

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted and when such district shall have become a new parish as aforesaid, then of the said new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereof shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid be assigned to and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Frederick Hartop Holt for his life, and shall after the decease of the said Frederick Hartop Holt be vested in and from time to time be exercised by the said Archbishop of York and his successors for ever."

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference."

"The District of Saint James, Scarborough, being:—

"All that part of the district chapelry of All Saints Falsgrave, in the county and diocese of York, which is bounded upon the south-west by the parish of Seamer in the same county and diocese, upon the east partly by a certain isolated portion of the parish of Scarborough and partly by the district chapelry of the Holy Trinity Scarborough both in the county and diocese aforesaid, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the north and upon the north-west by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundaries of the said district chapelry of the Holy Trinity Scarborough, of the said parish of Scarborough and of the district chapelry of All Saints Falsgrave all meet at the centre of the bridge which carries the line of the Scarborough Branch of the North Eastern Railway over the road called or known as Westbourne-grove, and extending thence westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of three chains or thereabouts to its junction with Saint James's-road and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of eleven chains or thereabouts to its junction with Seamer-road and extending thence southward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of six and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Oak Road and extending thence westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of fifteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with Park Hill-road and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of eleven chains or thereabouts to its junction with Spring Hill-lane, and extending thence generally south-westward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of forty-nine chains or thereabouts to the point opposite to the house called or known as Rose Cottage where the same lane is joined by Horse Cliff-lane and by the public footpath which leads up to and through Jacob's Ladder into the road called or known as Stepney Hill and extending thence, that is to say, from the last-mentioned point south-westward along the middle of the last-mentioned footpath for a distance of twenty-one chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road called or known as

Stepney Hill as aforesaid and extending thence still south-westward and in a straight line across the last-named road for a distance of one chain or thereabouts to the boundary on the western side of the same road which boundary divides the said district chapelry of All Saints Falsgrave from the parish of Seamer aforesaid."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbent of the perpetual curacy of the district chapelry of All Saints Falsgrave out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and whereas the patrons have signified their assent to such scheme and the incumbent has made no objections to the same scheme:

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of York.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the first and second years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and seven; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-ninth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the first and second years of Your Majesty, chapter one hundred and seven; of the Act of the second and third years of Your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Raphael the Archangel Bedminster situate within the limits of the district parish of Saint Paul Bedminster, in the city and county of the city of Bristol and in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Raphael the Archangel Bedminster situate as aforesaid.
