(PORT OF NEWCASTLE-UPON-TYNE—APPROVAL OF LANDING-PLACE FOR FOREIGN ANIMALS AT OUSEBURN.)

By the Board of Agriculture.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Board of Agriculture Act, 1889, and the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878 to 1892, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do hereby approve of and define the following part of the Port of Newcastle-upon-Tyne as a landing-place for foreign animals not subject to slaughter or quarantine:

All that piece of ground lying between Ouse-street and the New Quay on the west and the Ouseburn on the east, in the East Ward of the parish of All Saints, in the city and county of Newcastle-upon-Tyne, comprising an area of eleven thousand and eighteen square yards or thereabouts (including the approaches from the Landing Quay) bounded by a line commencing at a point marked A on the plan of the said landing-place deposited for the purposes of this Order at the office of the Board of Agriculture, which point is at the south-east point of the New Quay, thence in a north-westerly direction up the river Tyne along the face of the Quay for a distance of one hundred and seventy feet or thereabouts to a point marked B on the said plan, thence in a north-easterly direction for a distance of twenty feet or thereabouts to a point marked C on the said plan bounded by a high wood fence, thence in a south-easterly direction for a distance of ninety-three feet or thereabouts to a point marked D on the said plan bounded by a high wood fence, thence in a north-easterly direction for a distance of forty-five feet or thereabouts to a point marked E on the said plan bounded by the high gable wall of the One Storey Shed, thence in a northerly direction for a distance of one hundred feet or thereabouts to a point marked F on the said plan bounded by a wood hoarding eight feet high, thence in a north-westerly direction for a distance of one hundred and ninety-two feet or thereabouts to a point marked G on the said plan bounded by a wood hoarding eight feet high, thence in a north-easterly direction for a distance of thirty-five feet or thereabouts to a point marked H on the said plan bounded by the north-west wall of the arched entrance to the Sanatorium, thence in a north-westerly direction for a distance of sixty feet or thereabouts to a point marked I on the said plan bounded by a high wooden fence, thence in an easterly direction for a distance of fifty-five feet or thereabouts to a point marked J on the said plan bounded by a portion of the south abutment wall of the New Glasshouse Bridge, thence in a northerly direction for a distance of forty-five feet to a point marked K on the said plan bounded by the west abut-

ment wall of the New Glasshouse Bridge, thence in a westerly direction for a distance of one hundred and forty feet or thereabouts to a point marked L on the said plan bounded by a portion of the north abutment wall of the New Glasshouse Bridge, thence in a northerly direction for a distance of one hundred and twenty-five feet or thereabouts to a point marked M on the said plan bounded by a high wall next a street called Ouse-street, thence in a north-easterly direction for a distance of twenty-three feet or thereabouts to a point marked N on the said plan bounded by the gable wall of a two-storey-house, thence in a north-westerly direction for a distance of thirty-nine feet or thereabouts to a point marked O on the said plan bounded by the back wall of the aforesaid two-storey-house, thence in a south-westerly direction for a distance of nineteen feet or thereabouts to a point marked P on the said plan bounded by the gable wall of the aforesaid house, thence in a north-westerly direction for a distance of three hundred and two feet or thereabouts to a point marked Q on the said plan bounded by the side wall of the cattle-shed next a street called Ouse-street, thence in a north-easterly direction for a distance of twenty-seven feet or thereabouts to a point marked R on the said plan bounded by the gable wall of a three-storey-dwelling-house, thence in a south-westerly direction for a distance of forty-seven feet or thereabouts to a point marked S on the said plan bounded by the back wall of the three-storey-dwelling-house aforesaid, thence in a north-easterly direction for a distance of one hundred feet or thereabouts to a point marked T on the said plan bounded by the brick side wall of the cattle-shed next the street called the Cut Bank, thence in a south-easterly direction for a distance of eight hundred and eighty-five feet or thereabouts to a point marked U on the said plan at the west end of the Glasshouse Bridge bounded by the Quay wall of the Ouseburn, thence in a north-westerly direction for a distance of one hundred and seventy-five feet or thereabouts to a point marked V on the said plan bounded by a high wood fence next the public-road leading from Horatio-street to the Glasshouse Bridge, thence in a southerly direction for a distance of sixty-three feet or thereabouts to a point marked W on the said plan bounded partly by the south-east wall of the arched entrance to the Sanatorium and partly by a wood hoarding eight feet high, thence in a south-easterly direction for a distance of one hundred and thirty-six feet or thereabouts to a point marked X on the said plan bounded by a wood hoarding eight feet high, and thence in a south-south-easterly direction for a distance of one hundred and ninety-eight feet or thereabouts to the first-mentioned point marked A on the said plan bounded by a wood-barrier four feet high at the edge of the Quay wall of the Ouseburn, all which space is partly coloured pink and partly edged pink on the plan of the said landing-place so deposited at the office of the Board of Agriculture as aforesaid, a copy of which is deposited at the office of the Town Clerk of the city and county of Newcastle-upon-Tyne.
