Gentlemen who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names clearly written thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

#### PRESENTATIONS.

Gentlemen who propose to present others must send in writing the name of such Gentlemen to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, not later than two days previous to the Levee, in order that the Lord Chamberlain may submit the names to Her Majesty, when, if they are approved, Presentation Cards will be forwarded. Forms for the purpose can be obtained at the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

Gentlemen who wish to be presented officially should communicate with the heads of their Department, who will provide them with the necessary cards and instructions.

It is particularly requested that the names of the Gentlemen to be presented be very distinctly written on the Presentation Cards delivered to

the Lord Chamberlain at the Levee, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

WHEREAS by the first section of "The Colonial Probates Act, 1892," it is enacted as follows:—

"Her Majesty the Queen may, on being satisfied that the legislature of any British possession has made adequate provision for the recognition in that possession of probates and letters of administration granted by the Courts of the United Kingdom, direct by Order in Council that this Act shall, subject to any exceptions and modifications specified in the Order, apply to that possession, and thereupon, while the Order is in force, this Act shall apply accordingly."

And whereas Her Majesty is satisfied that the Legislatures of the British Possessions hereinafter mentioned have made adequate provision for the recognition in those Possessions of probates and letters of administration granted by the Courts of the United Kingdom.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers by the above-recited Act in Her Majesty vested, is pleased by and with the advice of Her Most Honourable Privy Council to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

"The Colonial Probates Act, 1892," shall apply to the British Possessions hereunder mentioned:—

British Guiana. Gold Coast Colony. South Australia. Straits Settlements.

And the Most Honourable the Marquess of Ripon Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen and of the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty chapter thirty-nine duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the twenty-seventh day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of Your Majesty's reign intituled 'An Act to carry into effect with certain modifications the Fourth Report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues' and of another Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of Your Majesty's reign intituled 'An Act to explain and amend two several Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England' have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme relating to the provision of a site for the erection of new school buildings for the choir school in connection with the Cathedral Church of Ripon.

"Whereas by the firstly recited Act it was enacted that as soon as conveniently might be and by the authority of an Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying a scheme to be prepared by us such annual sums should be determined upon to be paid and should accordingly be paid by us, as after due enquiry and calculation should give to the dean of every cathedral and collegiate church in England an average annual income of one thousand pounds and to the respective canons of every cathedral church in England an annual average income of five hundred pounds and with regard to the Cathedral Church of Ripon as should also enable the chapter thereof to provide for the efficient performance of all the duties of the said church and for the maintenance of the fabric thereof.

"And whereas by the secondly recited Act it was enacted that notwithstanding such last recited provision it should be lawful to carry such purposes or any of them into effect by any mode of payment contribution augmentation or endowment which might be deemed fit as well as by the modes in such Act specified.

"And whereas Orders of Your Majesty in Council have from time to time been made under the provisions of the said Acts and of 'The Ecclesiastical Commission Act 1868' for carrying into effect the purposes aforesaid with reference to the said cathedral church namely an Order bearing date the fifteenth day of January in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-two and published in the London Gazette of the twenty-fifth day of February in the same year and an Order bearing date the twenty-seventh day of November in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two and published in the London Gazette on the tenth day of December in the same year and an Order bearing date the thirtyfirst day of March one thousand eight hundred and seventy and published in the London Gazette on the first day of April in the same year and lastly an Order bearing date the sixth day of

and seventy-four and published in the London Gazette of the eleventh day of the same month.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the provision made under the authority of the said Orders of Your Majesty in Council for the efficient performance of the duties of the said church is at present insufficient inasmuch as the choir school which is attached to the said church and which it is necessary to maintain for the purpose of educating and training the choristers of the said church cannot be properly and efficiently carried on by reason of the present school buildings being unsuitable and insufficient for their purpose the same being old and dilapidated and of an insanitary character.

"And whereas the said dean and chapter are desirous of erecting new buildings for the choir school on the present site and are prepared to provide the funds needed for that purpose out of monies belonging to them but it is necessary for the provision of suitable and proper school buildings that the site thereof shall include a larger space than the site of the present school buildings.

"And whereas we are in possession of certain houses and premises adjoining to the present school buildings being the houses and premises particularly described in the schedule to this

scheme.

