of the Assistant Commissioners of Police for the Metropolis, sister of the said Ponsonby. William, now Earl of Drogheda, shall henceforth have, hold, and enjoy the same title, place, pre-emin-ence, and precedence as if her father, the said Ponsonby A thur Moore, had survived his cousin, the said Henry Francis Seymour, Marquess and Earl of Drogheda, and had thereby succeeded to the said title and dignity of Earl of Drogheda;

And to command that the said Royal order and declaration be registered in Her Majesty's
