Falmouth Oyster and Mussel Fishery.
At a Meeting of the Town Council of the borough of Falmouth, held in the Council Chamber, on the 9th day of February, 1893, it was resolved: That in pursuance of the powers vested in them by Art. 4 of the Falmouth Fishery Order, 1877, the following Bye-law be made, viz. :—
That that portion of the Fishery known as the Velt Bank, and situate between a line drawn from low water mark at Carclase Point to the edge of the Channel, from thence along the edge of the Channel to the Velt Buoy, and from thence

along the edge of the Channel to the East Buoy of the Narrows, and from thence to low water mark off Whitehouse Point, be closed for a period of two years from the 1st day of April, 1893, to the 31st day of March, 1895, inclusive.

N.B.—A chart may be seen at the Town Clerk's Office, 23, Church-street, Falmouth, showing the exact portion of the Fishery to be closed.
