

the benefice (being a rectory) of Abenhall in the county of Gloucester and in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol the patronage of which said lastly-named benefice and rectory is vested for an estate in fee simple without incumbrances in the Reverend John William Dover of Sherbourne-terrace, Leamington in the county of Warwick Clerk in Holy Orders.

"Whereas the Right Reverend John James Stewart now Bishop of the said diocese of Worcester and the said John William Dover have respectively signified to us their desire that the patronage of the said two benefices of Saint Andrew Wilmcote and Abenhall may be re-arranged by way of exchange in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas we have made due enquiry and calculation as to the circumstances and relative values of the said two benefices and of the patronage thereof respectively and we do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council that the circumstances and present values of the said two benefices are as set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said John James Stewart Bishop of the said diocese of Worcester (in testimony whereof he has to this scheme set his hand and his episcopal seal) and with the consent of the said John William Dover (in testimony whereof he has to this scheme set his hand and seal) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the

publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Andrew Wilmcote and the church thereof shall be assigned and transferred from the said John James Stewart Bishop of the said diocese of Worcester and from his successors Bishops of the same diocese and shall become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time and at all times be exercised by the said John William Dover and his heirs and assigns for ever, and that in exchange for the same the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Abenhall and the church thereof shall in like manner and upon and from the same date be assigned and transferred from the said John William Dover and his heirs and assigns and shall become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time and at all times be exercised by the said John James Stewart Bishop of the said diocese of Worcester and his successors Bishops of the same diocese for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-ninth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-

three, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes to be taken partly out of the parish of Saint Mary Stockport and partly out of the new parish (sometime district) of Saint Mark Bredbury both in the county of Chester and in the diocese of Chester.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Saint Mary Stockport and of the said new parish of Saint Mark Bredbury which are hereinafter mentioned and described, should be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes in manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed district any consecrated church in use for the purposes of Divine worship.

"And whereas by virtue of a deed dated the twelfth day of May in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three and expressed to
