**T**HE Council of State is at present employed about sending Supplies of Money to *Flanders* and *Milan*. Several new raised Regiments are marching to reinforce our Army in *Catalonia*. Last night dyed here the Duke of *Medina Celi*. At *Cadix* they work with great diligence on the Men of War, which are ordered to be ready to go to Sea by the end of the next Month.

*Vienna, March 4.* The Poles make vigorous Preparations for the next Campaign, and we promise our selves they will give the Turks a great Defeat. Count *Charles of Walstein* is (tis said) going to the Court of *Poland* to concert the necessary Measures for that purpose, and he is to carry with him the Order of the *Golden Fleece* for Prince *James*, the more to engage him in the Interests of the House of *Austria*. From *Croatia* we have the confirmation of the late Success of our Troops against the Turks at *Novi*, and that they have since taken several Prisoners, who say, the Enemy lost above 500 men in that Action, and amongst them *Mechamed Beg* Governor of *Bilach*. The Turks make great Efforts to bring a numerous Army into the Field the next Summer. The Imperial Forces are ordered for this Year's Service as follows.

*Brest in Silesia, March 8.* The Princess *Elizabeth* of *Saxony* arrived here this Evening, being received by the *Regiments* and *Garison* in Arms, and Complimented by our *Magistrates*, and to morrow or the day following she will commence her Journey towards *Poland*, whither she is conducted by the *Bishop of Posna*, *Ambassador* Extraordinary at that Crown.

*Francofort, March 14.* The Troops of the *Electour of Saxony* will certainly begin their march towards the *Rhine* before the end of this Month; and in the mean time, a Magazine is here providing for them. The Imperial Forces are likewise preparing to be early in the Field. And we are assured, that the Confederate Army, which is to act on the *Upper Rhine* this Summer, will consist of 45000 Men.

*Dublin, March 10.* We have an account from *Corke* of the 5th instant, that Captain *Weekes* with a Party of the Militia went out some days before to the Borders of *Kerry*, where they met a Party of *Rapperies*, who run at the first sight of them; but our Men pursuing them, wounded several, and killed two of their Captains, whose Heads they brought to *Corke*, with one of the Rebels, (whom they took Prisoner) and a considerable Booty of Cattel. Another Detachment of the Militia, to the number of about 100, commanded by Captain *Townsend*, made an Excursion about the same time into the Enemies Quarters, and met a strong Party of the Rebels, who, upon our advancing towards them, fled, and run so fast, that our Men killed but one of them; but brought off 300 Head of Black Cattle, and 400 Sheep.

On the first of this Month a Detachment of *Danes*, commanded by Colonel *Dunop's* Captain-Lieutenant, another of Colonel *Viller's* Regiment under the Command of Captain *Carpenter*, and a Party of the Militia, marched from *Tallow* to free the Country of the *Rapperies*, and having left the Frontiers quiet, returned to their Quarters, bringing back with them one *O Conner*, and one *Prenderghast*, with their Horses and Arms.

From *Clonmel*, of the first instant, we hear, that the Friday before Captain *Blunt* the High-Sheriff of that County, with his Troop of Dragoons, a Troop of *Danes*, and another Detachment, commanded by the Governor of *Clonmel*, marched 20 miles into the Enemies Quarters as far as *Mitchels-Town*, burnt a great number of Cabins, killed 47 of the *Rapperies*, and took 13 Prisoners, without any loss on our side.

On the 3d instant Colonel *Caufield* sent 20 Firelocks to joyn Captain *Pallasfer*, commanding at *Cavan* in the *King's County*, who having made them up 70, marched with them 5 or 6 miles into the Enemies Quarters, and about midnight came to a place called *Killifulla* near *Portumna*, where he surpris'd Captain *Carroll*, and a Troop of the Lord *Galmoy's* Regiment, of whom our Men killed and took 27, took all their Horses, Cloaks, and Accoutrements, and got a good Booty.

From *Ballyshannon* we are told, that on the 24th past Cornet *Ruffe's*, and ano her Officer of the Irish Army, who were in Garrison at *Benbulbin*, made their escape to our Quarters, and reported, that the Enemies Horse are in a very ill condition; That a great number of Men had

had been lately raised by *Baldricke O'Donnell*, but not being able to provide them with Arms or Ammunition, above half of them had already left him. They add, that Provisions and Forage are very scarce in *Connaught*, which is confirmed by the Deserters that come over daily to other places; who say likewise, that Judge *Dailey* and others have been secured by the Rebels, upon suspicion of their designing to deliver up *Galloway* to the English.

*Pembroke, March 13.* The *Nonsuch* and *Milford* Frigates, and the Transport Ships under their Convoy, with two Regiments of Foot from *Ireland*, and the Irish Prisoners taken at *Corke* and *Kinsale*, are all come into *Milford Haven*, except one Ship, which it's feared is lost, they having met with very bad Weather.

*Chester, March 16.* On the 14th instant arrived here the *Monmouth* Yacht from *Dublin*, whence she came on Wednesday last. A considerable number of Recruits came into this City on Saturday last, and are this day on their march to *Highlake*, in order to their Transportation for *Ireland*.

*Falmouth, March 12.* The English Ships that were in this Port bound to the Southward put to Sea on Monday last in the evening, and the next morning the Dutch Merchant Men bound for *St. Ubes*, *Lisbon*, the *Groyn*, and other Parts of *Spain*, set sail likewise under the Convoy of a Dutch Man of War.

*Plimouth, March 15.* The 11th instant sailed from hence Their Majesties Ships the *Mountague*, *Advice*, *Defford*, *Dover*, *Bonadventure*, and *Crown*, to the Westward. The 12th came in the *Ruby* with a Vessel bound to *Bordeaux*, which is believed to be a *Dunkirk*; and the said Frigate is since gone out again. The 13th came in the *Elizabeth* of *London* from *Portsmouth* with 100 French Prisoners, and here they are to take in as many more, which they are to carry to *St. Malo* to be exchanged for the like number of English. This day sailed from hence the Dutch *St. Ubes* Fleet, homeward bound, under the Convoy of 3 Men of War.

*Portsmouth, March 15.* Yesterday set sail from *Spithead* to the Eastward 3 Dutch Capers, with above 20 French Prizes; and about 30 English Merchant Men bound for the River. And this Morning Sir *John Ashby*, Vice-Admiral of the *Red*, sailed from thence with Their Majesties Ships the *Victory*, the *Vanguard*, the *Harwich*, and the *Lyon*, for the *Downes*; There remaining at *Spithead* the *Plimouth*, *St. Alban*, and *Happy Return*, bound to the Westward.

*Deale, March 16.* Yesterday sailed out of the *Downes* Rear-Admiral *Rooke* with a Squadron of Men of War to the Eastward; and this day came into the *Downes* Sir *John Ashby* with four of Their Majesties Ships, and about 50 Sail of Merchant Men, from *Portsmouth*.