"And whereas it is in our opinion expedient that with a view to making provision for the erection of suitable and sufficient buildings for the choir school the said houses and premises should be transferred to and become vested in the said dean and chapter in order that the said houses may be removed and the site thereof be used in connection with the site of the present school buildings for the erection thereon of such new school buildings.

"Now therefore we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorized to grant and convey to the said dean and chapter without any pecuniary or other consideration the said houses and premises particularly described in the schedule to this scheme with a view to the said dean and chapter erecting new school buildings for the said choir school upon the site thereof and upon the site of the now existing school buildings.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

#### " SCHEDULE.

" All that close or parcel of land situate in the city of Ripon bounded on the north and east sides by the churchyard of the Cathedral Church of Ripon on the west by property belonging to the Dean and Chapter of Ripon and on the south by High Saint Agnes-gate which said close or parcel of land is divided by Hobler-lane leading from High Saint Agues-gate to the churchyard aforesaid and is together with the dwelling houses and other buildings thereon now or late in the respective occupations of Samuel Jacob Miss Lumley William Lumley George Kirby and Miss Reynolds."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this August in the year one thousand eight hundred | Order shall have been duly published in the

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninetythree, in the words and figures following, that is

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty, chapter thirtyseven, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the new parish (sometime chapelry district) of Portswood situate partly in the town and county of the town of Southampton, and partly in the county of Southampton and wholly in the diocese of Winchester and out of the new parish (sometime district) of Saint Luke, Newtown in the said town and county of the town of Southampton and in the diocese aforesaid.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that all those contiguous portions of the said new parish of Portswood and of the new parish of Saint Luke Newtown aforesaid which are hereinafter mentioned and described, should be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes

in manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed district any consecrated church in use for the purposes of Divine

worship.

"And whereas by virtue of a deed dated the eighteenth day of March in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three and expressed to be made under the authority of the New Parishes Acts 1843, 1844 and 185, and being under the common seal of us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England which deed has been or is intended to be enrolled in the Chancery Division of Your Majesty's High Court of Justice, the Reverend Albert Basil Orme Wilberforce, Honorary Canon in the cathedral church of the said diocese of Winchester, the rector of the rectory of the parish of Saint Mary, Southampton, did, with the consent of the Right Reverend Anthony Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester and, as such Bishop, the patron of the said rectory and with the concurrence of us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, grant and confirm unto the minister or incumbent for the time being of the herein proposed district when and so soon as the same shall have been constituted and to his successors, ministers, or incumbents thereof for the time being, and when the said proposed district shall have become a new parish then to the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the same new parish for the time being, one clear yearly rent-charge of two hundred pounds to be for ever charged upon issuing and payable half yearly out of certain glebe lands and hereditaments belonging to the said rectory as and for a permanent endowment | Luke, Newtown in the said town and county of

for the incumbent of the said proposed district or

new parish.
"And whereas the said annual rent charge of two hundred pounds has been granted and confirmed as aforesaid by the said Albert Basil Orme Wilberforce upon the understanding and condition that we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners would recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council the arrangement with respect to the patronage of the said proposed district or new parish which is hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas the said Albert Basıl Orme Wilberforce has nominated to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners himself as the person in whom he desires that the first turn of nomination. and appointment of a Minister to serve the said proposed district should be vested, and the said Anthony Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester and his successors Bishops of the same diocese for ever, as the person or persons in whom he the said Albert Basil Orme Wilberforce desires that the second and every succeeding turn of such nomina-

tion and appointment should be vested.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Anthony Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme we, the said Ecclesias-Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that all those portions of the said new parish of Portswood and of the said new parish of Saint Luke Newtown which are described in the schedule hereunder written, and are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazettc of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Barnabas Southampton.'

"And we further recommend and propose with such consent and so testified as aforesaid that the advowson and perpetual right of patronage of the district or new parish hereinbefore recommended and proposed to be constituted and the whole right of nomination of the incumbent of the same district or new parish shall without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and as from the day aforesaid being the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette be assigned to and become and be absolutely vested for the first turn only in the said Albert Basil Orme Wilberforce and for the second and every succeeding turn in the said Anthony Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester and his successors Bishops of the same diocese for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The district of Saint Barnabas, Southampton

