Falmouth, May 20.

He 18th inftant put in here feveral Merchant thips from London outwards bound ; who came out in company with about 50 fail more, bound for the fourhwards; but were forced back from their

course by contrary winds; and part of them sup-poled to be put in about *Piymoutb*. This day the Merchant ships fet sail again with a fair wind, onely the ship called *Three Friends of Love*, laden with wheat for t'e Barbado's, continues yet in Port, to repair some defects in her Mafts

Milse, May 2. About two dayes fince were mustered all the Forces both of the Old and New Levies , which were drawn from leveral places to their Rendezvous near this City, where the Governour took a view of them, and afterwards disposed of them to their respective Quarters. The Marquifs de Mortara is fuddenly expected here from spain, as Goyernout of this Dutchy, the Marquis Spinola de los Balbaces having been onely made Governour for the prefent, till the mind of the Court could be more fully known.

Hambourgh, May 25. The peace between the Two Crowns of Spain and France being concluded, 'tis believed the Swedes will be induced to aisband a confiderable part of their Forces,

The Regiment which is here tailing for the Field Mar-fal Wurtz, is almost compleated.

From Wellphalig they tell us that the Billiop of Munfler begins to entertain thoughts of peace, and has given off his Levies I intending for the future to hold a good correspondency with the States of the United Provinces.

Legorn, May 15. The 8th inflant attived here a flip of this Town, commanded by Captain Bracelli from Sciot, having aboard 212. Slaves taken by a Cottaire of this place from a French Anip bound from Constantinople for Canca with 500 Turks, between whom paffed a therp difpute, in which most of the reft of the Tu ks were killed. The toth inftant came in the Bonadventure in 11 days from Alfier, where the left the Fame and the Phenix both of them bound for this place, and three Fregats belonging to His Majefly of Great Britain; by this vefiel we are adviled that alls or the most part of the Algerine thips are returned into Port without any other purchase then two light thips tar ken from the Genouele. A Bark arriving from Tugis, sells us that leveral of those Corfaits which have been em-ploy'd rowards Candia are lately returned, and their Gal-

ploy'd towards Candia, are lately returned, and their Gal-lies preparing to put to lea upon the latte fervice. On Saturday lafts the young Prince of Tulcany returned from his travels to Florence, at whole Entry the Great Guns were difcharged from all the Forts. Yesterday a pa ty of 800 French Horle were fent from their Leaguer inte-Guelderland upon the fame account of raising moneys. The fame day was sene out a Convoy with 200 Waggons from the Leaguet, most of them laden with plundered Goo to Liege ; which were to return back again with providions and other neucliaries for the Army, Ye-ft rday, and the day before 10000 weight of Bread and Meal was fent from this City to the French Camp, with a small Guard, which were on the way fer upon by 15 or 16 Spaniards only, and in the Dispute a French Coll nel of Diagoons, 19-10 was a Kiniman of the Duke of Lunenburgh, killed ; whereugon a party of 3 or 400 French were fent out to their selcue, who feiled upon 3 or 4 of the Spaniards, she reft faving themfelves by tlight. The French in this purluit entring into a Village called Vaels, took pril ners fome fe * Hyrle belonging to the States, and placed there for a Guard to the Inhabitants ; for whole release a Trumpeter was lent to the Duke of Luxembourgh, but as yet no Order is given for their dismission, the French prevending they had too much interested themselves on the behalf of the Spaniards.

The Difference's between his Highnesse the Elector of Cologne and that City, are faid to be in a fair way of compoluce, Commissioners being ordered to confir thereupon with feveral Deputies sent from the faid City of Cologne; neither party being over-zealous to engage the French within their Countrey.

Monfieur Colbert as yet continues here, but his Train and Equipage in a readinefs, which gives us caufe to believe he will fuddenly depart hence to *cologne*, as he was obliged to do by the King his Mafter 5, the Magiffrates of that City having made preparations to receive him with much civility, hoping for f me advantages by his adrefies in the butineffe now in debate with that Elector-

A Letter is lately brought to the Magisfrates of this Town from the Lieutenant General of the French Army, requiring, that all the Inhabitants of *Limbourg* may be feat home to refide at their own Houles.

