Rome, February 17.

**T**HE Funeral Rites of *Alexander VIII.* having been solemnized according to custom, on the 12th Instant the Cardinals to the number of 37 entered the Conclave, in order to the Election of a new Pope, and in the Afternoon they received the Visits of the Ambassadors, and other Ministers of Foreign Princes, after which the Conclave was shut up by the Prince *de Sarvelli*, Hereditary Great Marshal of the Ecclesiastical State, but it was opened again the 13th and 14th for the Cardinals *Cole, Spinala, Colonna, Nerli, Franzoni, and Pallavicino*, who had excused themselves from going in the first day. The Cardinals *d'Este* and *Negroni* arrived here the 15th, and several others are daily expected, but those that come from *Naples* are obliged to perform a Quarantine. In the mean time the Scrutiny has been already made several times in the Conclave, though not with a design to come to a Choice, but only the better to discover the Sentiments of the several Factions. The Cardinals in the Interests of the Emperor and *Spain* seem desirous to proceed immediately to an Election, but the French oppose it, and have, it's said, declared, That if they choose a Pope before the arrival of the Cardinals from *France*, the French King will not own him, but their Menaces are little regarded.

*Rome, Febr. 25.* We have this day received advice, that the French have raised the Siege of *Mantmelian*, after having lost a considerable number of their Men, who were killed in the Sallies made from the Town, or perished with cold; That part of their Cannon had been likewise seized up by the Garrison, and that Monsieur *Catinat*, and the Intendant of *Savoie*, were retired to *Grenoble*, and a little mortified with the ill success of this Enterprize.

*Dresden, March 4.* The Letters from *Dresden* assure us, that the Elector of *Saxony* will send a Body of 14 or 15000 Men to the *Rhine*, to act in conjunction with the rest of the Confederate Forces, and that they will begin their march thither the 20th of this Month.

*Cologne, March 6.* The *Brandenburg* Forces quartered in this Diocess are ordered to be in a readines to march upon the first notice. We had two days ago an alarm from *Bois*, that some French Troops were marching that way, but it came to nothing. The Elector *Palatin* will go the next Month to meet the Princess of *Tuscany* at *Asprecht*, and in the mean time preparations are making for their Reception at *Duseldorpe*, which his Electoral Highness intends shall be the place of his constant Residence.

*Paris, March 6.* The Recruits for our Troops coming in very slowly, Orders are given that a certain number of Men shall be drawn out of those that are to remain in Garrison this Summer; and delivered to such Officers as want them, to serve towards the completing their several Companies; and after this a General Muster will be taken on the 15th of this Month. The Venetian Ambassador continues his Instances for the Discharge of their Ships brought in by our Men of War and Privateers, but without any success. The last Letters from *Rome* tell us, that things go on but slowly in the Conclave. The Archbishop of *Paris* is very dangerously sick.

*Brussels, March 4.* Our Governor-General, the Marquis *de Ghisthange*, is expected back here from the *Hague* about the beginning of the next week, and then it's believed a final Resolution will be taken by the States of *Brabant* upon the Project that now lies before them concerning the

payment of their part of the Forces in the service of these Countreys, which will be followed by the other Provinces, and by the Method now proposed an Army of above 25000 Men will be maintained and punctually paid by them. On Monday arrived here a Dutch Regiment of Foot, which is to march to *Mons* or *Aeth*. We are assured, that a Camp of Dutch and Spanish Troops will be formed near *Genappe* the beginning of the next Month; Lieutenant-General *Alua*, who commanded the Dutch Forces at present quartered in this Country, hunting some days ago near *Leenen*, his Horse fell with him, by which he was very dangerously hurt, and we hear that he is since dead. A Spanish Party has this week defeated one of the Enemies near *Mons*, and taken 26 Prisoners.

*Hague, March 9.* On Monday last my Lord Steward Treated the Elector of *Brandenburg*, the Landgrave of *Hesse*, the Prince of *Commercy*, &c. with great magnificence, and the King was pleased unexpectedly to do his Lordship the Honour to be one of the Company: The Elector of *Bavaria* was not there; but has invited himself some other day. On Tuesday the two Electors, the Landgrave, the Prince of *Commercy*, and several other Princes Dined with the King at *Honflaerdyke*. The Duke of *Zell* is expected here this Evening or tomorrow, and the Duke of *Wolfenbuttel* in a day or two after. The Elector of *Brandenburg* goes to morrow to *Amsterdam*, and will return hither on Wednesday next. 'Tis said at Court that His Majesty intends to go to *Loos* towards the latter end of the next week, and to return for *England* in a Fortnight. We have an account from *Flanders* of the Death of Lieutenant-General *Alua*, by a fall from his Horse as he was Hunting; and the King has appointed the Count *de Hornes* to command in his stead the Dutch Troops quartered in that Country.

*Ealmsouth, March 2.* Yesterday came in here 6 Suedish and Danish Merchant-Men, pretty big Ships, bound for *Lisbon* and *St. Ubes*, which had been plying several days to the Westward, and were forced back by the Weather; There was another in their Company, who it's believed is gone for *Plimouth*. The *Adventurs* Ketch of *Boston* in *New-England*, laden with Tobacco and Sugars, arrived here on Saturday last, having been 3 Months in her Voyage from thence.

*Whitehall, March 8.* This Evening arrived here an Express from *Dublin*, with Letters of the 2d and 4th Instant, which give the following account.

Lieutenant General *Ginkle* having drawn together a Body of their Majesties Troops, upon notice that a considerable number of the Enemy was come to *Bahymore* on the way to *Athlons*, and were Fortifying that place. On Thursday the 26th of February, he and Sir *John Lanier* advanced from *Streamstown* towards *Athlone* with some Foot, Horse and Dragoons; As soon as they began their march, the Enemies Sentinels upon the Hills gave notice of their approach, and by the time our Troops were got to a Pass 4 miles from *Streamstown*, they saw the Enemy on the other side drawn up regularly enough, and (as the Prisoners report) in number about 2300, commanded by *Clifford*; The Pass was secured by a Palissadoed Work; But as our Foot advanced, the Irish Foot ran from the other end of the Pass, and were followed by our Horse and Dragoons towards *Mote of Grinogue*, (which some hours before had been the Head Quarter of the Enemies Horse) and to a Hill on this side, where their main Body was drawn up in good Order, but upon our approach they retired into the Town, at the entrance of which they had thrown up a Trench,