"All those two contiguous portions of the new parish (sometime chapelry district) of Portswood partly in the town and county of the town of Southampton and partly in the county of Southampton and wholly in the diocese of Winchester and of the new parish (sometime district) of Saint

the town of Southampton and in the diocese of Winchester aforesaid which are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the extraparochial place called or known as Southampton Common in the said town and county of the town of Southampton and in the diocese of Winchester aforesaid from the said new parish of Portswood at a point in the middle of Westwood-road and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said read for a distance of thirty-four chains or thereabouts to its junction with Brook-vale-road and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of eight chains or thereabouts to its junction with Portswood-road and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of seven chains or thereabouts to the point opposite to the eastern end of the road called or known as Gordonavenue where the said Portswood-road is joined by the lane or footpath which passes along the northern side of the house and premises called or known as Swiss Cottage, and extending thence south-eastward to and along the middle of the said lane or footpath for a distance of exactly sixty yards to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Portswood from the new parish of Saint Denys, Portswood in the said town and county of the town of Southampton and in the diocese of Winchester aforesaid and extending thence first southward and then southwestward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of twenty-six chains or thereabouts (thereby running in a line parallel to and distant exactly sixty yards from the middle of Portswood-road aforesaid to Duke's-road, and then along the middle of the said Duke's-road) to a point at the junction of the said Duke's-road with the road called or known as Bevois-bill where the same boundary meets the boundary which divides the said new parish of Portswood from the new parish of Saint Luke Newtown aforesaid and extending thence first westward and then northward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of three and a half chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of Forster-road and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of eleven and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Cedar-road and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the lastnamed road for a distance of five and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Mordauntroad and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of fourteen and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road called or known as Avenue-terrace otherwise Inner Avenue and extending thence in precisely the same direction and in a straight line for a further distance of sixteen yards or thereabouts across the lastnamed road to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Luke Newtown from the extra-parochial place called or known as Southampton Common aforesaid and extending thence north-westward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of twenty-seven chains or thereabouts to the point opposite to the eastern end of Cemetery-road where the said last-mentioned boundary meets the boundary which divides the said extra-parochial place called or known as Southampton Common from the new parish of Portswood aforesaid and extending thence generally northward along the last-men-tioned boundary for a distance of four chains or thereabouts to the firstly-mentioned point in the

middle of Westwood-road as aforesaid where the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the here-inbefore-mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the two cures out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such patrons and incumbents have respectively signified their assent to such scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Winchester at Winchester.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifth and sixth years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and eight and of the Act of the twenty-first and twenty-second years of Her Majesty chapter fifty-seven, which Acts are known as "The Ecclesiastical Leasing Acts" duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the twenty-seventh day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, in the words following, that is to say;

three, in the words following, that is to say;

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifth and sixth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and eight and of the Act of the twenty-first and twenty-second years of Your Majesty chapter fifty-seven which Acts are known as 'The Ecclesiastical Leasing Acts,' have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for making better provision for the cure of souls within the new parish and vicarage hereinafter called the benefice, of Holy Trinity, Corris, in the counties of Merioneth and Montgomery and in the diocese of Bangor, out of the revenues of the vicarage and benefice (hereinafter called the benefice) of Llanfachreth in the said county of Merioneth and the said diocese of Bangor.

"Whereas the annual value of the said benefice of Llanfachreth has been improved in consequence of a lease of certain minerals under a portion of the glebe lands of the said benefice such lease bearing date the second day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one and having been granted under the authority of the said Acts with the concurrence of us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners and of the late Honourable Thomas Pryce Lloyd, of Pengwern Rhyl in the county of Flint then patron of the said benefice, by the Reverend Robert Roberts, then incumbent of the said benefice, to the lessees named in the said lease for a term of sixty years from the twenty-ninth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, and under and subject to certain rents and reservations in the same lease specified.

"And whereas certain sums of money have been, under the provisions of the said lease, received by us on account of the rents and royalties reserved under the same lease (the minimum or dead rent so payable to us in each year of the same lease amounting to thirty pounds).

"And whereas the moneys so paid to us as aforesaid have been invested from time to time in the purchase of three thousand one hundred and ten pounds sixteen shillings and five pence Three Pounds per Centum Local Loans Stock and nine hundred and thirty-three pounds three shillings and four pence Two Pounds Fifteen Shillings per Centum Consolidated Stock which said Local Loans Stock and Consolidated Stock are held by us in trust to pay over to the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Llanfachreth the annual interest or dividends from time to time arising from the same.