Higue, fune 1. On Wednelday morning last arrived here a Courrier fent from the Heer Van Beuninghen at Paris, with Letters to the States, bearing done the 28th pass, informing them of the arrival from Spain of the Ratification of the Treaty lately concluded at Aix la Chappelle; which was to be mutually exchanged, and the Peace folem ly proclamed there and in all other parts of the Dominions of His Most Christian Magetty.

The Field Marefhall Wurtz is by Ordet from the States to depart from hence to Bergen-op goome, to take a view of the forces which are drawn together about these parts, and afterwards to dispole of them into convenient Quarters: hus Highnels the Prince of Orange intending likewise to be present there, to see them exercise. The Hear Van Noertwijck Master of the Ordnance to whom the eare of the Army has been hitherto committed, is fuddenly expected here.

The a6th paft arrive l here the Heer Ameronghen from his Employment to the Bithop of Munster, who has given the States an account of his Negotiations there, and of the Rate of the Army about Hardemberg.

Several Commissioners are sent by the States to the Texes, to take a view of our Fleet, and to give order for their speedy putting out to sea. Several of the Deputies of the Admiraity are also arrived here, to take farther Directions conserving the Fleet, and to state the form and manner of falurations at lea upon all occasions.

From the Texel we are told that one ship from Alecant, and four from Malaga, are fasely attived there, and that the Streights Fleet are daily expected, having been feen entring the Channel; but have been fince stopped by conwary winds. Bruffels, fune 1. The Marquis de Caffel Redrige having intel igence that the French began to appear with a body of 8000 men about Aloff, and had fummon'd 50 villages on the other is e of the Channel to contribute large fums to them, timely ordered 4000 of his Soldiers to take up their polls along the River, between this and Aniwerp, which featonably preferves that Countrey for those inconve iencies which would otherwife have fallen upon them, if the enemy had found the way open

The 30th paft, about Noon, according to the Marquis de-Cafiel Rodrigo's Ordei, wis folemnly proclaimed here the Peace between the two Crowns of Spain and France, the Magistrates i eing Affembled for that purpole, before whom the Proclamation was real by one of the Grefficies of the Cuty, attended by two kings at Arms, the Trumpets fou wing, and all other Celemonics sating, as is utual on? the like occation. We now expect the retirement of the Enemy from our Qua ters.

Brages, June 3. On thurlday! It artived here an Exp els fom Bruffels, giving an account to the Governour, that the Peace was idemnly publish there on Wednelday with the Ceremonies ulually plactiled on the like occasions. A like Explicit being also fent to the Duke de Cregny.

A like Expice being also fent to the Duke de Crequy. the French Army was immediately withdrawn within the, limits of their own Gar up s, and II hoftilities cealed.

Yefterday the Peace was also proclaimed at Ghent, and in a day o two the tame fol unity will be performed here.

On Thurfday last a ved at offend five more ships from the Spanish Ports, and in them about 8000 Spaniards, whole number encreasing, begins to be trou forme to the Countrey: but to ease them, on F is ay Order's were fent to them to march for Mecklin, towards which place they be gan yesterday to fet forwards.

On Wednelday lak fome Soldiers entring an house in Oftand, with an intention to rob, happened to give fire to a barrel of Powder, which blew up the house, with two others adjoyning ; by which accident 6 or 7 perfons were found to have been blown a confiderable diffance from the place, and feveral others buried in the ruines.

Waymouth, May 23. The 21th inftant arrived here a Veffel of this place from Rotterdam, from whence the came the 15th initant, and reports that the Dutch Fleet confifting of about. 60 fail, would in few dayes put to lea. The 20th inftant a Fleet of 40 fail were feen paffing up the Channel, most of, them great thips.

Briffol, May 23. Several thips are lately put into this Port, particularly the Sarah, and the John and Henry from Lisbonne; the William from Earbado's, and one other thip from Majorca laden with Oiles. The wind hath been lately favo srable for our Fleet outwards bound, and we iuppole has ere this carried them out of our Channel.
