**H**ER Majesty being willing to Encourage the  
carrying of Arms to such Parts of the King-  
dom of Ireland as are under Their Majesties  
Obedience, was this day pleased to Order in Council,  
as it is hereby Ordered, That no Duty shall be here-  
after demanded or payable in Ireland for any Arms  
which shall be carried to such Parts of that Kingdom  
as are, or shall be, at the time of Importation under  
Their Majesties Obedience: Provided always, That  
the Persons Importing such Arms from any of Their  
Majesties Dominions, do first Enter into sufficient  
Bond at the Place of Exportation, for Landing the  
same in such Parts of Ireland as aforesaid, and none  
others.

**Lemberg** in Poland, February 7. The Court  
continues still at **Zolkiew**, but will part from  
thence in 8 or 10 days for **Warsaw**, whither  
Prince **James** is gone before to meet the Prin-  
cess of **Neubourg**, who is expected there against  
the 25th of this Month; and in the mean time,  
great and splendid Preparations are making for  
the Celebration of their Marriage. From the  
Frontiers we have of late had very melancholy  
accounts of the Ravages of the Tartars, who  
make their Excursions from **Caminnec**, and with  
such swiftness, that they have mozt times exe-  
cuted their designs before our Troops can march  
to oppose them. The new Levies go on success-  
fully together with the other Preparations for the  
next Campagne, which the Forces of this  
Crown will begin much earlier than they have  
yet done since this War.

**Rome**, February 10. The Cardinals are now  
preparing to enter into the Conclave, which  
will be opened on Monday next; **Cibo**, **Carpagna**,  
and **Altieri**, seem at present to have the strong-  
est Parties, and many think they will hasten to  
an Election, though those of the French Faction  
will endeavour to delay it till the arrival of the  
Cardinals from France. The Venetian Amba-  
sador **Contarini** has not yet appeared in Publick  
by reason of his Indisposition, but being now  
recovered, he intends in few days to deli-  
ver in his Credentials, and to demand an  
Audience of the Cardinals. The last Letters  
from **Naples** say, that the Infection was much

abated in those places where it at first broke  
out, and that the City of **Naples** continued free  
of it; however the Cardinals that come from  
thence will be obliged to perform a Quarantain  
in some of the Frontier Places of the  
Ecclesiastical State. The news of Cardinal  
**Bichi's** death is confirmed.

**Lisbon**, January 23. The Marquis de **Castilho de los Reos**, who is newly arrived  
here with the Character of Envoy Extra-  
ordinary from **Spain**, has had three publick  
Audiences of the King; In the first, he  
made the Compliment of Congratulation upon  
the Birth of the Prince; in the second, that of  
Condolence for the Death of the Infanta; and  
in the third, he desired Commissioners  
might be appointed to enter into Conference  
with him about some Matters he has to  
propose. The French Ambassador has likewise  
had his Audiences of Congratulation and Con-  
dolence. On the 19th instant their Majesties  
went from hence to **Salva Terra**, where they  
will continue till towards the end of the next  
Month; but before their departure, the King  
named **Don Pedro de Figueroa** to go as his En-  
voy Extraordinary to **Madrid**, who will very  
suddenly begin his Journey thither, carrying  
with him a Jewel of great value, which he is  
to present from their Majesties to the Queen of  
**Spain**.

**Cadix**, January 29. The **New-Spain** Fleet  
will depart in **May** or **June**. The Ship called  
the **St. Cruz**, which came with the last Fleet  
from thence, is not yet arrived. The Ships  
from the **Honduras** are expected the next  
Month.

**Edinburg**, February 26. The Forces de-  
signed for **Flanders** lye still Embarked in  
**Leith Road**, waiting for a fair Wind.

**Newcastle**, February 27. The Fleet of Laden  
Colliers, consisting of between 3 and 400 Sail,  
has for some time been kept in **Tynemouth** Haven

*Chantrell*, richly laden from their Castle at Cape Corso; He gives an account of his leaving the Companies Factories and Affairs in good condition; and that he met on that Coast a French Man of War of 40 Guns, with whom he engaged, and after 6 hours hot dispute, the Man of War having received considerable damage, bore away; but his Tender, being a Fireship, was taken, and left at Cape Corso. The same day arrived the Spanish Expedition from the *Groyn*; and this day came into this Port the *Thomas and Francis*, the *Thomas and Samuel*, the *Ruth*, and the *Provencial*, all four of *London*, and bound home from the *Streights*. The Dutch Ships bound to *Lisbon*, *St. Ubes*, and the *Groyn*, being in all about 22 Sail with their Convoy, are still in this Port, but will sail with the first fair Wind.

*Plymouth, March 1.* On the 26 past came into this Port Their Majesties Ships the *Mountague* and the *Dover* from the Coast of *Ireland*, and brought in with them a French Privateer of 24 Guns and 6 Patereroes. The same day arrived here the *Loyal Merchant* of *London*, *George Howard* Master, from *Legborne*; and the *Industry*, *George Stephens*, from the Coast of *Barbary*. On the 27th some French Prisoners, brought hither by a Dutch Privateer, took away two Boats belonging to this Town, and went out to Sea, endeavouring to get over to *France*, but by stress of Weather they were all lost, and the two Boats driven ashore about a League to the Westward of this Port.

It is also hereby notified to all Persons, Owners or Traders for any Naval Commodities, whether of English or Foreign Growth, employed in the Building, Repairing, and Equipping of Ships of War, such as Pitch, Tar, Rozen, Hemp, Mast, Fir Timber, Deals, Sail-Cloth, Oak Timber, Plank, Iron-work, &c. that the said Principal Officers and Commissioners will be ready at the same times to receive any Proposals that shall be offered them of any such Goods and Materials, and to Agree for, and Buy the same, (if to be had at moderate Prices) either for the said New Ships, or for the Ordinary Services of the Navy.*