"And whereas the average annual income of the said benefice of Llanfachreth now amounts to not less than three hundred pounds and the population under the charge of the incumbent of the said lastly-mentioned benefice is less than one thousand.

"Now therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, all the royalties which shall become payable and be paid to us under the terms and reservations of the above-mentioned lease shall be held by us in trust to invest the same from time to time for the benefit of the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Holy Trinity, Corris, and to pay to such vicar or incumbent the annual interest or dividends arising from such investments.

"And we further recommend that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or to any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Bangor.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, in the words and figures following, that is to say;

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for

England in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-seven have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the new parish of Christ Church Luton in the county of Bedford and diocese of Ely.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said new parish of Christ Church Luton which is hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed separate district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the

purposes of Divine worship.

"And whereas by a certain deed of indenturebearing date on or about the sixth day of March in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three and made or expressed to be made under the authority of the New Parishes Acts 1843 1844 and 1856 or of some or one of them and being under the hand and seal of the Reverend Elgood George Punchard the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said new parish of Christ Church Luton and being also under the hand and episcopal seal of the Honourable and Right Reverend Alwyne Bishop of the said diocese of Ely and as such bishop the patron of the same vicarage and being also under the common seal of us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England (which deed is intended to be enrolled in the Chancery Division of Your Majesty's High Court of Justice) the said Elgood George Punchard did appoint grant and convey unto the minister (so soon as a minister shall have been licensed) of the herein proposed district and to his successors as part of an endowment for the said proposed district one perpetual clear yearly rent-charge of one hundred and six pounds charged upon the endowments of the said vicarage of the new parish of Christ Church Luton.

"And whereas a sum of one thousand four hundred and sixty-six pounds thirteen shillings and four pence has been contributed and paid to the credit of the account of us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners at the Bank of England by the Reverend John Charles Trevelyan Clerk in Holy Orders as and for the remaining part of the endowment of the said proposed district.

"And whereas we have in respect of such sum undertaken to provide and pay by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year to the minister of the said proposed district when duly licensed thereto in accordance with the provisions of the above-mentioned Act and when the said proposed district shall have become a new parish then to the incumbent of such new parish the sum of forty-four pounds per annum so long as the said capital sum shall remain in our hands.

"And whereas the said perpetual yearly rentcharge of one hundred and six pounds has been so appointed granted and conveyed as aforesaid upon the understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereof should be assigned in the manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas the said Elgood George Punchard as the grantor of the said yearly rent charge has nominated to us the said Ecclesiastical

Commissioners the said Honourable and Right | Reverend Alwyne Bishop of the said diocese of Ely and his successors Bishops of the same diocese for ever as the person or persons in whom the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district or new parish should be vested.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament. "The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing

III.—No earthen grave shall be dug within one

foot of any other grave.

IV .- A register of graves shall be kept, in which the name, age and date of burial in each shall be duly registered.

V.—No body shall be buried in any vault or walled grave unless the coffin be separately entombed in an air-tight manner, that is by properly cemented stone or brick work which shall never be disturbed.

VI.- One body only shall be buried in any common earthen grave on the same day, unless the bodies be those of members of the same family; and every coffin shall be forthwith covered with earth at least a foot thick, which shall be closely rammed down, never

to be again disturbed.

VII.-No unwalled grave shall be reopened within fourteen years after the burial of a person above twelve years of age, or within eight years after the burial of a child under twelve years of age, unless to bury another member of the same family; in every case a layer of earth not less than one foot thick shall be left undisturbed above the previously buried costin; but if, on reopening any grave, the soil be found to be offensive, such soil shall not be disturbed, and in no case shall human remains be removed from the grave.

VIII.—No coffin shall be buried in any unwalled grave within four feet of the ordinary level of the ground, unless it contains the body of a child under twelve years, when it shall not be less than three feet below that level.

(a.) Rags compressed by hydraulic pressure, transported as merchandise in gross, in bales hooped with iron, and bearing marks or numbers of firms recognized by the authorities of the place destination, as carrying on such wholesale trade.

(b.) Shreds and cuttings of new materials issuing straight from the weaving, tailoring, dyeing, or washing establishments, artificial wool,

and shreds of newspaper.

Except as regards the above - mentioned articles, the restrictions imposed by previous Ordinances on the importation of rags, clothes, and bed linen in use, intended for trade, remain in force.

the reports of dangers existing there.
