Dublin, February 23. Lieutenant-General Ginkle is marched with some of Their Majesties Forces towards Ballymore, upon notice that Sarsfeild was drawn down thither with a Body of the Enemies Troops pretending to fortify that place, so that if the Rebels do not retire after their usual manner, we may in a day or two expect to hear of some Action. From Corke of the 6th instant we have an account, that a Party of our Men marched lately from Balimagooly into the Irish Quarters, where they killed 25 of the Rebels, and brought off 300 Head of Black Cattle, and as many Sheep, with some Horses; And that Major Kirke having notice of a Party of the Rebels, went out on the 3d instant with a Derachement of his Men, fought them, killed 16 of them, and took three of their Officers Pritoners, viz. Colonel Furcell, Captain Collaghan, and another whole Name is not yet known. On the 13th, 400 of the Repuls came to Edenderry, burnt part of the Town, and killed 7 Men and one Woman, but they were bravely repulled by the Militia, who killed 11 of them. Portsinouth, Febr. 27. This day came in from crinizing on the Coast of France Their Maj. sties Ship the St. Alban, Captain Firz-Patrick Commander, who gives this account. On the 7th of this Month we flood in with St. Vallery, and ranged along that shoot in with St. Vauery, and ranged along that shore, where we took up two Fisher-boats with 30 Men. On the 8th we spoke with 4 Dutch Capers, who gave us intelligence of 14 Sail of Snips that lay at Anchor under Cherboarg Castle. The next day we stood in, but found the French Vessels were all got into the Haven, except their Convoy of about 24 Guis, which we soon after Convoy of about 24 Gum, which we foon after forced aftore, and attempted to go in with our Boats, but could do nothing; We fired fome Guns at the Caftle, and then flood to Sea. On the 22d, off of Cape Barfleur, we met with 22 Sail of French light Ships, (who the day before came from Haure de Grace, bound to Rochel, Nantes, and Bourdeaux) and after having put their Convoy a Ship of 30 Gur's ashore on the Shoals of Cape de Hague, took two of this Fleet, the Happy Return two others, the 4 Dutch Capers took each of them as many, and a Guernsey Privateer two more; it blew hard Eatterly, which gave the rest an opportunity to escape. On the 13th, we went into Guernsey with three of Our Prizes, and in going in one of them struck on a Rock, where she was lost. On the 15th we went to Sea again, and on the 18th took a small Vef-fel from Libon, bound to Havre de Grace with Oranges. And on the 25th we took a French Privateer of 22 Guns, but laden on Merchants account with Salt, and ferving as Convoy to about 15 Sail bound to Dunkirk, which the Prisoners believe are all taken. The St. Alb.m has brought in the faid Privateer, with the rest of their Prizes.

Yesterday came into Plimouth, February 24.
