IN continuation of the notice in the London Gazette of the 12th May, 1893, the Secretary of State for the Colonies has received the following Proclamation by the Governor of the Cape of Good Hope relative to the importation of dogs into that Colony:—

PROCLAMATION by his Excellency Sir Henry Brougham Loch, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of Her Majesty's Colony of the Cape of Good Hope in South Africa, and of

the Territories and Dependencies thereof, and Her Majesty's High Commissioner for South Africa, &c., &c., &c.

Whereas by my Proclamation No. 169, dated the 8th day of May, 1893, I did under and by virtue of the provisions of section 2 of Act No. 20 of 1868, entitled the "Cattle Diseases Act of 1868," prohibit the landing at any port or place in this Colony from any ship, vessel, or boat of any dog from any place or places beyond this Colony;

And whereas it has been represented to me that it is desirable to repeal the said Proclamation and

to make other provision in lieu thereof;

And whereas by Act No. 27 of 1893, entitled the "Animals Diseases Act, 1893," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, by Proclamation in the Gazette, to prohibit the importation or introduction into this Colony from any place beyond the same in which any infectious or contagious disease affecting animals shall be known or be supposed to be prevalent, of any such animals as in such Proclamation shall be mentioned, or otherwise to permit such landing subject to such restrictions and regulations as may in such Proclamation be imposed;

And whereas the disease known as rabies is reported to be prevalent amongst dogs in the

United Kingdom and elsewhere:

Now, therefore, I do hereby proclaim, declare, and make known that under and by virtue of the powers vested in me by the said Act 27 of 1893, the landing at any port or place in this Colony from any ship, vessel, or boat, of any dogs from any place or places beyond this Colony, shall after the date of this Proclamation be prohibited: provided nevertheless that such dogs as may on arrival at the port or harbour at Cape Town in this Colony be found to be free from all symptoms of the disease known as rabies, may, after undergoing a period of three months' quarantine at the Government Quarantine Station on Robben Island, subject to such restrictions and regulations as are set forth in the schedule hereto, be permitted to be transferred to the mainland.

Proclamation No. 169, dated 8th day, of May,

1893, is hereby repealed.
