish of Broomfield.

" In testimony whereof we have hereunto set our hands this first day of September one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two.

And whereas the said scheme hath been transmitted by the said Bishop to the said Archbishop for his consideration :

And whereas the said Archbishop, being satisfied with the said scheme, hath certified the same and the consents aforesaid to Her Majesty in Council, by his report dated the twenty-third day of December one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, which said report is in the words and figures following :—

" To the QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

" We the undersigned Edward White Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury, do hereby report to Your Majesty in Council.

" That the Right Reverend John Wogan Lord Bishop of Saint Albans has represented unto Us (amongst other things)

" That there is in the county of Essex and his diocese of Saint Albans the parish and benefice or vicarage of Broomfield.

" That there is also in the said county and diocese the parish and benefice or rectory of Chelmsford.

" That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that part of the said parish of Chelmsford which lies detached and which is contiguous to and surrounded on all sides by the said parish of Broomfield may be advantageously separated from the said parish and mother church of Chelmsford and annexed to the said parish of Broomfield for ecclesiastical purposes.

" That pursuant to the direction contained in 'The Pluralities Act 1838' the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him the proposed alteration may best be effected and how the changes consequent upon such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithes tithe rent-charges and other ecclesiastical dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested which scheme with plan annexed together with the consents thereto in writing of the said Lord Bishop as patron and of the incumbents of the benefices to be affected have been transmitted by the said Lord Bishop to Us for Our consideration.

" The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents before referred to are hereunto annexed.

" And We the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the said 'Pluralities Act 1838' certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

WHEREAS by section twenty-six of "The Pluralities Act 1838" after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may in some instances with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That when with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or district within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church and
